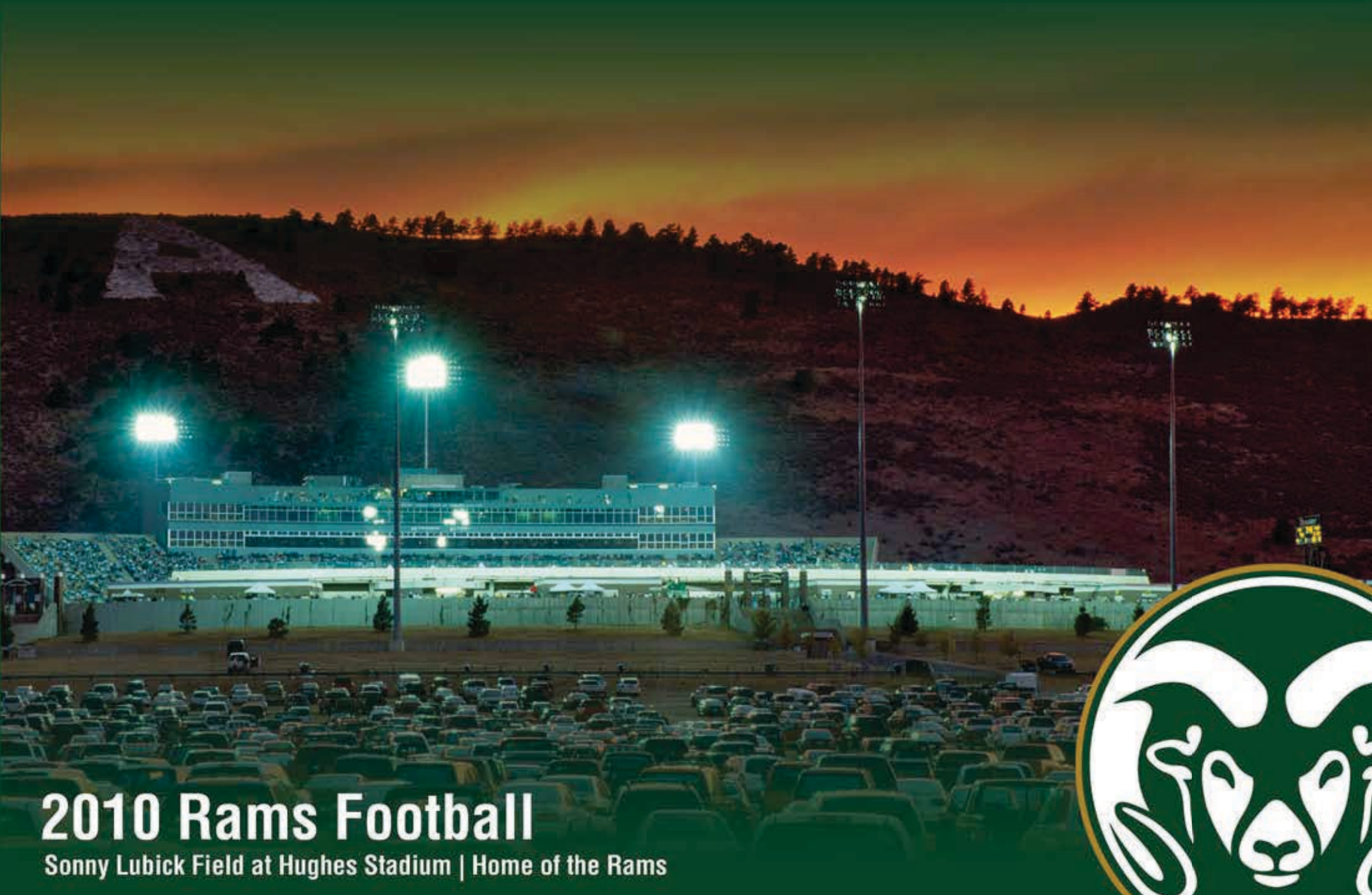

## IN MEMORIAM

KELI SCOTT MCGREGOR  
1962-2010

*The 2010 Colorado State football media guide is dedicated to the memory of Keli McGregor, who passed away in April.*

*The Colorado State athletic department was stunned this spring, learning of former All-American and longtime family member Keli McGregor's death.*

*McGregor, President of the Colorado Rockies Baseball Club, was a United Press International and Associated Press All-American in 1984. He arrived on the CSU campus as a pre-vet major who didn't have any scholarship offers out of Lakewood High School due to his smaller size. But he hit a growth spurt soon after coming to Fort Collins, and head football coach Sark Arslanian, who knew his father (the head coach at Arvada West), convinced McGregor to join his team in time for the fall of 1981. After McGregor played varsity as a walk-on in '81, Arslanian promised him a scholarship the following fall, but the university replaced the coach before he could make good on that endeavor, leaving McGregor uncertain about his future. However, athletic director Fum McGraw and new head coach Leon Fuller made sure McGregor's scholarship was waiting for him when he returned for fall camp in 1982, and the tight end became one of the most prolific offensive weapons in CSU history.*

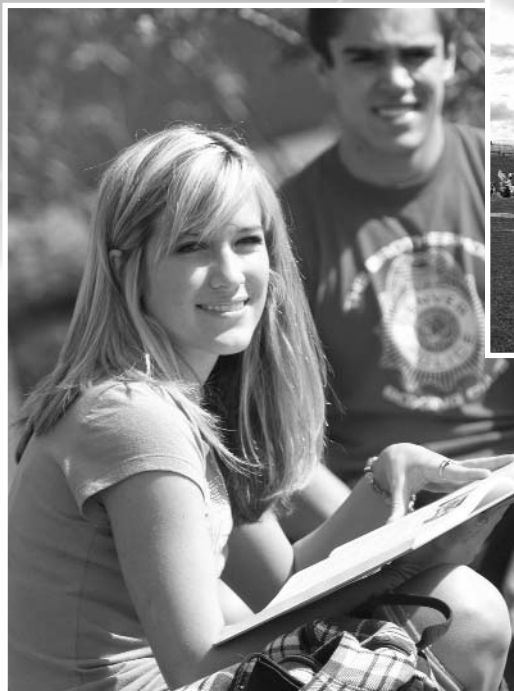

## THIS IS FORT COLLINS & COLORADO

One of Colorado's most vibrant cities, Fort Collins is the one of the best places in the country to live, work, and play. Located on the northern Front Range of the majestic Rocky Mountains, the city is within an hour's drive of Denver, the nation's 25th-largest metro area. Breathtaking Rocky Mountain National Park is just west of the city, and some of the world's most spectacular ski areas are an easy drive from campus.

This city of 137,000 residents basks in 300 days of sunshine per year – more than San Diego and Florida – and includes the historic Old Town district with its restaurants, shops, and entertainment venues, all within walking distance of Colorado State University's campus.





## THIS IS FORT COLLINS & COLORADO

Since its founding as a military fort in 1864, Fort Collins has anchored northern Colorado's rich heritage of academic, business and recreational pursuits. Hiking, mountain biking, kayaking, river rafting and rock climbing are just a few popular outdoor pursuits for students and residents.

The city maintains more than 600 acres of parks, 5,000 acres of natural areas, 20 miles of off-street trails for hiking

and biking, and three golf courses. The Lincoln Center and the University Center for the Arts, anchored in Fort Collins, are northern Colorado's cultural arts centers.

Colorado State University takes very seriously its role in educating student-athletes. Excellence is expected on the field and in the classroom.

The most recent NCAA academic statistics reveal that Colorado State leads the Mountain West Conference in graduation rate for student-athletes at 66 percent – well ahead of the conference's overall student-athlete graduation rate of 57 percent. In football, Colorado State is second in the MWC, graduating 68 percent of its student-athletes – again, well ahead of the conference average of 49 percent.

Colorado State, however, is not resting on its reputation for graduating its student-athletes. The state-of-the-art Anderson Academic Center, which has greatly enhance the academic facilities available for student-athletes, opened in September 2009.

While the athletic department takes its role in the educational process very seriously, Colorado State's mission to provide a world-class education is at the core of academic success. *U.S. News and World Report* ranked Colorado State in its top tier in its annual "America's Best Colleges" report. The university offers 79 majors and 27 minors, and many of its programs are ranked among the best in the country.

Colorado State continues to push forward in its mission to provide the best possible education. Construction recently was completed on the state-of-the-art University Center for the Arts and Computer Science buildings, the Indoor Practice Facility, Academic and Training Center, and the College of Business' Rockwell Hall expansion.

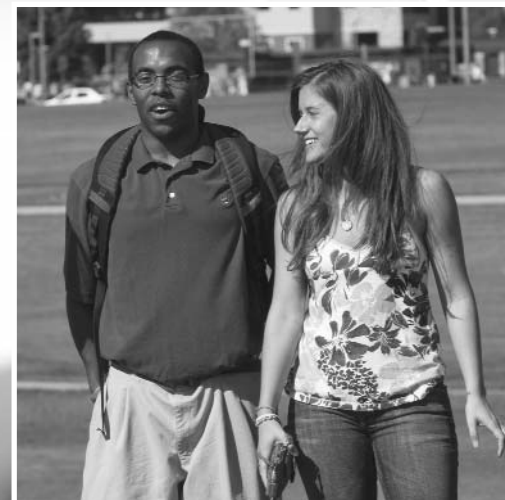


## WORLD-CLASS ACADEMICS

- CSU's Veterinary Medicine program ranks second in the country and is the national leader in federal research dollars.
- *BusinessWeek* ranked CSU's undergraduate College of Business program 67th (up from 73rd in 2008). The program ranks 30th among all public schools and 14th among all colleges and universities in the West and Southwest. The marketing and business law programs were ranked in the nation's Top 10 by the magazine.
- In December 2008, CSU conferred its 150,000th bachelor's degree and 200,000th overall degree.
- According to NCAA statistics, CSU's graduation rate for student-athletes is higher than the graduation rate for the overall student body. Of the 17 seniors on CSU's 2008 football roster — five of which went on to the NFL — all 17 will own a degree by the time the Rams kick off the '10 season. Of the 16 seniors on CSU's 2009 roster — seven of which went on to the NFL — all 16 will own a degree by the time the Rams begin 2011 spring practice.

*"If a guy stays here and goes through the program, he's graduating. I'm confident of that. We have too much academic help and our coaches care too much. If a player comes to school here and stays all four or five years, he's going to get a degree. I like what Pat Summitt, the coach of Tennessee's women's basketball team, said. She said they have a 99-percent graduation rate, asterisk, with those who stay. If someone chooses to go through this program at CSU, he's going to get a degree."*

## LEADING THE WAY

*Jeff Horinek set the standard for scholar-athletes at Colorado State. In addition to his outstanding play at linebacker, where he logged 41 consecutive starts and helped the Rams to a New Mexico Bowl win over Fresno State, Horinek graduated in May 2009 with a degree in health and exercise science, carrying a 3.88 grade-point average. He was one of 15 national finalists for the Draddy Trophy — often called the Academic Heisman — and earned an \$18,000 post-graduate scholarship from the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame.*

# SUPPORT FOR THE STUDENT-ATHLETE

Q&A WITH WADE TROXELL



Wade Troxell is associate dean for research and economic development in CSU's College of Engineering, and a former Colorado State football letterman (1975-78) and team captain (1978)

## What do you tell visiting high-school athletes who are thinking about coming to Colorado State?

One thing I try to tell prospective football players is that CSU is a great place, not only to play football in a great conference, but also to get a terrific education. Take my field for example, engineering. Colorado State is the best place to balance the demands of your studies with the time commitment required by football, because CSU offers outstanding support for its student-athletes. Plus, CSU expects them to graduate. CSU's faculty meshes well with its football staff. Both sides work together to help an individual student-athlete reach the zenith of his potential.

## From what you've seen so far, how has Steve Fairchild shown his commitment to the CSU student-athlete?

Well, first and foremost, Steve is an outstanding individual. He's a man of high integrity. He has high expectations of himself. He's a family man, a real credit to his profession. That translates into the kind of staff he's put together, and also communicates to his players that he has high expectations of them. Those players have a tremendous opportunity at CSU to learn from a mentor such as him. One of the things a player gets at CSU in addition to a great on-field opportunity – great competition against great opponents – is the chance to learn how to grow as an individual under Steve and his staff. They'll make sure the player gets an education, but also learns about life and how to be a leader in the community.

## Describe the bulk of student-athletes at CSU. What makes them different? What characterizes them academically?

First of all, students in general at CSU have a lot of varying interests, and excel in many different ways. The student-athlete here is no different in that they're elite athletes and are pursuing their academic interests. CSU gives them an opportunity not only to be the best in their sport, but also a chance to be the best in their chosen careers. In engineering, for example, I had CSU teammates when I was a student-athlete who now are leaders in their chosen profession. They not only were successful here in college, but they went on to be successful after graduation, too.

## What kind of relationship does the athletic department have with the faculty?

The faculty and staff have an excellent connection with the athletic department. Both the faculty and staff recognizes that we're all here to serve as mentors and educate student-athletes, in giving them a high-quality education. The football staff engages faculty so they're involved in all processes of recruiting and the development of the student-athlete from the time they're still in high school until they graduate here at Moby Arena.

## According to the NFL, the average professional playing career is 3.5 years. Knowing that, what does CSU offer for the long-term future of a prospective football player, beyond the NFL?

There's always the possibility of injury in this game. Everyone wants to get drafted, and CSU has a great history of players in the NFL, but the stark reality is that your chances to continue your playing career really diminish after college. In that context, CSU wants student-athletes to succeed academically. That's why they're not admitted into a particular major unless we believe that they have the aptitude and capacity to complete their degree. And the result of getting that degree at CSU is long-term dividends that pay throughout one's life, whether he plays in the NFL or not. At CSU, you get an outstanding education in a very personal way, with individual mentoring, coaching and advising. We want you to compete at the highest level of Division I football, but we also want you to become gainfully employed and qualified to launch a successful career in a chosen field. You cannot find a better opportunity to do both than what we offer at Colorado State.

## What makes CSU different?

We get feedback from students and student-athletes alike about personal attention they receive from everyone on campus, from staff members, administrators and faculty members. This is something you just don't seem to find at other places. We offer personalized attention to help a student meet his/her particular needs. It provides a framework for success, a launching pad for a successful future, whatever that future may hold.

## ACADEMIC & TRAINING CENTER

EXCELLENCE FOR THE MIND & BODY

**Cost:** \$7 million  
**Size:** 17,000 square feet  
**Opened:** September 2009  
**Location:** Southeast of the McGraw Athletic Center

### Features

- ▶ Training portion of the ground floor includes a state-of-the-art weight room, strength and conditioning offices, a nutrition center and restrooms.
- ▶ The **Anderson Academic Center** features five tutorial rooms, large study areas and a spiral staircase.
- ▶ Includes a computer lab with 30 workstations, more workspace and offices for CSU's academic staff.

In 1998, Colorado State enhanced its weight room and built an academic center as part of the McGraw Athletic Center project, but these facilities no longer met the needs of an expanded student-athlete base, nor did they allow the Rams to compete for top-quality recruits.

Because of the heavy time constraints placed on CSU student-athletes through practice, travel, strength and conditioning, and community service, a quality learning environment is essential for the university's student-athletes to achieve the high standards of academic success expected of them.

The new Academic and Training Center is a centerpiece for CSU's athletic program and supports its mission to recruit, educate, develop, and graduate Rams student-athletes within an environment that pursues excellence, values integrity and ethical conduct, promotes respect for all individuals, teaches sportsmanship, entertains our constituents, and emphasizes championship performance.

# INDOOR PRACTICE FACILITY

AS OUTSTANDING AS ANY COLLEGIATE INDOOR FACILITY IN THE NATION

**Cost:** \$13 million  
**Size:** 66,000 square feet, including 48,125 dedicated to the football portion and 8,827 to the basketball/volleyball area  
**Height:** 65 feet at its tallest point  
**Opened:** August 2009  
**Location:** East of the Moby Pool and north of the Student Recreation Center

## Features

- ▶ Contains a 70-yard synthetic-turf football field (including one end zone).
- ▶ Features a four-lane, 70-meter track and a unique shoe-changing room adjacent to the football field.
- ▶ Gymnasium easily encloses a regulation basketball court and two half courts.
- ▶ Volleyball configuration can accommodate two full-length courts.
- ▶ Has flexibility to allow the softball team to set up batting cages on the football field.
- ▶ Provides shelter for any student-athlete in each of the Rams' 16 varsity sports.
- ▶ Includes training room, equipment storage, lobby and trophy display case, and restrooms.
- ▶ Uses an innovative air circulation system.

## Quality Construction Partners

Designed by Aller-Lingle Architects P.C., and RATIO Architects, Inc., the facilities were built by Saunders Construction, Inc.

Aller-Lingle, a local firm instrumental in several campus projects, including recent Hughes Stadium renovations, served as the lead architect on both new buildings. The firm sought the assistance of Indianapolis-based RATIO because of its recent experience in the design of similar venues at BCS universities such as Illinois, Oregon, West Virginia and Indiana.

Saunders has played a significant role in the construction of several prominent Colorado projects, including the Paul D. Bowlen Memorial Broncos Centre in Dove Valley and the Broomfield Events Center.

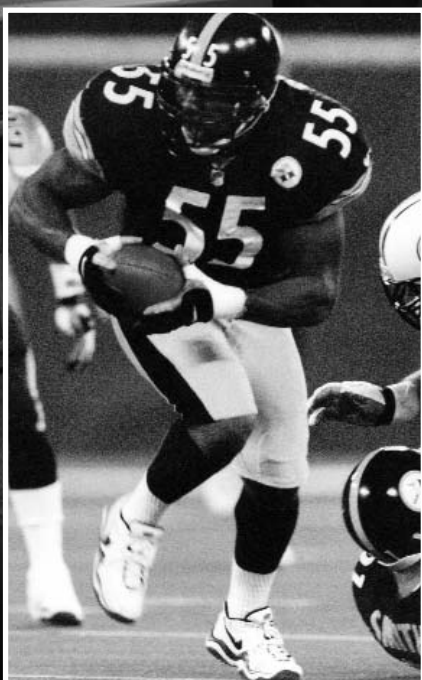

# SONNY LUBICK FIELD AT HUGHES STADIUM

HOME OF THE RAMS

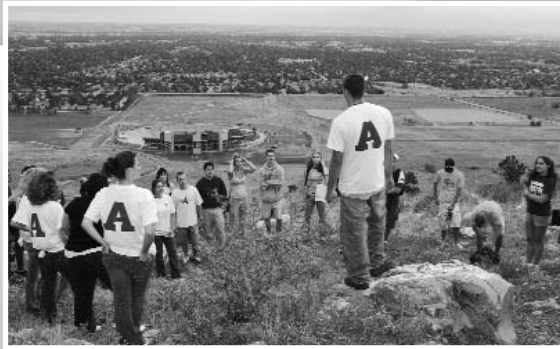
## The Aggie 'A'

The prominent white "A" displayed on the foothills overlooking Sonny Lubick Field at Hughes Stadium turns 87 years old in 2010, making it the second oldest ongoing tradition associated with Colorado State University.

The "A" evolved after World War I when a trend began among colleges to display the school insignia on a hill near campus. At a special assembly on Dec. 4, 1923, the students of State Agricultural College agreed it was time to erect such an emblem. A group of military volunteers formed the "A" Club and donated vehicles for transporting supplies, and female students provided food for the workers.

The college declared Dec. 12 a special holiday, and students worked from that morning until mid-afternoon to form the "A." One small detail was missing: The school didn't own the land on which the insignia sat. The College and Ag Board members met with landowner R.G. Maxwell and negotiated a long-term lease for the sum of \$1.

The following September, students lengthened and widened the "A" to its present size of 450 feet from top to bottom, and 210 feet across at the bottom. For many years the freshman class carried out the annual tradition of white-washing the "A." Today, the "A" is an official landmark. Each fall, members of the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity and new freshmen football players join forces to give the "A" a fresh coat of white paint as part of Homecoming activities.



## CAM the Ram

The official mascot of Colorado State is CAM the Ram, whose name symbolizes CSU history — an acronym for Colorado Agricultural and Mechanical College, the institution's former name.

All told, 17 live rams have served proudly on the Hughes Stadium sidelines. The mascot has its own corps of student 'Ram Handlers,' as well as a traveling trailer.



## 21st-Century Renovations

In 2003, the Bohemian Foundation contributed \$15.2 million to the Colorado State athletic department. The majority of that gift was focused on improving the Rams' home, Hughes Stadium.

Over a three-year period, the facility received a spectacular new west tower, containing a club seating area, luxury suites and press box. CSU also enclosed the north end zone, increasing stadium capacity to 32,500.

The foundation insisted that the venue's playing surface receive a new name — Sonny Lubick Field, after the legendary head coach that spurred the most successful run of bowl games and conference championships in program history.

The final phase of renovation focused on that surface itself. The field underwent a \$1.33 million makeover prior to the 2006 season, when Colorado State installed FieldTurf, the revolutionary, rubberized surface used by several NFL and major-college venues across the country.

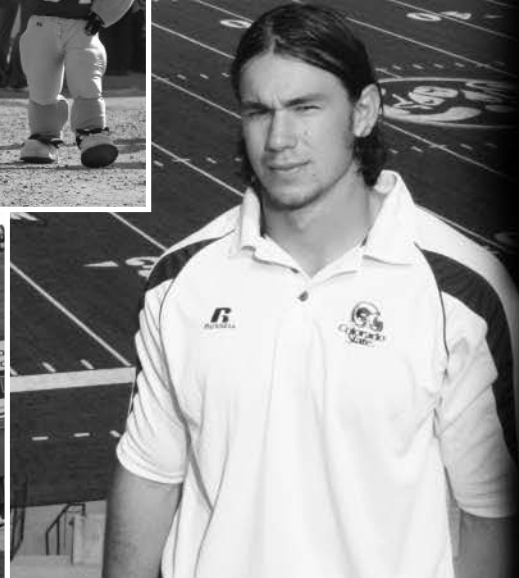
## The cannon

Since 1920, military members from the institution have fired the deafening cannon — an intimidating exclamation point to opponents that just allowed a Rams touchdown, field goal or PAT. Fired today by CSU's Army ROTC, the cannon is the oldest continuous tradition associated with CSU athletics.

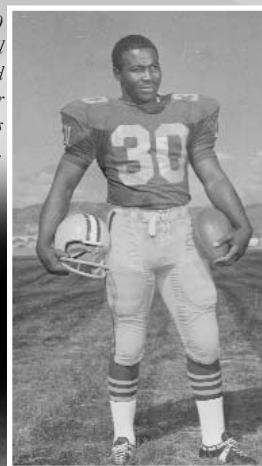

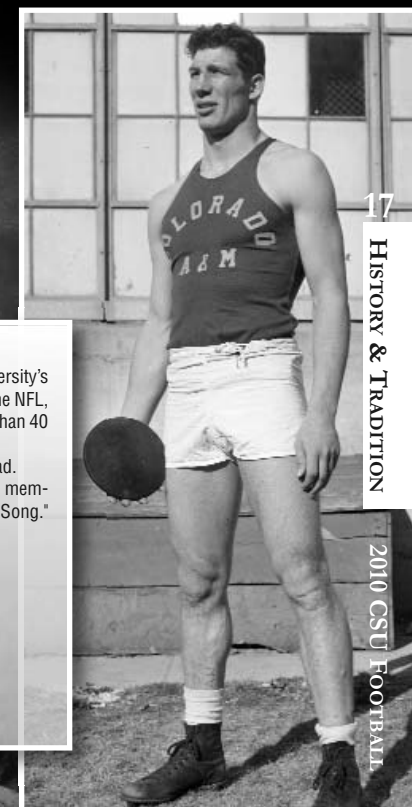
## Fum McGraw

The most recognized name in CSU annals is Thurman "Fum" McGraw (right). The university's first consensus football All-American (1948-49), he went on to an illustrious career in the NFL, where he helped the Detroit Lions to two world championships. McGraw devoted more than 40 years to the university he loved, including a decade as director of athletics (1976-86).

His retired No. 48 jersey hangs in the locker room during every game, home and road.

A passionate competitor, during his days as a Colorado A&M student and fraternity member, he sang a song directed at regional rivals. The ballad later became known as "Fum's Song."

Colorado State put an exclamation point on a 10-2 season in 2000, Steve Fairchild's last year with the university before returning as head coach, by beating Deion Branch and Louisville in the Liberty Bowl. In three of the Mountain West Conference's first four seasons, the Rams captured all or part of the league championship. To date, no other MWC school has been able to match that success over a four-year period.

## FOUR EIGHT-WIN TEAMS FOR THIRD STRAIGHT YEAR

- The Mountain West Conference had four eight-win or better teams for the third consecutive year in 2009. TCU finished the season 12-1, followed by BYU at 11-2, Utah at 10-3 and Air Force at 8-5.

## MWC IN THE RANKINGS

- For the second straight year, the Mountain West Conference had three teams ranked in the final top 25 polls. TCU finished sixth in the Associated Press and USA Today Coaches polls, while BYU was 12th and Utah 18th in both polls.
- The MWC was one of three conferences (Big Ten, SEC) with two teams in the top 12 of the final 2009 polls. For the first time in league history, the MWC had at least two teams ranked in both of the Coaches' and AP polls since the preseason rankings were released in August. It also marked the second consecutive year the Mountain West has finished a season with a team ranked in the top 10.
- TCU ranked sixth in final AP and USA Today polls, giving the Horned Frogs their second straight top-10 finish and third in the last five years.
- TReceiving its highest final ranking since the 1996 season, BYU finished 12th in both the USA Today Coaches and AP polls. The Cougars' No. 12 ranking is the program's third-best final standing since finishing No. 1 in 1984. Since 1984, BYU's two other seasons finishing higher than No. 12 came in 1994 (No. 10, coaches) and 1996 (No. 5, both polls).
- Utah's No. 18 ranking in both national polls marks the second consecutive season the Utes' have finished the year in the top 25.
- For the second consecutive year, the final Top 25 BCS Standings featured three MWC teams, with TCU ranked No. 4, BYU No. 14 and Utah No. 23. The three MWC teams ranked equaled the ACC, Big 12, Big East and SEC.
- The MWC was one of four conferences (ACC, Big Ten, SEC) with at least two teams (TCU and BYU) ranked in the top 15. In addition, the MWC was one of five FBS conferences (ACC, Big 12, Big Ten, SEC) to have three teams ranked in the final BCS Standings each of the last two years (2008-09).
- TCU's No. 4 BCS ranking earned it an automatic bid into a BCS game and marked the highest finish by a non-automatic-qualifying team in the final BCS Standings, surpassing Utah's No. 6 ranking in both 2004 and 2008. The Horned Frogs' were ranked ahead of four BCS automatic-qualifying conferences champions (Cincinnati, Georgia Tech, Oregon and Ohio State).
- TThe MWC is one of four conferences with at least one team ranked in the top 10 of the BCS Standings for a minimum of 15 consecutive weeks (Big 12, Big Ten, SEC).
- The MWC is one of five conferences to have at least two teams ranked in the BCS Standings for at least 16 consecutive weeks dating back to the

2008 season (ACC, Big 12, Big Ten, SEC).

- BYU is the only program from a non-automatic qualifying BCS conference to be ranked in the final polls each of the last four seasons. BYU is one of only seven teams to be ranked in final BCS Standings each of the past four seasons (Texas, Florida, USC, Ohio State, Boise State and Virginia Tech).
- The Cougars are one of only seven institutions to be ranked in final USA Today Coaches' poll each of the past four seasons (Florida, USC, Texas, Penn State, Ohio State and Virginia Tech). BYU is one of only seven teams to be ranked in final AP Poll each of the past four years (Florida, USC, Texas, Ohio State, Virginia Tech and West Virginia).

## 2009 SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

- The Mountain West was one of two conferences that had three teams with double-digit wins in 2009 (TCU-12, BYU-11 and Utah-10). The Big Ten had four teams with double-digit wins.
- If one compared the win percentage of the top three teams in each of the 11 FBS conferences in 2009, the Mountain West ranked tied for second with the Big Ten, and behind only the SEC. The top three teams in the SEC went 36-5 for a .878 percentage, while the MWC and Big Ten leaders posted a 33-6 record for a .846 win percentage.
- TCU (23-3) and Utah (23-3) are two of seven teams (Alabama 26-2, Florida 26-2, Boise State 26-1, Texas 25-2 and Cincinnati 23-4) to achieve 23 or more wins over the last two seasons. The Mountain West is one of two conferences (SEC) to have two teams with 23-plus wins during that span.
- TCU (23-3), Utah (23-3) and BYU (21-5) are three of 11 teams (Alabama 26-2, Florida 26-2, Boise State 26-1, Texas 25-2, Cincinnati 23-4, Penn State 22-4, Ohio State 21-5 and USC 21-5) to achieve 21 or more wins over the last two seasons. The Mountain West is the only conference to have three teams with 21-plus wins during that span.
- Since 2006, BYU has posted a 43-9 record. Only four programs—Boise State (49-4), Florida (48-7), Texas (45-8) and Ohio State (44-8)—have topped the Cougars' record the past four years.

## MWC SENDS FIVE TEAMS TO BOWL GAMES

- For the third consecutive year, the Mountain West Conference sent a record five teams into postseason bowl games. The Mountain West has earned 41 bowl bids since 1999 and holds a 25-16 all-time record in those games, including a 9-3 mark against BCS automatic-qualifying conferences since 2004.

- For the third time in six years, the MWC posted the best win percentage among the 11 FBS conferences. The Mountain West claimed the 2009-10 Bowl Challenge Cup after sending five teams into postseason action and finishing with a 4-1 (.800) mark. The league earned its first Bowl Challenge Cup after registering a 2-1 record in bowl competition during the 2004-05 season. The MWC also won the Cup in 2007-08 with a 4-1 mark and is the only conference to win the trophy three times since the award's inception in 2002-03.
- Over the past six seasons (including 2009), the MWC owns the best win percentage in bowl games among the 11 conferences with an 18-8 mark (.692). The SEC is second with a 31-17 (.646) record, followed by the Big East at 19-12 (.613) and the Pac-10 at 20-14 (.588). The MWC also is 9-3 against BCS automatic-qualifying conferences in bowl games since 2004.
- Over the past three seasons (including 2009), the MWC owns the best win percentage in bowl games among the 11 conferences with an 11-4 mark (.733). The SEC is second with a 19-8 (.703) record, followed by the Big East at 11-6 (.647) and the Pac-10 at 11-7 (.611).
- The MWC is one of three conferences that have posted a winning bowl record each of the last four years (Big East and SEC).
- The MWC had five teams participate in the postseason for the third straight year. The league has earned 41 bowl bids since 1999 and holds a 25-16 record, including a 9-3 mark against automatic-qualifying BCS opponents since 2004.

# MEDIA EXPOSURE

MAKING COLORADO STATE VISIBLE



Colorado State will be on television 11 times over its 12-game regular-season schedule in 2010. Of those 11, 10 will be available nationally. Since the beginning of the 2000 season, when CSU finished No. 14 in the final polls, networks have aired the Rams in 82 percent of their games, making Colorado State one of the nation's most televised teams over the past decade.



## New press box

Hughes Stadium's 5-year-old press box, replaced with a portion of the athletic department's \$15.2 million gift in 2003, now can comfortably fit more than 200 members of the electronic and print media for big games. CSU's athletic department in a given season issues nearly 1,000 credentials.

## Daily coverage

Colorado State is a nationally prominent brand, due in large part to the success of its athletic teams and the media coverage they receive.

The Rams are covered by five newspapers in addition to the *Associated Press*. What's more, eight area television stations, mostly from Denver (the nation's No. 18 television market), and several radio outlets along the front range come to campus to interview and feature CSU's student-athletes and coaches.

And in 2006, with the launch of the mtn., the first television network dedicated to one conference, CSU and the rest of its MWC peers receive 24-7 coverage. The network is available on the DIRECTV lineup to fans across the nation.

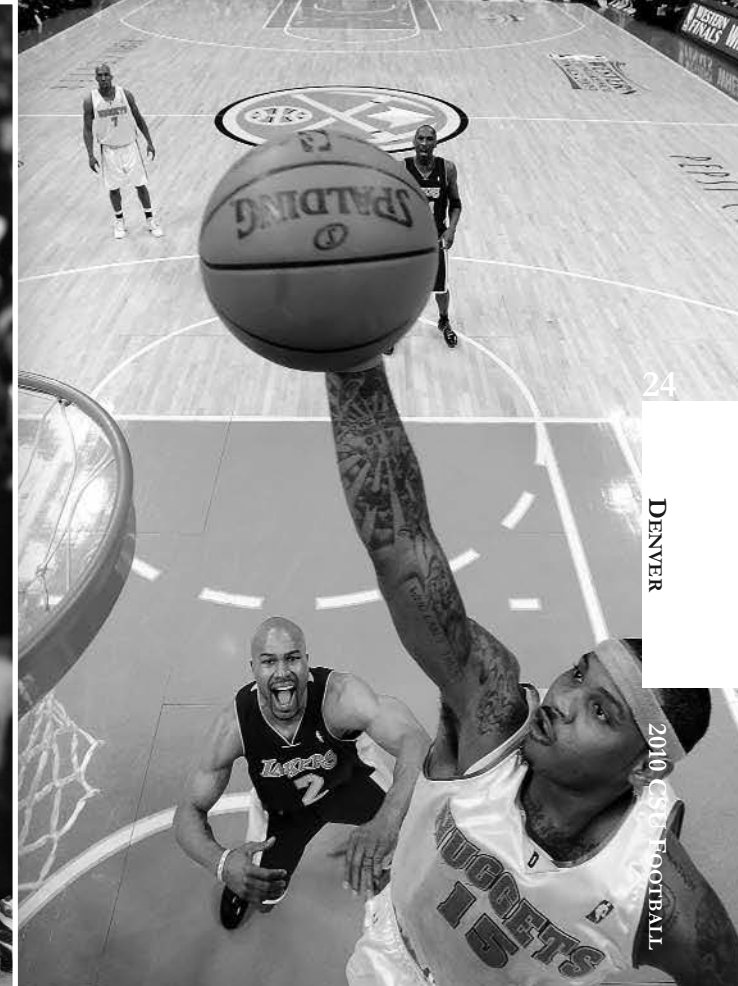
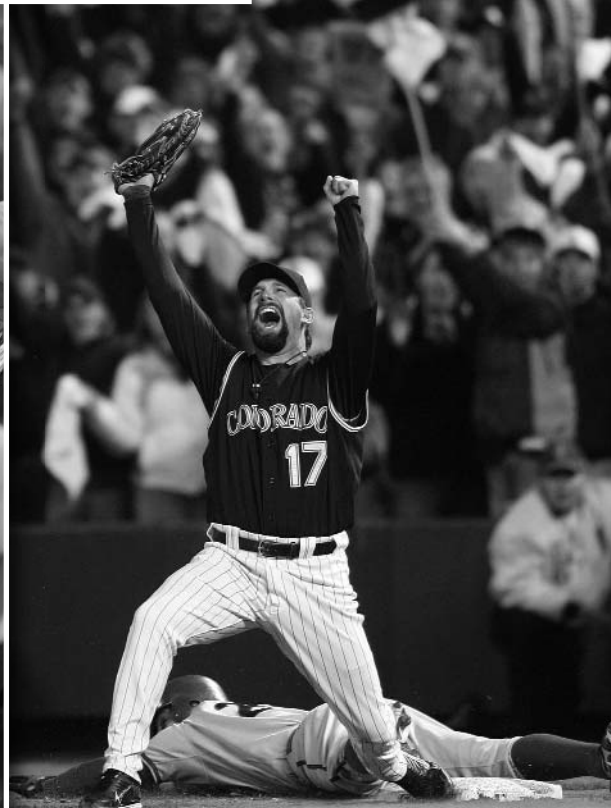
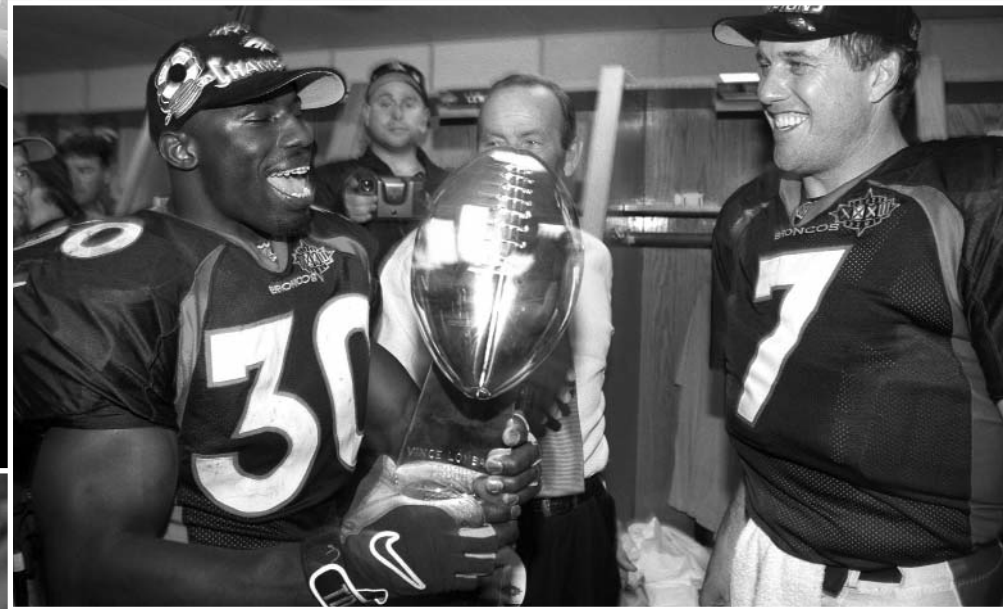


## THE MILE HIGH CITY

Sports fans in Colorado are among the most passionate in the nation, and for good reason — their teams are winners.



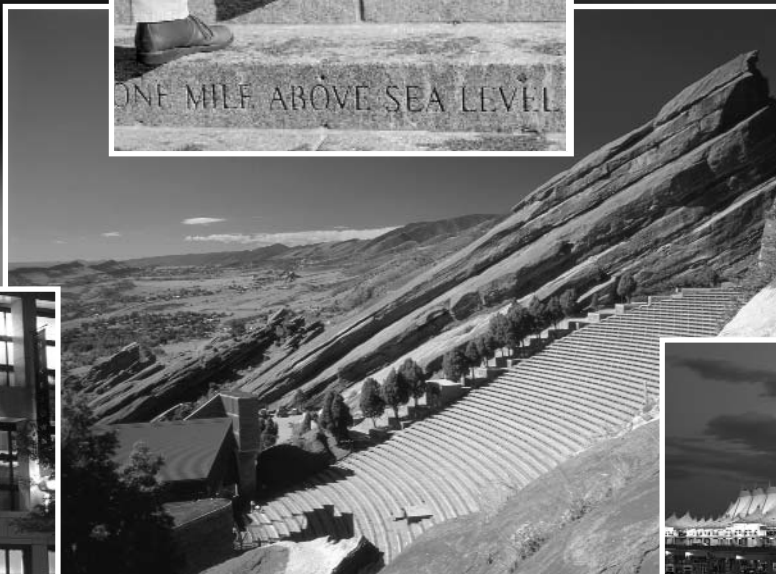




## THE MILE HIGH CITY

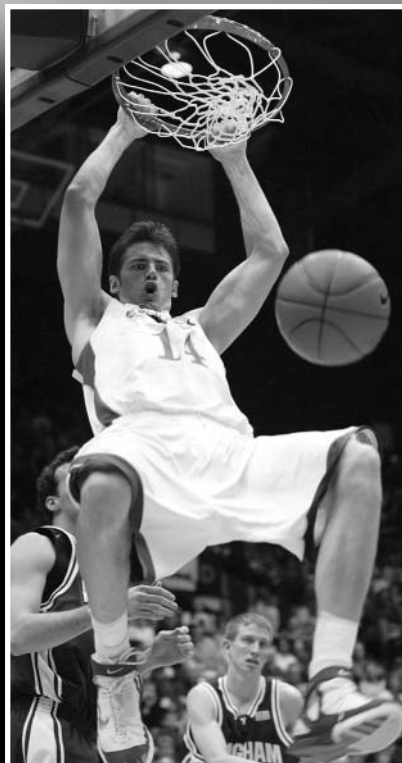

## PAUL KOWALCZYK

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS (KENT STATE '80, '86)

Director of Athletics Paul Kowalczyk has placed Colorado State's program on an ambitious path toward national prominence with his insightful and visionary leadership.

Kowalczyk is in his fifth year leading CSU's program, demonstrating an unmistakable commitment to the university after signing in 2010 a five-year contract extension, through 2015. From the moment he arrived on campus in 2006, he has shown a leadership style that is steady and consistent with ambitious goals clearly established. Under his watchful eye, a foundation has been built to cultivate long-term success throughout the program. With the foundation firmly in place, Colorado State's program stands on the threshold of taking a bold step forward nationally to reach "stretch goals" established by the Board of Governors when Kowalczyk arrived.

Perhaps nothing better illustrates the progress toward prominence that CSU's program has made during Kowalczyk's tenure than the changing skyline surrounding Moby Arena and the McGraw Athletic Center, both of which serve as centerpieces of the athletics department.

During the summer of 2009, CSU opened two state-of-the-art athletics facilities that are visually prominent to any avid Rams fan upon arriving on campus.

A training facility includes an indoor football practice field plus basketball and volleyball practice courts, adjacent to Moby Arena. Also, a new academic and strength and conditioning center is next to the McGraw Athletic Center.

Over the last year-plus, Kowalczyk also has stewarded significant upgrades to Sonny Lubick Field at Hughes Stadium, including a \$2.5 million landscaping initiative following the 2010 season that will make the venue's grounds at the base of the Rocky Mountain foothills even more attractive. Additionally in the last two years, Kowalczyk oversaw improvements to several CSU team locker rooms, and this fall, has spearheaded a \$1 million project that will furnish Moby Arena with new state-of-the-art video boards.

The two new facilities, along with upgrades to CSU's stadium, arena and McGraw Athletic Center offices, make CSU's resources among the finest in the nation. Those additions and improvements also have made CSU competitive nationally while enhancing the institution's image across a broad spectrum.

The facilities represent one of Kowalczyk's primary goals when he was appointed to his position at CSU. Almost immediately upon his arrival, he worked closely with campus leaders to develop the facilities initiative.

"These buildings show that Colorado State is unmistakably serious about achieving its stretch goals," Kowalczyk said. "Combined with the recent renovations at our football stadium, this puts us where we need to be in terms of offering quality, state-of-the-art facilities for our coaches and student-athletes, those who are here now and those who are thinking about coming here."

The facilities, along with recent contracts he negotiated with Russell Athletic (apparel and uniforms), Under Armour (footwear), and a deal with the University of Colorado to keep the Rocky Mountain Showdown at Invesco Field for the long-term future, also reflect Kowalczyk's commitment to excellence throughout the program.

"Average is simply not good enough," he said. "We must continually find ways to improve every aspect of our

program while meeting the needs of our student-athletes and providing resources for our coaches -- not just to compete, but to win, and do it while serving the university, the community and the region."

Soon after Kowalczyk's arrival in Fort Collins, he worked closely with the Board of Governors of the Colorado State University System and the university leadership to set in place a set of "stretch goals."

"The support of the board and campus administration, which was there every step of the way, was critical," Kowalczyk said. "We have leadership on this campus that not only recognizes the importance of investing in athletics, but also what a successful athletics department can do for the university."

### Colorado State's stretch goals include:

- ▶ Achieve a No. 1 ranking in the Director's Cup, a ranking system that reflects overall program success;
- ▶ Annual Bowl Championship Series inclusion;
- ▶ NCAA men's and women's basketball tournament participation.



While the entire program under Kowalczyk's guidance has moved forward with the completion of the facilities, he readily admits there are more challenges that lie ahead.

"We will never stand still. We will continue to move forward. As a program, we will strive for excellence in every area, just as we challenge our student-athletes in competition and in the classroom.

"Our efforts will always include continually and diligently working to expand our ticket and Ram Club donor base as a means to generate additional revenue and scholarship fund support."

Colorado State's expected emergence nationally has provided followers of the program optimism and excitement.

Kowalczyk brought a wealth of experience and knowledge to Fort Collins when he was named the school's 16th Director of Athletics on April 11, 2006, after having served for six successful years in the same capacity at Southern Illinois University.

In the spring of 2008, he was named to the prestigious NCAA Division I Leadership Council, an advisory body to the Division I Board of Directors. The council identifies issues important to the future of Division I and offers its expertise in defining appropriate action items. Reappointed in June 2010, his current term expires in 2014.

Kowalczyk also remains involved in NCAA, NACDA and MWC activities.

During his tenure at SIU, he led the Salukis' emergence into a successful, nationally renowned athletics program, including 15 conference championships in seven sport programs.

Before his tenures at CSU and SIU, he was senior administrator at Northwestern University during a time in which the Wildcats program enjoyed national success. He also served as assistant athletics director for business operations at Kansas State, business manager for athletics at Portland State, and assistant to the associate athletics director at Kent State.



Kowalczyk holds a master's degree in sports administration and a bachelor's of business administration in accounting from Kent State University.

A native of Warren Ohio, Kowalczyk was inducted into the Warren High School Distinguished Hall of Fame. The award recognizes and honors individuals for their achievements and performance. In 2004, he received the National Football Foundation's Gen. Robert R. Neyland Outstanding A.D. Award, and in 2006 was named the Athletic Director of the Year for the Division I-AA Central Division. Kowalczyk in 2010 concluded a four-year term on the NACDA Executive Council, representing District 7.

He is married to Peg Lynch Kowalczyk.

# STEVE FAIRCHILD

HEAD COACH | 29TH SEASON IN COACHING | 14TH SEASON AT CSU

On Dec. 12, 2007, the Colorado State Rams brought back one of their own, naming Steve Fairchild the 19th head coach in the university's football program history, which began in 1893.

"Steve Fairchild has a long-standing history of success at Colorado State," said Director of Athletics Paul Kowalczyk, "both as a student-athlete and coach. I know that he has great passion for this university, this program and this community."

That community saw an immediate return on the athletic department's investment in 2008, when Fairchild became the first head coach in program annals to lead his team to a bowl game in his inaugural season. His seven wins also were the most ever by a first-year CSU head coach, the team's first winning season in five years.

The Rams also produced the conference's leading rusher in Gartrell Johnson, making good on Fairchild's promise to restore CSU's smash-mouth offensive identity it held during his previous tenure at CSU.

Fairchild, 51, returned to his alma mater from the National Football League, where he had tutored some of the game's most productive young stars since leaving CSU after the 2000 season. Fairchild became the second current Mountain West Conference head coach to leave the NFL for his school, following Air Force's Troy Calhoun.

And like Calhoun, Fairchild starred as a quarterback at his school. He first came to CSU in 1978 as a junior-college All-American, and in his first CSU season led the Rams in passing while splitting starting duties with Keith Lee. Coaches opted to redshirt him in 1979, then made him the full-time starter in 1980, when he served as a team captain and earned second-team all-conference honors behind Jim McMahon. The Rams that year lost only once over their final six games — to national powerhouse BYU. Included in that stretch was Fairchild's best game, a 28-25 win vs. Wyoming Nov. 1, when he completed 28 of 35 passes for 406 yards and three TDs to earn Sports Illustrated Player of the Week honors.

Following his playing days, Fairchild launched a coaching career that in 2010 will enter its 29th season, 16 of which have been as a coordinator and 20 of which have been at the college level.

And 10 of those years have been at Colorado State, where Sonny Lubick made him a member of his original coaching staff, in 1993. Fairchild coached quarterbacks from 1993-96, then replaced Dave Lay and served as offensive coordinator from 1997-2000.

During Fairchild's first tenure as a CSU coach, the Rams were a combined 37-12 and experienced unprecedented offensive success, including:

- ▶ The school's all-time scoring record (442 points) and touchdowns mark (59) in 1997, Fairchild's first season as coordinator;
- ▶ Five of the six conference championships secured during the Lubick era;
- ▶ Five bowl games in eight years;
- ▶ Three end-of-season Top 25 rankings in national polls: 1994 (15th), 1997 (16th) and 2000 (14th);
- ▶ Three conference Offensive Players of the Year: Moses Moreno (1997), Kevin McDougal (1999) and Matt Newton (2000);
- ▶ A 1998 offensive line that boasted both a first-team All-American (Anthony Cesario) and an Academic All-American (Mike Newell);
- ▶ Four NFL draft choices, Calvin Branch (1997), Moreno (1998), Cesario (1999) and Darran Hall (1999); and
- ▶ Multiple 1,000-yard rushers in consecutive seasons (1996-97), making CSU the first Division I-A school to hold that distinction.

"When you examine history," Kowalczyk said, "when Steve was an assistant at CSU, we typically had the most prolific offense and top performers in the conference."

A man of commitment, at the time of accepting CSU's offer to become head coach in December 2007, Fairchild did not want to leave his NFL team, the Buffalo Bills, until the season ended, refusing to abandon his Buffalo head coach, Dick Jauron, or his players. The Bills were in the thick of the AFC playoff race, with three regular-season games remaining, when Fairchild was hired by the Rams.

"We would never jeopardize his current commitment," Kowalczyk said in announcing the hiring. "We knew from the outset and were comfortable with the dedication he has to his team and his fellow staff members. It is that type of value system — commitment, integrity, honesty, accountability and responsibility — that had him at the top of our list since the beginning."

Despite a vow to remain in Buffalo until season's end, Fairchild understood the need to focus on recruiting during a critical time and quickly moved to assemble key members of his first CSU coaching staff, hiring three immediately after the school named him as head coach.

That staff has mirrored one of Fairchild's characteristics, an ability to bring out the best in younger players, especially QBs, a common thread throughout his career since the day he graduated as CSU's field general.

"At both the professional and college levels," Kowalczyk said, "he has had a reputation of developing young players and helping them reach their maximum potential. That is an attractive trait in our program."

At Colorado State, he tutored Anthoney Hill, who led the Rams through a storybook 1994 season that included two TDs in a win at No. 4 Arizona and its Desert Swarm defense, and ended with CSU's first conference title since 1955 and a berth in the Holiday Bowl opposite Michigan. Hill left CSU as the school's career total offense leader.

Fairchild then coached Moreno as the QB guided the Rams to a pair of WAC championships (1995, '97) and two more Holiday Bowl trips.

And before getting an opportunity to coach in the NFL, Fairchild's last CSU pupil was Matt Newton, who helped corral the first two Mountain West Conference titles and consecutive Liberty Bowl appearances.

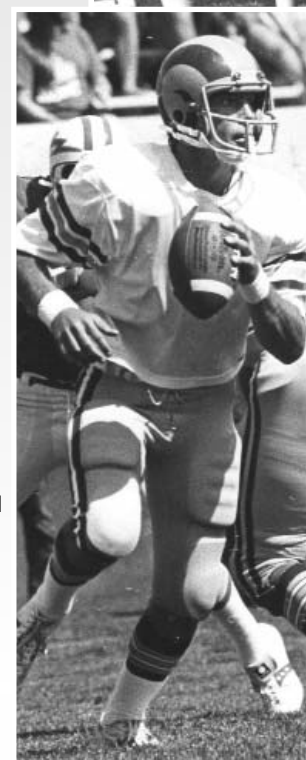

QB Marc Bulger become a Pro Bowl MVP in 2003. Fairchild's St. Louis offense achieved three straight Top 10 rankings (2003-05), finished second in scoring (2003), was second in passing efficiency (2005) and contributed to consecutive playoff appearances (2003-04).

In his first year as Buffalo Bills offensive coordinator (2006), he helped J.P. Losman to a 3,000-yard passing season and the NFL's 11th-best passer rating. Earlier, after making a difficult decision to leave CSU, he served as running backs coach for the Bills (2001-02), and oversaw Travis Henry's Pro Bowl season in 2001.

Prior to rejoining CSU in 1993, Fairchild served as quarterbacks coach at San Diego State (1990-92), offensive coordinator at New Mexico (1987-89), recruiting coordinator/tight ends coach at San Diego State (1986), offensive coordinator at Ferris State (1984-85) and offensive coordinator at Mesa Community College (1982-83) in San Diego.

At SDSU, he coached a pair of NFL draft choices in quarterback Dan McGwire (chosen in the first round, 16th overall, in 1991), and tight end Rob Awalt (third round, 62nd overall, 1987), and also helped the Aztecs to the 1991 Freedom Bowl.

At New Mexico, he coached Terrance Mathis, who became the NCAA's career receiving yardage leader and was selected in the sixth round (141st overall) of the 1990 NFL Draft.

At Ferris State in Big Rapids, Mich. (hometown of former Colorado Rockies manager Clint Hurdle), Fairchild oversaw an offense that produced David DenBraber, then the NCAA's Division II career passing leader.

And throughout his college coaching stops, Fairchild sowed the seeds of recruiting relationships from the West Coast to the Great Lakes. He has personally recruited the states of California, Arizona, Nevada, Texas and Michigan.

Nominated by Lubick for the 1999 Frank Broyles Award, given annually to the nation's outstanding assistant coach, Fairchild during the search for the Rams' next head coach came highly recommended by his predecessor at Colorado State, Lubick.

Among the names Lubick recommended, Fairchild stood out, partly because he called plays his last two NFL seasons under a defensive-minded head coach in Jauron. And before getting his chance to call his own plays, Fairchild in St. Louis worked directly with one of the NFL's most highly regarded play-callers, Mike Martz. Martz was Fairchild's position coach at Mesa Community College from 1976-77.

No stranger to the importance of classroom success, Fairchild as a CSU senior in 1980 earned first-team academic all-conference honors with a 3.05 grade-point average. He also garnered the Merrill-Gheen Award for athletic and academic achievement, as well as the NCAA District Athletic Achievement Award.

Born Stephen Thomas Fairchild as the fourth of five children on June 21, 1958, in Decatur, Ill., he is married to the former Nancy Kolstoe. The couple has two daughters, Lindsey (22) and Jill (19). Lindsey recently graduated from the University of Arkansas and is pursuing a master's degree in physical therapy, while Jill is a junior at Colorado State after graduating from Orchard Park (N.Y.) High School, where she was Athlete of the Year.

Fairchild graduated from Colorado State in May of 1981 with a bachelor's degree in economics. He went on to earn his master's in education from Azusa Pacific in 1983.

A two-year letterman as a quarterback at San Diego's Patrick Henry High School, Fairchild led his team to consecutive league championships in 1974 and '75.

After graduation, he stayed home at Mesa Community College and became the first-ever JC quarterback to throw for 5,000 yards, earning first-team All-America honors and California's Player of the Year award in 1977.

**SCOTT BROWN****DEFENSIVE LINE | 35TH SEASON IN COACHING | THIRD SEASON AT CSU**

Scott Brown begins his third year at Colorado State and his 35th overall season as a college coach. He was hired by Steve Fairchild on Dec. 18, 2007.

Brown, 58, is a Colorado native and graduate of Adams State in Alamosa, Colo. He joined the Rams from Duke, where he had spent the previous 12 years (1996-2007) in a similar capacity. He coached his last two Duke seasons with current CSU defensive coordinator Larry Kerr.

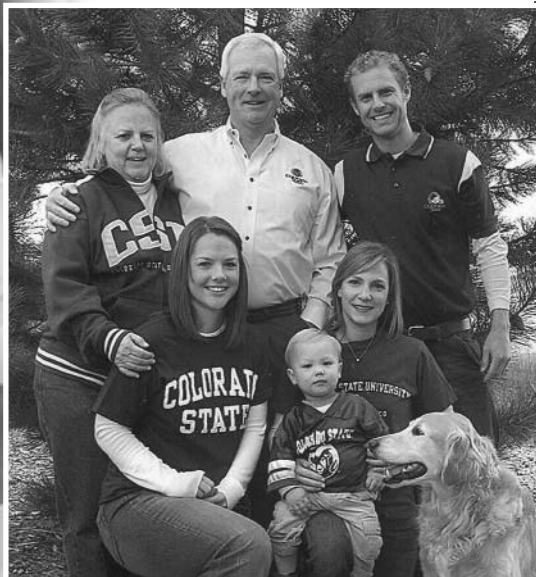
In addition to coaching the defensive line, Brown recruits East and South Texas and Kansas, and heads up the Rams' June summer camps for high school players. At Duke, Brown's primary recruiting area was most recently the state of Texas, although he also recruited Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Ohio during his time with the Blue Devils.

Highly respected by his former players, Brown has coached at least 15 players who went on to the NFL, most recently Colorado State DE Tommie Hill (N.Y. Giants). Nine of those individuals played at Duke, including Chris Combs, the Steelers' sixth-round draft choice in 2000. Combs earned first-team all-Atlantic Coast Conference honors in consecutive seasons. Duke defensive linemen who signed in the NFL as free agents include Casey Camero, Eli Nichols, Phillip Alexander, Orrin Thompson, Matt Zielinski, Gannon Shepherd, Shawn Johnson and Nate Krill.

Prior to his tenure at Duke, Brown worked four seasons at Minnesota, where he coached defensive line (1992-94) and linebackers (1995). With the Golden Gophers, he coached Craig Sauer, the Atlanta Falcons' sixth-round selection in the 1996 NFL Draft, as well as Miami Dolphins free agent Ed Hawthorne.

He also served nine years at TCU (1983-91) and three at Southwest Texas State (1980-82), coaching defensive line all 12 seasons. At TCU, he was instrumental in the development of the late Fred Washington, the Chicago Bears' second-round choice in the 1990 NFL Draft, and Kent Tramel, a Horned Frogs free agent signed by the Washington Redskins in the late 1980s.

At Southwest Texas State, he helped the Bobcats to consecutive Division II national championships, victories over North Dakota State in 1981 and UC Davis in 1982.

Brown launched his coaching career with a four-year stint in various coaching roles at his alma mater, Adams State (1976-79), in Southern Colorado.

A prep All-American at Del Norte (Colo.) High School, Brown went on to play linebacker and defensive end at Adams State.

Born Feb. 20, 1952, in Del Norte, Colo., Brown and his wife, Pam, have a son, Ryan, and a daughter, Meghan. His daughter graduated from Duke, where she competed on the Blue Devils' volleyball team. Both his son and daughter-in-law are graduates of Colorado State. Several of his in-laws also are Colorado State alumni. His brother-in-law, Frank Rogers, played football at Colorado in the early 1960s. Brown earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees from the Adams State, each in physical education in 1974 and '77, respectively.

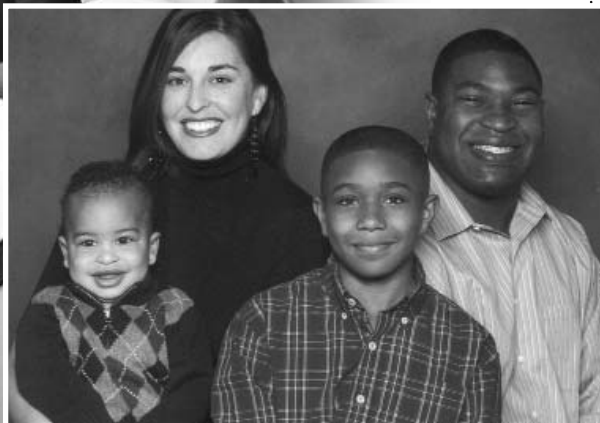
In addition to his cornerback responsibilities, Duffie also recruits New Mexico and the cities of Dallas and Denver for the Rams.

Duffie came to Fort Collins from UTEP, where he had coached the prior nine seasons. Soon after graduating from Texas Tech as a student-athlete, he joined the Miners' staff as a defensive graduate assistant (2000-01), then coached UTEP safeties (2002-03, 2007) and linebackers (2004-06).

At UTEP, he coached nine all-conference athletes, the 2004 WAC Defensive Player of the Year in Robert Rodriguez and a second-round NFL draft choice in Thomas Howard, who has started 62 of his 64 games for the Oakland Raiders during his first four pro seasons. Rodriguez and another of Duffie's former pupils, Trey Merkins, also left UTEP and signed NFL contracts. Also in April of 2008, Quintin Demps was drafted in the fourth round by Philadelphia and has spent each of his first two seasons playing for the Eagles.

In addition to his role at UTEP, Duffie worked with the Detroit Lions in the summer of 2001 in a coaching fellowship.

As a linebacker at Texas Tech, Duffie lettered four years (1996-99) and started two seasons (16 games) in the Big 12 Conference for Red Raiders head coach Spike Dykes. All told, he had 202 stops, six tackles for loss, one sack, three passes broken up and two interceptions. As a senior in 1999, he started all 11 games and racked up a single-game career-high 18 tackles, at Missouri. A second-team all-state selection at Jefferson (Texas)

High School, Duffie earned Cypress Valley Player of the Year honors and was an all-district performer on three occasions. In addition to football, he lettered in three other sports: basketball, baseball and track.

Born May 28, 1977, in Jefferson, Texas, Duffie and his wife, Autumn, have a son, Memphis. He also has a son, Timias. Duffie has a bachelor's degree in exercise and sports science (Texas Tech '99) and a master's in education administration (UTEP '02).

# DAN HAMMERSCHMIDT

WIDE RECEIVERS COACH & PASSING GAME COORDINATOR | 25TH SEASON IN COACHING | 18TH SEASON AT CSU

Dan Hammerschmidt is in his 18th season at Colorado State after rejoining the Rams program on Dec. 29, 2009, as wide receivers coach and passing game coordinator.

His addition gives the Rams six coaches who played at CSU and graduated from the institution. Plus, CSU now has six staff members who coached previously for the Rams during the program's most successful period, the Sonny Lubick era.

Hammerschmidt, 45, returned to his alma mater, where he spent four years (1982-85) as a player and 13 seasons (1986, 1996-2007) as an assistant coach. A student assistant under Leon Fuller in 1986, he returned to coach under Lubick as wide receivers coach from 1996-2000, then replaced now-Head Coach Fairchild as quarterbacks coach and shared offensive coordinator duties from 2001-07.

Entering his 25th year as a coach in 2010, Hammerschmidt inherits a group of wide receivers that includes returnees T.J. Borky, Tyson Liggett and Matt Yemm, all of whom were on the roster during his most recent tenure at CSU.

Since the 2007 season, Hammerschmidt spent one campaign at Rice and the '09 season at Wyoming, helping each team to a breakout year ending in a bowl game.

Most recently assistant head coach, wide receivers and tight ends coach at Wyoming, he spent 2009 in Laramie, Wyo. Like the Rams in 2008, the Cowboys in '09 finished 7-6 and won the New Mexico Bowl, their first postseason game in five years. One of his players, WR David Leonard, finished third in the Mountain West and tied for 32nd in the nation with 5.83 receptions per game, garnering honorable mention all-conference honors.

As wide receivers coach at Rice the year before, 2008, he helped the Owls to a 10-3 overall record, their best mark in more than four decades, and a win in the Texas Bowl, the program's first postseason victory since 1954. Key in the 10-3 season were Hammerschmidt's starting wide receivers, Jarrett Dillard, a first-team All-American who established the NCAA career record with 60 touchdown catches before Jacksonville chose him in the '09 draft, and James Casey, an All-American on some lists and a unanimous first-team all-conference player drafted by the Houston Texans in 2009. Among the most feared offenses in the country, Rice ranked No. 5 in passing (327.2 yards per game), No. 8 in scoring (41.3 points per game) and No. 10 in total yards (470.9).

Hammerschmidt, who has helped his teams to bowl games in eight of the past 11 seasons, has coached in the Mountain West all but one of the conference's 11 years. He played a key role in four Rams conference titles (1997, 1999, 2000 and 2002) and seven bowl appearances. What's more, the Rams in 2003 established their single-season record with 5,706 yards of offense.

His NFL players include WR Darran Hall, Tennessee's sixth-round selection in 1999; QB Bradlee Van Pelt, the Broncos' seventh-round choice in 2004; Dillard, Jacksonville's fifth-round selection in 2009; Casey, Houston's fifth-round choice in 2009; and QB Caleb Hanie, a 2008 Chicago Bears free agent and currently Jay Cutler's backup. Hammerschmidt also has coached nine all-conference players: WR Jeremy Calhoun (1996), WR Geoff Turner (1997), Hall (1998), WR Dallas Davis (1999), WR Pete Rebstock (2000), Rice's Dillard and Casey (2008), Duke's Erwin Sampson (1989) and Van Pelt (2002-03), the Mountain West Offensive Player of the Year in both 2002 and '03.

A four-year starter (1982-85) as a safety for the Rams, Hammerschmidt led CSU with four interceptions in 1985, in addition to returning kickoffs. After signing as a free agent and spending training camp with the Indianapolis Colts, he returned to CSU to begin his coaching career in 1986.

After one year at CSU, he was a graduate assistant at TCU in 1987, when current Rams defensive line coach Scott Brown held the same position with the Horned Frogs.

Steve Spurrier gave Hammerschmidt his first full-time coaching position, making him the Duke outside linebackers and special teams coach in 1988. He was in

charge of the Blue Devils' secondary each of the next five years until moving to the Virginia Military Institute (VMI), where current West Virginia head coach Bill Stewart hired Hammerschmidt to coach the Keydets' secondary.

Lubick, CSU's offensive coordinator during most of Hammerschmidt's college playing career, then brought him back to Fort Collins in 1996.

One of four current Rams coaches who grew up in the San Diego area, Hammerschmidt came to CSU after a stellar career as a quarterback at Helix High School, which later produced the No. 1 and No. 2 overall selections in the NFL Draft, Utah's Alex Smith (2005) and USC's Reggie Bush (2006), respectively. Fairchild, running backs coach Anthony Hill, and quarterbacks coach Daren Wilkinson also left the San Diego area to play quarterback at CSU.

Hammerschmidt graduated in 1987 from Colorado State with a degree in business economics. He has two children, Holly and Michael. His brother, Jeff, is Arizona's special teams coordinator and defensive ends coach.

# ANTHONEY HILL

RUNNING BACKS | 13TH SEASON IN COACHING | NINTH SEASON AT CSU

Anthony Hill returned to his alma mater from his hometown on Jan. 23, 2008, and begins his third season as a full-time assistant coach at CSU. He enters his 13th season in the coaching profession, and his ninth overall campaign in the Rams program.

All told, Hill has seven years of coaching experience at the high-school level, including the 2007 season as a head coach, and three years as a college assistant.

Hill, 38, rejoined the Rams after one year (2007) as the head football coach at San Diego High School, where his top assistant, former Rams teammate Paul Turner, replaced him at the helm. Despite moving to Fort Collins, Hill continues to have a presence in Southern California. His recruiting areas are San Diego, Orange County and Los Angeles.

Since leaving Colorado State after the '94 season as one of the most exciting players in program history,

Hill played professionally one year (1995) as a reserve quarterback for the Edmonton Eskimos of the Canadian Football League. He then returned home and served as an assistant coach at University

City High School (1996-97), where he starred in the late 1980s. At UCHS, he tutored the young field generals who followed in his footsteps and in each of his two years, one of his pupils earned all-league honors. In addition to football, Hill for two seasons was an assistant on both the boy's basketball team and the girl's track and field squad.

At the college level, he has worked with wide receivers as a student assistant coach and peer mentor while finishing his degree at Colorado State (1998), and for two seasons (2003-04) he was offensive coordinator/tight ends coach at Southwestern College in Chula Vista, Calif.

From 1996 to 2000, before and after his 1998 return to CSU, Hill served on the faculty of UCHS as a teacher's aide and instructional aide. He worked one semester with special-education students, and two semesters with at-risk students. In the latter role, he spearheaded a mentoring and tutoring program for students in danger of dropping out, and saw the program enjoy great results.

After his time at Southwestern, Hill came back to La Jolla High School and served as the Vikings' offensive coordinator for two more seasons (2005-06), prior to accepting the head coaching position at San Diego High School in 2007.

As a senior in 1994 at Colorado State, where his position coach was Fairchild and the wide receivers coach was Urban Meyer, Hill led the Rams to a storied 10-2 season. The quarterback guided CSU to a berth opposite Michigan in the Holiday Bowl, a No. 14 ranking in the final *USA Today/CNN* coaches poll and a No. 16 slot in the season-ending Associated Press rankings.

That season the Rams were in the nation's Top 10 in five straight polls entering the Holiday Bowl. Hill guided an opportunistic offense to a 21-16 win at No. 4/6 Arizona (Oct. 8), throwing two TD passes against the Wildcats' vaunted "Desert Swarm" defense, as well as wins over two other ranked opponents, No. 18/10 BYU and No. 23/23 Wyoming — each on the road. All

told in 1994, he completed 154 of 290 passes (53.1 percent) for 2,552 yards and 16 TDs, while rushing for 163 yards on 93 attempts, with five TDs, and earned second-team all-conference honors.

A three-year starter (1992-94), Hill left CSU as the school's career total offense leader (7,428 yards), surpassing Kelly Stouffer (6,666). His mark now ranks second after Bradlee Van Pelt (8,579) broke it in 2003. Hill also ranks tied for fourth with 39 career TD passes, and fifth in career passing yards (6,309). He was inducted into the Colorado State Athletics Hall of Fame, a prestigious honor, in 2008.

A 1990 graduate of San Diego's University City High School, Hill garnered second-team all-city and second-team all-conference recognition, passing for 1,903 yards and 16 touchdowns as a senior in 1989. In addition to football, he lettered in basketball and track.

Born Dec. 24, 1971, in San Diego, Hill and his wife, Kesha, make their home in Fort Collins. He also has three children, Bakir, Kiara and Deja. Hill earned his bachelor's degree in exercise and sports science from Colorado State in 1999.

## LARRY KERR

ASSISTANT HEAD COACH, DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR &amp; LINEBACKERS | 36TH SEASON IN COACHING | 13TH SEASON AT CSU

Larry Kerr, 57, returned to Colorado State from Duke, where he had served as the Blue Devils' rush ends and strong-side linebackers coach in 2007, after coaching special teams at the school the previous season.

Like Steve Fairchild, Kerr was one of Sonny Lubick's original hires when Lubick assembled his initial CSU coaching staff in 1993. Kerr spent 10 years with the Rams (1993-2002), all as defensive coordinator. During that period, Colorado State:

- ▶ Saw 12 defensive players selected in the NFL Draft: Sean Moran (Buffalo, fourth round, 120th overall), Raymond Jackson (Buffalo 5/156), Greg Myers (Cincinnati, 5/144) and Brady Smith (New Orleans 3/70) in 1994, Joey Porter (Pittsburgh 3/73) and Jason Craft (Jacksonville 5/160) in 1999, Clark Haggans (Pittsburgh 5/137) and Erik Olson (Jacksonville 7/236) in 2000, John Howell (Tampa Bay 4/117) and Rick Crowell (Miami 6/188) in 2001, and Dexter Wynn (Philadelphia 6/192) and Andre Sommersell (Oakland, 7/255) in 2003;
- ▶ Had two conference Defensive Players of the Year (Crowell in 2000, Smith in 1995) and a two-time All-American (1994-95) in Myers, who also earned the '95 Jim Thorpe Award, becoming CSU's first individual national award winner;
- ▶ Achieved both an Academic All-American (Eric Pauly, 2002) and two NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship winners (Myers, 1995, and Nate Kvamme, 1998);
- ▶ Captured six conference championships;
- ▶ Earned seven berths in postseason bowl games; and
- ▶ Won 84 games and lost just 38, winning at least eight contests seven times.

In his final season at CSU, 2002, the Rams were 10-4 and went to the Liberty Bowl, after which he moved to UCLA to become defensive coordinator (2003-05).

With the Bruins, he helped the program to three straight bowls. In 2005, his defense contributed to a 10-2 season, led by linebacker Spencer Havner, a semifinalist for the Butkus, Rotary Lombardi and Bednarik awards. In 2003, his defense finished second in the Pac-10 and 18th in the nation, paced by Pac-10 Defensive Player of the Year Dave Ball, and first-team all-conference performer Brandon Chillar.

After four years as a high-school coach in Northern California, Kerr began his college coaching career at his alma mater, San Jose State, as the inside linebackers coach from 1980-83. He then coached inside linebackers and special teams at Stanford (1984-88) and UCLA (1989), before a three-year stint (1990-92) as Northern Arizona's assistant head coach and defensive coordinator.

At Northern Arizona, his defense finished ranked No. 1 in the Big Sky Conference after the '92 season.

Kerr has re-established recruiting ties he has in the region, concentrating primarily on the states of Colorado and Texas. During his first tenure at CSU, he recruited talents such as Wynn, Anthony Cesario, Mike Newell, Pete Rebstock, Matt Newton and Eric Pears. At Duke, he recruited the states of North Carolina, Virginia, Pennsylvania, Illinois and Wisconsin.

A three-sport athlete at Terra Linda High School in San Raphael, Calif., Kerr was an all-league selection and team captain in football, basketball and baseball. The Marin County football Player of the Year in 1970, he was inducted into the Marin County Hall of Fame in 1995.

A starting linebacker for two seasons and a three-year letterman (1972-74) at San Jose State, Kerr was a two-time Pacific Coast Athletic Association Scholar Athlete. He played on a defense that sent eight of 11 starters to the NFL, including Denver Broncos Ring of Famer Louie Wright, Super Bowl players Kim Bokamper and Gerald Small, and former pro standouts Carl Eckern and Wilson Faumuina. His head coach was Darryl Rogers,

who would go on to hold the reins of the Detroit Lions.

Kerr's daughters both grew up in Fort Collins, graduated from CSU, and played roles in the success of the Rams' volleyball program. Kelly played from 1999-2001, after initially walking on to the team. As a senior, she was a key server as CSU defeated CU to advance to the second round of the 2001 NCAA tournament. Lindsey played from 2001-03, earning MWC Defensive Specialist of the Year and all-MWC honors in 2002. Lindsey currently serves as head volleyball coach at Fort Collins High School. Kelly is a first-grade teacher at the city's Werner Elementary.

Born June 8, 1953, in Abington, Pa., Kerr has been married more than three decades to the former Tracy Hoover and the couple has two grown children, Kelly and Lindsey. He owns a bachelor's degree in physical education ('75) and a master's in physical education ('82), both from San Jose State.

## LARRY LEWIS

SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR &amp; SAFETIES | 29TH SEASON IN COACHING | THIRD SEASON AT CSU

Larry Lewis is in his third year at Colorado State and in 2010 marks his 29th season as a college coach. He officially joined the Rams on Jan. 14, 2008.

Idaho State's head coach from 1999-2006, Lewis guided the Bengals to a share of the 2002 Big Sky Conference title and the school's first pair of consecutive eight-win seasons, in 2002 and '03, in the program's 101-year history. For a stretch from 2001-04, Idaho State was ranked in 22 of 23 national polls. His Bengals teams produced 13 All-Americans, 127 all-conference selections and 41 academic all-conference awards.

Two of his former players, quarterback Matt Gutierrez and defensive end Jeff Charleston, were in uniform during the NFL playoffs in recent years. Gutierrez has been a reserve QB behind Tom Brady with the New England Patriots and currently backs up Matt Cassel with the Kansas City Chiefs. Charleston, who played every game last year for the Super Bowl champion New Orleans Saints, also started three games in '07 for the Indianapolis Colts. Another former player, Jared Allen, is an All-Pro with the Minnesota Vikings and won the 2003 Buck Buchanan Award as the nation's top Division I-AA defensive player. And, former ISU standout Pago Togafau played seven games as a rookie linebacker in 2007 for the Philadelphia Eagles, then went to the Super Bowl with Arizona. He's currently with Tennessee.

Lewis was a finalist for the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year in 2002, when Idaho State notched its best record in 21 years and captured a share of its first Big Sky title in more than two decades. That season, the Bengals had 22 all-conference players; they had just one only three years earlier, in 1999. The Bengals closed the year No. 16 in the national polls.

One year later, in 2003, he guided ISU to an 8-4 record while playing the nation's toughest Division I-AA schedule. That memorable campaign included two dramatic double-overtime triumphs, one of which was the Bengals' first victory over Montana in 10 years, a 43-40 win over the perennial national power. In fact, his team knocked off four nationally ranked teams that season, and finished the season as the country's No. 21 team.

Before taking the reins at Idaho State, Lewis spent 18 years as an assistant coach and built recruiting relationships in Washington, Idaho, Utah, Nevada, California, Colorado, Montana, Wyoming, Alaska, Canada and Oregon, his home state. His recruiting responsibilities at CSU include Northern and Central California.

Prior to his tenure at ISU, Lewis spent 10 years at Washington State, where he served as defensive ends coach (1989-94) and assistant head coach/special teams coordinator (1995-98). During that period, WSU experienced unprecedented success and his linemen helped the school post the nation's No. 2 defense against the run in both 1993 and 1994. The Cougars went to three bowl games, including the Rose Bowl at the end of a 10-1 season in 1997. In that contest, WSU nearly upset eventual national champion Michigan.

From 1981-88, Lewis coached at Weber State, where he began as a part-time assistant. Promoted to full-time status by head coach Mike Price prior to the 1983 season, Lewis coached outside linebackers from 1981-85, then wore two caps as recruiting coordinator and defensive line coach from 1986-88. In 1987, the Wildcats enjoyed what remains the best season in program annals, a 10-3 campaign that saw them advance to the national Division I-AA quarterfinals and capture a share of the Big Sky Conference championship. In '81, his first year at the school, the 7-4 team snapped a string of 10 losing seasons.

Lewis began coaching after a stellar playing career at Boise State, where he lettered four times. After redshirting in 1976, he was the team's most improved player as a freshman. As a starter at outside linebacker, he helped the Broncos win the 1980 NCAA Division I-AA na-

tional championship, on the heels of a 10-1 season in 1979 and a Big Sky championship in 1977.

A four-year football letterman at Vale (Ore.) Union High School, the tailback/linebacker played for his father and helped the 12-0 team to the Class 2A state title as a senior in 1975. He also lettered four times in baseball, helping Union to the state playoffs in 1976, and twice in wrestling.

Lewis was an outside linebacker at Boise State, helping the Broncos win the 1980 I-AA national championship as a senior in 1980.

Born Oct. 30, 1957, in Nyssa, Ore., he and his wife, Lisa, have a daughter, Hanna. His father, the late Arnie Lewis, still is considered one of the finest high school coaches in Oregon history. Lewis earned a bachelor's degree in physical education from Boise State in 1981.

**PAT MEYER****OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR/OFFENSIVE LINE | 14TH SEASON IN COACHING | EIGHTH SEASON AT CSU**

A strong contributor to CSU's success in the early 1990s, Pat Meyer is in his second tenure at Colorado State, after joining Steve Fairchild's new staff as offensive line coach on Jan. 14, 2008. He was promoted to run game coordinator on March 13, 2009, after earning recognition from Rivals.com as one of the nation's top 10 recruiters among non-BCS schools. One year later, on Jan. 8, 2010, Meyer became the Rams' offensive coordinator, then proceeded to help assemble one of the highest-rated recruiting classes in CSU history, earning mention from Rivals as one of the top 25 recruiters in the nation across all schools.

In the spring of 2010, four of Meyer's starters on the CSU offensive line earned invitations to NFL camps, including sixth-round draft selection Shelley Smith, now with the Houston Texans. Cole Pemberton (Houston), Adrian Martinez (Seattle) and Tim Walter (Chicago) signed free-agent contracts.

Meyer, 38, returned to his alma mater from Florida State, where he spent one season (2007) working exclusively with Bobby Bowden's football program as a strength coach.

Prior to his work with the Seminoles, Meyer spent seven years in the North Carolina State athletic department. After four seasons (2000-03) as the football team's head strength and conditioning coach, the school promoted him to head the entire athletic department's strength programs, a role he held from June of 2004 to February of 2006. Chuck Amato then hired him in 2006 to coach the Wolfpack offensive line. At N.C. State, Meyer helped to condition and train five first-round NFL draft choices, including first-rounders Mario Williams, the No. 1 overall selection in 2006, Philip Rivers, Manny Lawson, Koren Robinson and John McCargo.

Meyer launched his coaching career at Memphis, where he spent one season as a graduate assistant (1997) and one working with former CSU coach Dave Magazu and the Tigers' offensive line and tight ends (1998). He then spent one and a half years in the Tigers' strength and conditioning department, including five months as the director, from January-May of 2000.

One of several current coaches who played at Colorado State, Meyer was a four-year letterman (1991-94). Considered one of the WAC's most consistent offensive linemen, he earned all-conference honors three straight years, including first-team accolades in 1994. He also was an Academic All-American in '94.

During that senior year, he helped the Rams to a Holiday Bowl berth opposite Michigan in one of the most memorable seasons in program history. CSU depended on him to start at three positions during his career, and he started for two seasons. He also was a team captain in 1994.

He went on to sign with the NFL's Arizona Cardinals in the spring of 1995, then played for the St. Louis Stampede of the Arena Football League during the 1996 season.

An all-state selection and a four-year starter at Girard (Ohio) High School, Meyer was a five-sport letterman, participating in wrestling, basketball, baseball and track. Like athletic director Paul Kowalczyk (Warren), Meyer grew up in a suburb of Youngstown, Ohio.

Born April 5, 1972, in Youngstown, Ohio, Meyer and his wife, Erin, have three daughters, Christina, Emma and Sophia. His father, Angelo, played football at Nebraska. Meyer earned his bachelor's degree in exercise and sports science from CSU in 1995, and has completed courses toward a master's degree in educational leadership.

# TODD STROUD

TIGHT ENDS & FULLBACKS/RECRUITING COORDINATOR | 25TH SEASON IN COACHING | FIRST SEASON AT CSU

Todd Stroud, a former head coach who has tutored the No. 1 overall selection in the NFL Draft and built recruiting ties across the SEC and ACC footprints, joined the Colorado State coaching staff on Feb. 25, 2010.

Stroud works with the interchangeable fullbacks and tight ends in CSU's pro-style offense, in addition to coordinating the Rams' recruiting efforts, which stretch from the southeastern-most tip of Florida to the Pacific Northwest.

The addition of Stroud, who enters his 25th season as a college coach in 2010, gives the CSU staff a combined 260 years of coaching experience, and 34 combined NFL Draft choices coached.

Stroud, 46, came to CSU from Florida State, where he served three seasons (2007-09) as the athletic department's head strength and conditioning coach, working with college football's all-time leader in wins, Bobby Bowden. During his recent stint at FSU, Stroud helped the Seminoles to three bowl appearances.

From 2004-06, Stroud served as associate head coach and defensive line coach at North Carolina State, where the Wolfpack led the nation in total defense after his first season, 2004. Five of his N.C. State players were selected in NFL drafts. Three of those linemen went in the first round of the 2006 NFL Draft: Mario Williams, the No. 1 overall selection ahead of Reggie Bush, Manny Lawson and John McCargo. Additional N.C. State standouts Tank Tyler (2007, third round) and DeMario Pressley (2008, fifth round), a member of the New Orleans Saints team that won Super Bowl XLIV, also were drafted.

And before he coached them on the field, Stroud had those three first-rounders and other N.C. State athletes, such as No. 4 overall choice Philip Rivers, in the weight room, as the Wolfpack's director of strength and conditioning from 1999-2004. All told, he has served 20 seasons in a role as a strength coach, including three years at Memphis (1997-99), one year at Auburn (1993), and six at Samford (1987-92), where he also coached the defensive line simultaneously. He first worked with athletes in a college weight room in 1986, as an assistant at Florida State.

From 1994-96, Stroud held the reins as head coach of the football program at Western Alabama, making him one of two current CSU assistants with previous head coaching experience (also Larry Lewis, Idaho State).

The year before, in 1993, he trained and conditioned an Auburn team that went 11-0 and finished fourth in the final Associated Press poll but didn't play in a bowl due to NCAA probation.

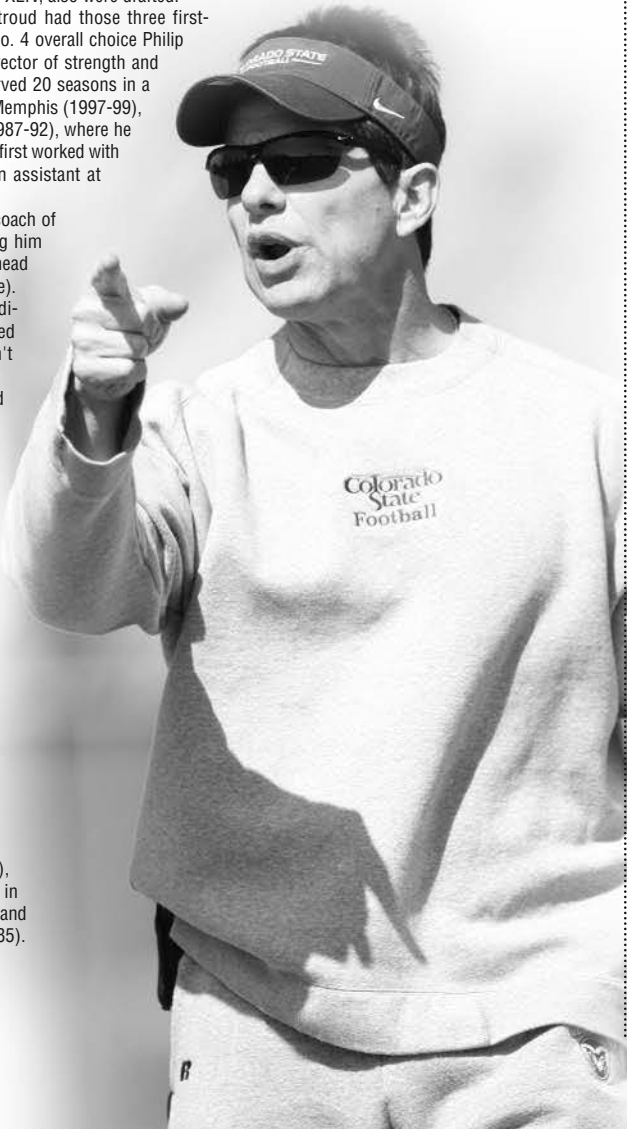
During his six years as a defensive line and strength coach at Samford, he helped the program to consecutive Division I-AA playoff appearances, including the national semifinals in 1991.

Stroud launched his career as the defensive line coach at Central Florida in the spring of 1986, before Bowden hired him to return to Tallahassee that summer.

From 1997-2007, Stroud worked either directly or indirectly with Pat Meyer, now CSU's offensive coordinator/offensive line coach.

A three-year starter (1983-85) for Bowden, Stroud anchored the Florida State defensive line, serving as team captain in 1985. The noseguard was a two-time Nutrament Strength All-American and went to four bowls with the Seminoles. In 1984, he earned the Bob Crenshaw Award, given annually to the FSU player whose courage and fighting spirit was an inspiration to others.

Born Dec. 17, 1963, in St. Petersburg, Fla., Stroud and Marianne Sylvers married in 1988 and have four children: Jessica (20), Alexandra (19), Chelsea (18) and Stone (3). He holds a master's in athletic administration (Alabama-Birmingham, '88) and a bachelor's in physical education (Florida State, '85).

# DAREN WILKINSON

QUARTERBACKS & ASSISTANT RECRUITING COORDINATOR | 14TH SEASON IN COACHING | SEVENTH SEASON AT CSU

Daren Wilkinson returned to his alma mater as quarterbacks coach on Jan. 14, 2008. He marks his 14th season as a college coach in 2009.

Wilkinson, 38, coaches the Rams' quarterbacks, his former position at CSU, and serves as the team's assistant recruiting coordinator. His primary recruiting areas are Arizona, Nevada, Utah and Colorado's Front Range League, which includes three Fort Collins high schools. He's also the program's liaison to academic support services and the university faculty, as well as the housing coordinator.

Another former Sonny Lubick player on the Rams' staff, Wilkinson came back to Fort Collins from South Dakota State, where he was offensive coordinator and coached quarterbacks and wide receivers for four seasons (2004-07).

In 2007, the I-AA Jackrabbits went undefeated in conference play to capture the Great West Football Conference title; five of their seven wins were against foes that were ranked at some point during the '07 campaign. The school led its conference in wins from 2004-07, over Wilkinson's tenure there. The GWFC was formed in 2004.

Wilkinson spent three years (2001-03) coaching wide receivers and coordinating the passing game at Fayetteville (N.C.) State. The school won consecutive conference championships and finished 2002 as the No. 15 team in the country, after earning a berth in the Division II playoffs. At FSU, the team had an all-conference receiver each of his three years, including a pair of first-team selections in Elliot London and Andreus Holmes. Each of those three years was a winning campaign; the school had only eight such seasons in its history before 2001.

Prior to his time in Fayetteville, he was offensive coordinator (2000) and quarterbacks coach/passing game coordinator (1999) at Eastern Arizona. In 2000, the school upset Snow College, then the No. 2 team in the nation.

But his foundation in college football, both as a player and coach, was at Colorado State under Lubick. He began his coaching career as a Rams offensive graduate assistant from 1997-98, culminating that '97 season with a Holiday Bowl victory over Missouri. In that role, he worked with every offensive position, including time with Moses Moreno and Matt Newton, a pair of eventual conference Offensive Players of the Year.

Like Steve Fairchild a former junior-college transfer who started as a CSU quarterback, Wilkinson started seven games for the Rams in 1995. During that junior year, he helped the Rams to a share of the WAC championship. He did not play as a senior in 1996, when Moreno emerged as an eventual Western Athletic Conference offensive MVP.

The College Sports magazine Junior College Player of the Year in 1994, Wilkinson was a second-team JC All-American at Ricks Junior College (now BYU-Idaho). He went 21-1 as a starter, including an 11-0 mark in 1994, when he threw for more than 3,000 yards, before transferring to Colorado State.

# TOM EHLERS

DIRECTOR OF FOOTBALL OPERATIONS | 31ST SEASON IN ATHLETICS | 27TH SEASON AT CSU

One of Colorado State's most passionate individuals, Tom Ehlers enters his 27th overall season in the Rams athletic department, and his 31st year overall in college athletics.

After a long career as a Rams student-athlete and assistant football coach, Ehlers took on a new role prior to the 2005 season, assuming supervision over the football program's logistics, administration and overall operations.

Originally a competitor on the gridiron as a four-year starter on the Rams' offensive and defensive lines, following his career he channelled his gregarious enthusiasm into the coaching profession. And now, including his chapter as director of operations, his tenure as a member of the football staff is the longest by an assistant in school history.

During his coaching career, he tutored 12 all-conference performers, including Bryan Save (2003), Peter Hogan (2001, '02), Clark Haggans (1999), Joey Porter (1998), Adrian Ross (1997), Brady Smith (1994, '95), Sean Moran (1994, '95), Steve Norton (1993), and Steve Hodge (1993).

Six of the players he formerly coached ranked in the top 10 in quarterback sacks, including Haggans (first), Smith (second), Porter (fourth), Hodge (tie, seventh), Ross (tie, seventh), and Moran (ninth).

In 2003, defensive tackles Bryan Save, Lavell Mann and Chris Kiffin all ranked among the conference leaders in quarterback sacks. In 2002, Peter Hogan was a first-team all-conference selection.

Porter, a current NFL star, was a first-team all-conference performer in 1998 and played in two postseason all-star games. He now plays for the Arizona Cardinals after having earned all-star honors as a member of the Pittsburgh Steelers, where he was also a member of a Super Bowl champion squad, and Miami Dolphins.

Ross was a two-time first-team all-conference selection in 1996 and '97 and played in the Hula Bowl following his senior season. He later played six years in the NFL as a member of the Cincinnati Bengals.

Smith and Moran each earned first-team honors in 1994 and '95. Smith was the conference's defensive player of the year in 1995. Both played extensively NFL.

Haggans initially played for the Pittsburgh Steelers, and was a member of the team's Super Bowl championship team, before signing with Arizona, who went to the Super Bowl in his first season there.

Ehlers also was responsible for recruiting Gartrell Johnson, who finished his CSU career with the second-most prolific rushing season in program annals.

Ehlers formerly served as a defensive line coach at Oregon State (1985-86) as a graduate assistant for the Beavers. In 1987, was a graduate assistant working with the defensive line at the University of Arizona.

As a player at Colorado State (1980-84), he was a four-year starter and letterwinner. Ehlers played offensive line and defensive line and was a WAC Scholar-Athlete Award Winner in 1984. On three occasions, he earned academic all-WAC honors.

Born July 10, 1962, in Riverside, Calif., he and his wife Laurie have three children, Annie, Christine and Timothy, and make their home in Fort Collins.

He graduated from Colorado State in 1985 with a bachelor's in business administration, before earning an MBA from Oregon State ('86).

As a coach, he has served as a United States Weightlifting Federation Club coach. He also is a member of the U.S. Weightlifting Federation, American College of Sports Medicine, and National Strength and Conditioning Association.

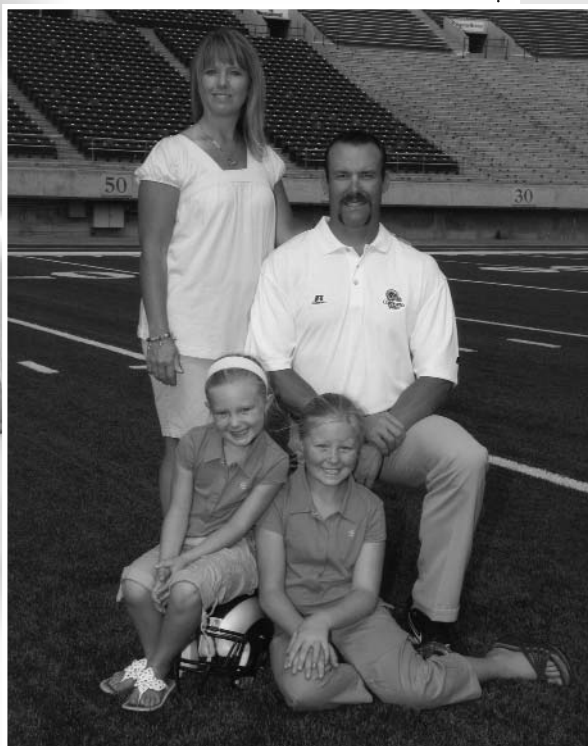

A four-year starter (2005-08) at Mesa State, Wikre played his first two seasons as a defensive tackle before moving to offensive guard for his final two years, earning all-conference honors as a junior and All-America honors as a senior, paving the way for fellow All-American RB Bobby Coy.

Midway through that 2008 campaign, a compound dislocation of his finger caused ligament damage that doctors told him would prevent his return that season. But to preserve his college career, Wikre chose to have his finger amputated. The surgery forced him to miss the only game of his career, but he returned and played in the final five contests. The story spawned features in Sports Illustrated, People, the New York Times, USA Today, Sunday NFL Countdown and ESPN The Magazine, as well as guest appearances on ESPN's First Take and Mike and Mike in the Morning.

An academic all-conference selection and the 2005 Defensive Freshman of the Year in the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference, Wikre as a prep was an all-state lineman at Berthoud (Colo.) High School. A regional champion, state-qualifier and all-conference selection as a wrestler, he also lettered as a first baseman in baseball.

A double major in physical education and adaptive physical education, he graduated from Mesa State in 2009, and has completed work toward his master's in education. **Rams Superstars Competition**

At the conclusion of each spring, the Rams' players look to show off their athletic skills at Moby Arena during the annual Rams Superstars Competition. The competition, pits CSU's offense vs. defense in an American Gladiators-style battle, determines which side of the ball will have bragging rights over the summer. Held in April or May before final exams, it is free to the public.

Since coming to CSU, Steve Fairchild has stressed the importance of competition for his Rams, as no position on the team is ever guaranteed, and score is kept between the two sides of the ball in almost every prac-

tice, and even in the weight room. The Superstars Competition is the last chance for the two units to battle until fall practice begins in August, so the winner will have the upper hand all summer. The winners also get served steak by the losers, who have to settle for franks 'n' beans.

The fun and fan-friendly competition was implemented by Fairchild in 2008 as an annual event to signify the end of spring football and the beginning of summer conditioning.

A combination of the NFL combine, NBA All-Star Saturday and pro wrestling, the Rams engage in several contests, such as a grueling ob-

stacle course, a tug of war, weight-lifting competitions, a slam-dunk challenge and other unique "strongman" battles.

Individuals from each unit are called out on the floor to demonstrate their physical abilities. Divided into one of three divisions by their position — skill weight (wide receivers and defensive backs), middle weight (tight ends, offensive backs and linebackers) and heavy weight (linemen) — players compete for offseason supremacy. The Moby Arena scoreboard tracks each unit's progress.

**GARY OZZELLO**

SENIOR ASSOCIATE ATHLETIC DIRECTOR/  
EXTERNAL OPERATIONS | 33RD YEAR AT CSU

Gary Ozzello enters his 33rd year in the Colorado State athletic department. He became a full-time employee on June 1, 1978.

Promoted to senior associate athletic director for external operations in the summer of 2003, Ozzello oversees the Rams' marketing, promotions, licensing and media relations efforts, as well as the ticket office. He also serves as the chief liaison to Nelligan Sports Marketing and works closely with the athletic development, donor relations and special events offices.

Ozzello, 54, had directed the day-to-day operations of Colorado State's media relations office for 28 years, until Director of Athletics Paul Kowalczyk reorganized that wing in the summer of 2007, allowing Ozzello to focus on supervising all of the athletic department's external affairs.

In April of 2000, then-President Albert C. Yates presented Ozzello with the university's Distinguished Alumni Award.

During nearly three decades directing media relations, including a tenure as an assistant athletic director (1986-2003), Ozzello publicized hundreds of outstanding CSU accomplishments. In addition, he served as the media coordinator for the 1999 NCAA men's basketball regional, and the 2004 tournament's first and second rounds, both in Denver. He also was a member of the 1994 U.S. Olympic Festival media staff and has volunteered at three men's basketball Final Fours, and more than a dozen regional and first- and second-round events.

Shortly after earning his degree, Ozzello joined the media relations office as its first-ever assistant director, in the summer of 1978. After his supervisor, Mike Mills, resigned in October 1979, Ozzello assumed acting sports information director duties for eight months before then-athletic director Fum McGraw removed the interim label from his title on June 27, 1980. One of Ozzello's first responsibilities was to promote the football team, whose quarterback was Steve Fairchild, now CSU's head coach. While earning his degree, he worked four years as a student assistant, originally hired by then-SID Tim Simmons.

Sold on Fort Collins and Colorado State as a junior in high school, Ozzello made his college choice after attending a summer basketball camp run by the late legendary Rams coach Jim Williams. A 1978 graduate, he owns a bachelor's degree in technical journalism, with a concentration in public relations. One of his fellow Class of '78 graduates at CSU was Bill Ritter, now Colorado's governor.

Born in Trinidad, Colo., Ozzello graduated in 1974 from La Junta (Colo.) High School, where was a standout athlete in both baseball and basketball.

Christine Susemihl is Colorado State's Senior Associate Athletics Director for Internal Operations and the department's Senior Woman Administrator (SWA).

Susemihl oversees academic student services, compliance, business operations, the training room, the weight room and 13 of the department's 16 intercollegiate sports.

In recognition of her administrative contributions to the athletics department, she was inducted into the CSU Sports Hall of Honor in 2008.

She is a certified peer-reviewer for the NCAA Division I Athletics Certification Program and served two elected terms as a member of the Board of Directors of the National Association for Athletics Compliance (NAAC). She also is a member of the Joint Council of the Mountain West Conference.

Susemihl serves as the department's equal employment opportunity coordinator and is a member of both the university's Diversity Council and Grievance Panel. She has served two terms as a university mediation officer and two terms as a member of the Administrative Professional Council.

Susemihl joined the staff in 1973. In addition to a myriad of administrative responsibilities over the years, she served as the school's interim Director of Athletics during searches that led to Mark Driscoll's appointment in August of 2003 and Paul Kowalczyk's appointment in May of 2006.

When then-President Albert C. Yates initially named her to this position in 2003, she became the first woman in university history to hold the title of Director of Athletics. She also instituted the department's first-ever NCAA compliance program and headed CSU's day-to-day compliance efforts from 1993 until accepting her internal operations duties in 2007.

After attending The Colorado College and Colorado State University, Susemihl received a degree in business administration from Regis University. A native of Grand Junction, Colo., she has lived in Fort Collins since 1970.

**JIM FRANCIS**

FACULTY ATHLETIC REPRESENTATIVE

G. James Francis, Ph.D., is in the first year of his second turn as Colorado State's faculty athletic representative to the NCAA.

Designated by President Tony Frank, Francis represents Colorado State and its faculty in its relationships with the NCAA and Mountain West Conference. He is one of five recognized individuals authorized to make contact with the NCAA membership services staff, and plays an important role in the well-being of student-athletes. He also serves as the senior faculty advisor to the President, and as a vital communications link between the athletics department and faculty.

A professor and director of the Center for Professional Development and Business Research in CSU's College of Business, Francis during his first tenure as FAR (1985-95) was a member of the NCAA Council, the secretary/treasurer and member of the board of directors of the College Football Association, and president of the Mountain-Pacific Sports Federation.

Involved in athletics in some capacity for most of his life, Francis lettered in four sports as a college athlete. He also has coached baseball and basketball at all levels from grade school to high school.

Today, he serves on the Colorado Senior Sports Development Council and coaches track for Special Olympics and Masters Athletes, and remains competitive in track with the Masters organization, having earned All-America honors in the outdoor pentathlon and 400 meters.

Francis has taught management classes at the graduate and undergraduate levels, has been an owner/operator of two small businesses, and has worked for a Fortune 100 firm in organization development. As a management consultant to clients in the private and public sectors, he has worked with a wide variety of businesses and organizations and has served on boards of directors and advisory councils for corporations, public institutions and not-for-profit organizations. Currently, he holds the national reins of Sigma Iota Epsilon, the professional and student honorary of the Academy of Management.

Jim and his wife, Sandra, live in Ft. Collins and have two grown children. A native of Yale, Iowa, he holds two degrees from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, diplomas in management/organizational behavior (Ph.D.) and industrial relations (M.A.). He completed his undergraduate work with a B.A. in economics from Central College of Iowa. The author or co-author of three books, he has written more than 50 articles and professional papers, and has been the principal investigator on research grants eclipsing \$5 million.





**MIKE LaPLANTE**

ASSOCIATE ATHLETIC DIRECTOR/  
DEVELOPMENT | SEVENTH YEAR AT CSU

Mike LaPlante kicks off his seventh year at Colorado State. He joined the athletic department on April 1, 2004.

LaPlante, 39, is charged with coordinating development efforts and the cultivation of major gifts in support of the university's 16 sports. His experience in athletics in general and with donor cultivation and development has played a critical role in the growth of Colorado State's athletic program.

Leading five staff members in the areas of development, special events, donor relations and the Ram Club, CSU's annual fund, his group's collective focus is on expanding the department's efforts to provide student-athletes and coaches the resources necessary to compete at the highest levels nationally.

LaPlante has led numerous fundraising efforts, most recently leading athletics fundraising initiatives as part of the university's Campaign for Colorado State, a seven-year, \$500 million effort. Thus far, the athletics department has raised \$20 million toward this effort, including the department's newest buildings, a spectacular indoor practice facility and an academic and training center, both of which opened in Fall 2009. Previously, he has led efforts to enhance athletic facilities such as the Jack Christiansen Track facility, the Joey Porter Locker Room and the building of an indoor golf practice facility, the Harmony Center.

In addition to the facility improvements, LaPlante has directed vast improvements for the department, including significant growth in the Ram Legacy of Champions scholarship program, the Junior Ram Club and the Varsity Athletes Club. LaPlante has also led an effort to increase the number of scholarship endowments and estate gifts to athletics. Additionally, LaPlante has played a key role in expanding CSU's reach into the Denver market, home to more than 43,000 alumni, by adding a full-time staff member to operate a Denver development effort. In Spring 2010, LaPlante led the implementation of the Ram Point System to reward fans for their loyal support of CSU Athletics.

LaPlante was promoted to associate athletic director in the fall of 2007. He came to Colorado State after having held a similar position at Cal Poly, where he was associate athletic director for advancement (2000-04). In that role, he oversaw marketing, sponsorship sales and fundraising, and directed a university-wide campaign for athletics that eventually surpassed a goal of \$12 million. Prior to his time at Cal Poly, LaPlante served as assistant director of the Aztec Athletic Foundation at San Diego State University. He began his athletic administration career at SDSU in 1993 as an intern in the marketing and development area.

A 1993 graduate of Bowling Green State University, he owns a bachelor's degree in sport management. Born in Toledo, Ohio, he graduated from the city's St. John's High School.

LaPlante and his wife Korin have three children, sons Will and Griffin, and daughter Georgia.

**DOUG MAX**

ASSOCIATE ATHLETIC DIRECTOR/  
FACILITIES & SCHEDULING | 31ST YEAR AT CSU

Doug Max enters his 31st year at Colorado State. Then-AD Fum McGraw named him to the CSU staff as head track and field coach on Aug. 23, 1980.

Max is responsible for all athletic facilities, including the McGraw Athletic Center, Moby Arena, Sonny Lubick Field at Hughes Stadium and the Jack Christiansen Track, where he spent 19 seasons (1980-99) as head coach. He also works with the university's concessions and game management staffs.

In addition, he oversees the athletic video office as well as CSU's equipment room and its staff. During his tenure in the Rams' athletic administration, he also has coordinated football team travel.

Max has been instrumental in more than \$45 million of athletic facilities enhancements, including the building of the McGraw Center and major renovations of the Rams' football stadium and home track.

Soon after Paul Kowalczyk became Director of Athletics in 2006, he and Max worked to turn CSU's new athletic facilities, buildings critical to future success, from conception to reality. Max oversaw the construction of the two buildings, a \$7 million academic and training center, and \$13 million indoor practice facility, both of which opened in the fall of 2009. In 1997, Max served as Colorado State's interim athletic director.

Max joined the administration in May of 1999, when CSU named him assistant AD for facilities and operations. He became an associate AD in 2004. In nearly two decades as head coach at Colorado State, he earned a reputation as one of the country's finest track and field mentors, producing an extensive list of All-Americans, including Shelly Greathouse-Borrman, Bryan Berryhill and Casey Malone. Greathouse-Borrman won five All-America certificates. Berryhill, now head coach of CSU's cross country program, won the 2001 NCAA indoor mile and recorded the nation's fastest outdoor time in the 1,500 meters. Malone won the 1998 NCAA discus title, the program's first men's track crown since 1952, then went on to compete in the 2006 Athens Olympics. He also recruited the program's successful current coach, Brian Bedard.

Prior to returning to his alma mater before the 1980-81 academic year, Max was an assistant at Western Kentucky (1979). He also served four years (1975-78, '80) as the head coach at Estes Park (Colo.) High School.

A Colorado State hurdler from 1971-75, he earned four letters and missed qualifying for the 1972 Olympic trials. In 2003, Max was inducted into the CSU Hall of Fame for his contributions to the athletic department. He also won Western Athletic Conference Coach of the Year honors.

Max owns both a bachelor's degree in physical education (CSU '75) and a master's in education (Western Kentucky '80). A native of Sioux City, Iowa, he graduated from Greeley (Colo.) West High School.

He and his wife Cindy make their home in Fort Collins and have three children, daughters Jordan and Rachael, and son Joel.

**MATT BREWER**

ASSISTANT ATHLETIC DIRECTOR/  
COMPLIANCE | FOURTH YEAR AT CSU

Matt Brewer is in his fourth year with the Colorado State athletic department. He joined the Rams on June 4, 2007, and was promoted to assistant athletic director in 2009.

Brewer, 31, works with every area of the department in overseeing CSU's compliance with NCAA and Mountain West Conference rules and regulations. He educates the staff on new NCAA legislation and rules interpretations, in addition to assisting the registrar's office and athletic faculty representative in certifying student-athletes each term.

Working with student-athletes before and after they first arrive on campus, Brewer coordinates official visits, evaluates their transcripts, verifies official national letter of intent documents, and assists with the admission process. Also, in the first and second rounds of the 2008 NCAA men's basketball tournament held in Denver and co-hosted by the university, he worked the full week with Michigan State's squad as a team host. What's more, each spring he serves as the softball public address announcer at Ram Field.

A Pacific Northwest native, Brewer joined the CSU team from Washington State, where he served as assistant director of compliance (2006-07), compliance coordinator (2004-06) and compliance assistant (2003-04). He got his start in the field at Arizona State, where he completed a compliance/marketing internship in 2000.

A captain on the Whitman College baseball team, Brewer was a four-year starter and two-time all-conference selection. In addition, he represented the team on Whitman's student-athlete advisory council (SAAC).

Brewer owns a bachelor's degree in sociology (Whitman '02) and a master's of education with an emphasis in athletic administration from Washington State ('05).

The media relations staff, including two assistant directors and 15 student assistants, is responsible for the publicity of all 16 intercollegiate sports, including press releases, game notes, media guides and national honors campaigns. The office also manages content and maintenance of the department's official Web site (CSURams.com), press credentials, press conferences, and press-box and press-row operations, while serving as a liaison between the local and national media and the athletic department.

Gilbert, 34, is only the second person to direct CSU's media relations over the last three decades. Dr. Rocci Trumper is an orthopaedic surgeon, fellowship trained in sports medicine. He devotes his practice to evaluating and treating knee injuries in athletes of all ages. Dr. Trumper's sports background and competitive nature help him understand the importance of returning from an injury safely and quickly. His goal is to help patients recover from injury in order to achieve their goals. Dr. Trumper is a native of Holyoke, Colo.

# RAMS BID TO RETURN TO WINNING WAYS

*CSU loaded at running back, loses only two starters on defense*

**R**ewind the clock to Dec. 11. Before players began final exams and on one of the rare days he wasn't out of town recruiting, Steve Fairchild held his last team meeting of the 2009 season.

Like a cloudless, low-humidity day in Colorado, he could not have been more clear.

"We will evaluate everything," Fairchild told a room without '09 seniors, "every aspect of this program, every decision we made last year, and every individual – including myself – and things will change. Let me be perfectly clear, we will get this straightened out.

"We will not settle for another 3-9. It will not happen again."

And with that, in the Times Square of CSU football, the ball dropped and a new year began.

Fairchild and his staff proceeded to finalize CSU's highest-rated recruiting class since Rivals.com began its annual rankings, and players returned Jan. 19 to begin their offseason conditioning and year-long quest for the Mountain West Conference championship.

Front and center in both the recruiting class and the offseason conditioning program was true freshman Pete Thomas. The Signing Day headliner and the catalyst in an explosion of excitement within the Rams' fanbase, Thomas had already graduated from Valhalla High School in El Cajon, Calif., and enrolled at CSU, so he could immediately begin competing for the Rams' starting job in spring practice.

Those spring drills kicked off the third year of Steve Fairchild's tenure as head coach in 2010.

The team exceeded preseason expectations in Year 1, when the Rams registered their first winning season in five years behind conference rushing champion and NFL Draft selection Gartrell Johnson. The Rams fell short of expectations in Year 2, when they opened 3-0 and were earning votes in both major polls before injuries and a brutal conference-opening schedule sent them on the road to a disappointing finish.

So if the Rams surpassed expectations in Year 1, then fell short in Year 2, what are expectations for Year 3?

"For the first three years of our program," Fairchild said, "all I'm interested in is, 'Are we getting better?'. Since our first spring practice March 25, we've had to take every opportunity we have on the field to improve. That's what we did in '08. I don't know that we did that in '09 as effectively. As long as we keep taking steps, and keep improving, I'll be satisfied.

"Eventually we've got to beat one of the elite teams in the league. I just think the last two years, just like this upcoming year, we knew we were going to have to scratch and

claw and do everything we can to compete and find a way to win close games."

Winning those close games, something in which the Rams excelled in 2008, eluded their grasp in 2009, when CSU lost four contests by a touchdown or less. The Rams are intent on returning to their winning ways in that category.

"We just need one more stop, defensively, a couple times, and one more play, offensively, a couple times, and we just didn't get that last year," Fairchild said. "You can search forever to determine why you're not getting those plays, but the only way I know how to get them is to go at and practice at such a fevered pace so we get them consistently on the practice field, and once we do that, they'll transfer into games."

To take those steps this season, the Rams will first have to answer several questions, most noticeably on the offensive side of the ball, where only four starters return. Which freshman, Thomas or redshirt Nico Ranieri, will start at quarterback? Once they settle on a starter, who will serve as his primary passing targets? Who will protect him?

Defense, where all but two starters return, doesn't present as many personnel questions. And that experience is one of the many positives the Rams can build upon in rising from a 3-9 campaign.

"We had a lot of guys who got playing time, because of various injuries here and there," Fairchild said. "A lot of guys got a chance to play. Therefore, we have some guys coming back this year who have been on the field a lot, so that's a positive. It reaffirms how close 3-9 and 9-3 are. It gives us some motivation to finish games in better fashion. It's been a very good motivating factor in our offseason program."

That offseason program for the first time has members of the Class of 2009, the first class he and his staff signed after a full year's efforts. Officially, Fairchild signed his first recruiting class in February 2008, less than two months after returning to Fort Collins. This spring, those classes were on the same field competing against each other for the first time, and coaches are excited that they finally have the opportunity to see the fruits of their recruiting labor.

"We've obviously got some good, young talent in the program now," Fairchild said. "I've always viewed this as a multi-year building process. This season is another great opportunity to get better, continue to improve our program. As long as we're getting better, I'm quite confident we will get to the top of the Mountain West Conference."

## OFFENSE

For the first time in several years, the Rams entered spring with question marks all over their offensive depth chart. This much they know: They're absolutely loaded at running back, a great starting point considering their program identity as a power running team. They also have a solid returning starter at tight end in senior Eric Peitz. But jobs are up for grabs at wide re-

ceiver, where they lost both starters, quarterback, where they enter a third straight spring without a definite starter, and offensive line, where they need to replace four of five starters.

As early as this season, the Rams' backfield could have a pair of players who were four-star athletes coming out of high school in Thomas and UCLA transfer Raymond Carter.

**Quarterback:** Most eyes, those of coaches and fans alike, were on the quarterback position when the first whistle blew at spring practice March 25. Always vowing to start the player that gave the Rams the best chance to win, Fairchild in each of his first two seasons went with a fifth-year senior.

But things will be different this year. For the first time since Caleb Hanie in 2006, the Rams should start an underclassman under center, and for the first time since Hanie in 2004, that QB should be a freshman. That player could be Ranieri, the 2007 Central Florida Player of the Year Ranieri, or it could be Thomas. The other candidate is junior Klay Kubiak, who looks to rebound from October shoulder surgery.

"In the offseason," Fairchild said, "our goal with Pete was to get him to the point where he will have a chance to compete. It is a very complex position, and he is fresh out of high school, so with relatively no experience, we're going to try to put him in a position where he can compete for the starting job this spring. We've got some good, young talent at that spot, just like a lot of spots, and eventually we're going to be pretty good there, but we're going to have to develop in a hurry."

**Running back:** Whoever emerges as the CSU signal-caller, behind him will be one of the deepest backfields in the nation.

The Rams return 92 percent of their rushing yards, including the accumulations of leading ground gainer Leonard Mason (766 yards in '09), primary starter John Mosure (650) and Lou Greenwood (147), whose talent led coaches to play him as a true freshman in 2009. Add to that trio UCLA transfer Raymond Carter, a speedy junior eligible after sitting out '09, along with redshirt freshman bulldozer Chris Nwoke, and CSU's rushing attack is among the most formidable in the Mountain West.

"We're always going to try to be a power-running type of football team," Fairchild said. "We'll see how that plays out, whether we employ more of a committee or give it to one guy. If somebody like Gartrell two years ago takes a lead role, he'll be our go-to guy. With Kyle Bell (in 2008), I never thought that would happen heading into that season, but Gartrell took it. That could certainly be the case again this year, because he was really hot that year, but we'll see how it unfolds."

The first twist in the plot to unfold is Greenwood, a playmaker the Rams want to see with the ball in his hands often. Coaches moved him to wide receiver, mainly because of the depth CSU enjoys at running back.

**Wide receiver:** Greenwood's move gives the Rams something they lack at wide receiver, experience. While the Rams return everyone at running back, they lost both starters and 1,227 of their yards at receiver. Decimated by graduation, if the Rams can achieve production at the position in 2010, it will be a remarkable surprise because including players that played the position in 2009, the group has a combined six career starts, five by 5-foot-9 Tyson Liggett, and one by Borcky.

Including two receivers who have played other positions previously, Greenwood and Borcky, the group has just 48 career catches, Liggett's 20, Greenwood's 13, Borcky's eight, Matt Yemm's five and Byron Steele's two.

A former prep quarterback, Liggett already owns a playmaker reputation on the coaching staff, after making a splash during the 2009 season, when he went off for 156 yards on 11 receptions against No. 19 BYU and against SDSU made one of the more spectacular plays of the year when he caught a one-handed pass from Grant Stucker then weaved through defenders for a 40-yard touchdown. A senior, Liggett took full advantage of his opportunity this past spring and enters the fall as a leader at the position.

Steele, a sophomore, opened spring opposite Liggett at the top of the depth chart. Another sophomore, Marquise Law, also will get opportunities at the position. At 6-foot-3 and 6-foot-4,

respectively, Steele and Law provide the team with prototype receivers who are not only fast, but tall enough to make tough catches over defenders.

Borcky began the spring taking the first reps as the CSU quarterback, but returned to receiver less than halfway through April. Recruited as a quarterback out of Orlando, the big target is one of the most athletic players on the team. He volunteered to move to receiver in 2008.

And, if the need arises once fall arrives, the Rams won't hesitate to use one of several immensely talented wideouts from their recruiting class of 2010.

**Tight end/fullback:** The Rams have dominated in the run game the past two seasons, despite changing starting tailbacks. The one constant has been lead blocker Zac Pauga, a senior fullback and captain-to-be in 2010. And in addition to his highly trusted blocking assignments, Pauga last season

saw more of something than ever before – the ball. He averaged 3.7 yards on the first 15 carries of his career, in addition to his 25 catches (tied for second on the team and most among returning players) for 219 yards and three TDs, all career bests.

At tight end, the Rams are equally secure with Peitz, who opens spring at 100 percent after a Week 9 shoulder injury truncated his 2009 campaign. Plus, three talented redshirt freshmen – Matt Weems, Joe Brown and Cameron Moss – led coaches to move senior Adam Seymore from tight end to defensive line.

**Offensive line:** In 2009, the Rams had the deepest offensive line in the country, with four senior starters. In 2010, they have one of the most inexperienced.

First, the good news: Guard Shelley Smith, a sixth-round selection in April's NFL Draft, sustained a high-ankle sprain on the eve of the 2009 season. That opened the door for Jake Gdowski, a junior this year, to start the season's first four games in Smith's place, helping the Rams to a 3-1 record. Gdowski should fill one of the four voids on the CSU line.

What's more, senior Mark Starr, an athletic lineman with 16 career starts, should occupy another void, at strongside tackle, opposite the line's only returning starter, weakside tackle Paul Madsen.

That leaves only two positions whose candidates have little or no starting experience. At cen-

ter, junior Tyler McDermott will get the first reps, while at strongside guard, senior Ryan Griffith – a converted tackle – and senior Connor Smith, a transfer from Northwestern, will get the initial looks with the first team.

“I like our young offensive line,” Fairchild said, “but there’s not a lot of experience there right now, so we’re going to have to develop in a hurry.”

Youngsters to watch on that line include tackles Joe Caprioglio, Justin Becker and Jared Biard, guard Brandon Haynes and center Weston Richburg.

### DEFENSE

When Fairchild accepted CSU’s offer to become head coach in December 2007, he was careful to keep his defensive goals in healthy perspective, his only expectation that the unit get better, athletically, every season.

“We took a step that first year (2008),” Fairchild said, “and if you look at the beginning of last year we took another step up, and then with injuries we couldn’t sustain it. But I’d like to think that we will make another step forward there on that side of the ball. We’ve got a lot of experience on defense.”

CSU lost only two starters on defense, DT James Morehead and CB

Nick Oppenheer. The Rams return 82 percent of their 2009 tackles, 85 percent of tackles for

loss, 83 percent of their sacks, 100 percent of their forced fumbles and 88 percent of their fumble recoveries.

And like running back, the Rams add to an already loaded area with a talented player sidelined in 2009: Ricky Brewer, a legitimate NFL prospect who was an all-conference linebacker and CSU’s leading tackler in 2008 before a year-long suspension.

**Defensive line:** Several seniors, complemented by richly talented underclassmen, should give the Rams a solid defensive front in 2010. Cory Macon and Guy Miller return to their respective starting roles, at defensive end and nose tackle. Senior Ty Whittier, a versatile veteran who has started on both the inside and outside of the line, moved back inside to open the spring and competed with Nuku Latu at the spot vacated by Morehead.

But count on sophomore C.J. James, who played as a true freshman and flashed enormous potential in 2009, and redshirt freshman Curtis Wilson to see plenty of reps and push, if not supplant, the starters. Also, keep an eye on sophomore Ben Tedford and a pair of converted offensive players, former tight ends Seymore and Broderick Sargent.

Including former linebacker Davis Burl, the third player new to the line this season, the Rams have several speedy options at defensive end. In a moment of serendipity, soon after coaches moved Burl closer to the ball, the Rams sustained a big blow. Sophomore Zach Tiedgen, a seven-game starter in 2009 slowed by a shoulder injury this past spring, needed May knee surgery after an injury during a pick-up

basketball game and was lost for the year.

**Linebacker:** Since he was a freshman All-American in 2008, Mychal Sisson has slowly cemented himself as one of the most exciting players in the Mountain West. Now, entering his junior year, the second-team all-conference selection is poised to reach previously unattainable heights.

Sisson replaced Brewer in 2009 at the playmaking weakside position and now stands just 116 tackles from the program’s career top 10. After welcoming back Brewer, defensive coordinator Larry Kerr will open the fall with Brewer back at the weakside position, and Sisson returning to cover the strongside of the formation, where he starred as a redshirt freshman in 2008 before flipping sides in ’09.

Alex Williams, who played through injuries to both knees in ’09, returns to full health to reclaim his starting middle linebacker role. Meanwhile, two players who picked up invaluable starting experience as redshirt freshmen last year, James Skelton and Chris Gipson, figure only to improve as sophomores.

In addition to Brewer, CSU also returns Michael Kawulok, a junior back from a knee injury. Kawulok will see time at both the middle and strongside positions.

And, in an effort to combat the spread offenses the Rams see in most of their Mountain West opponents, true freshman Mike Orakpo has moved from safety to outside linebacker. A grayshirt, Orakpo enrolled this past January and went through spring drills with the Rams.

**Defensive secondary:** CSU struggled on defense in 2009, primarily due to injury, but the silver lining in those injuries was the playing time they allotted to several youngsters, especially in the secondary.

Two of those players, junior strong safety Ivory Herd and senior cornerback DeAngelo Wilkinson, will depend on the foundation they laid as injury replacements in the Rams’ lineup last year when they open fall as starters for the first time. Senior safety Travis Ford and sophomore cornerback Marcus Shaw also saw valuable time in filling injury voids last season.

Free safety Elijah-Blu Smith, a consistent spark for the Rams since he replaced an injured Clint Kubiak midway through the ’08 season, figures to emerge as a leader during his junior season. For the first time since their days at Crenshaw High School in Los Angeles, Smith will be on the same field with Carter. Don’t be surprised to see both players in headlines this fall, Smith for his growing reputation as one of the game’s most physical safeties.

Momo Thomas, another gifted playmaker, returns to start opposite Wilkinson at left corner. Also



watch for two talented redshirt freshmen, cornerback Immanuel Mitchell and safety Ezra Thompson, to ascend and compete for playing time.

### SPECIAL TEAMS

Fairchild surprised no one several days before fall camp opened last year when he pronounced prep All-American Pete Kontodiakos his opening day punter. After an up-and-down true freshman campaign, the Rams will look for more consistency from their big-leg punter.

The Rams have plenty of confidence in Ben DeLine’s place-kicking. In his first full season as the team’s primary kicker last year, DeLine hit 12-of-16 field goals, including 4-of-5 from 40-plus yards. He struggled, however, on his kickoffs and midway through ’09, CSU brought in reserve Chad VanderMolen to serve as a kickoff specialist. Special teams coordinator Larry Lewis is prepared to enter 2010 with DeLine and VanderMolen in the same roles.

Lewis is not prepared, however, to list anyone as definite kickoff and punt returner this early in the football year, be-

cause there are simply too many candidates entering fall. When the Rams open in the Rocky Mountain Showdown against Colorado Sept. 4, Lewis expects to have selected a pair of kickoff returners from a six-man group consisting of Mosure, Carter, Nwoke, Greenwood, Momo Thomas and RB Derek Good. His top candidates to return punts are Momo Thomas, Liggett and Greenwood.

For the third straight year, the Rams enter a season confident in their long-snapper, Scott Albritton, now a senior. And Yemm, a quarterback at Fort Collins High School, returns to his holding duties for placements.

Fairchild would not be surprised if the Rams are able to shock everyone and rebound to challenge for the conference title this year. After all, 20 years ago this fall, Greg Primus caught a 49-yard touchdown from Mike Gimenez and Todd Yert ran 52 yards for another score – all in the fourth quarter – to lead CSU to a come-from-behind, 32-31 triumph in the Freedom Bowl over heavily favored Oregon. It was the program’s first bowl season in four decades, and no one outside Fort Collins expected it to happen.

But realistically, Fairchild knows the team still has a lot of work to do. And one thing’s certain, CSU will definitely put in the work.

“No one should ever question our work ethic as long as I’m here,” he said. “There’s some inexperience at certain spots, still, but I see us taking steps. Every time we do something, every time we recruit, every time we go through spring ball, eventually it’s going to come together. I hope it’s in 2010, but if not, I know we’re doing the right things, and we will get there.”

## STEVE FAIRCHILD QUOTES

Following final spring game; April 24, 2010

**On the spring performance of his two freshman QBs:** "I thought considering all the situations that we tried to practice over the last 15 practices, with all the live stuff we have done and the volume of offense we have tried to put in for two kids who were in high school last year, and a young offensive line, I expected them to be a little more in disarray at times, but I thought we got some good work done."

**On depth:** "When you take Mark Starr (chest) out from the offensive line that makes more reps for some of the other guys, and you take Eric Peitz (finger) out, I know some of the young tight ends got a lot more reps all spring. I think we developed some depth on defense because of our injuries last year. We have a lot of guys that played some snaps; we are not that way offensively right now. We are kind of trying to find out who our starters are, let alone who is going to play those key backup roles. So, we still have to make some decisions on the offensive line with who starts and who will be our sixth, seventh and eighth guy, then obviously at quarterback and at receiver. In all those areas we have talented kids; I am just not comfortable with going into a game as we speak, but as I said there is still some time."

**How he feels about the QB situation now as compared to a year ago:** "I like our talent level right now. I know two years ago, coming out of the spring, we didn't complete a pass; I was distraught. Billy Farris developed and played fairly well for us. We kind of figured out what he could do. Last year, it wasn't just quarterbacks, it was our entire football team offensively; it was very, very inconsistent. I never felt like we got into a good rhythm. We are probably a little more consistent right now, but again, that is the beauty of football; it is all intertwined and it's not like these young quarterbacks have that line we had last year. The line is going to have to develop, the quarterbacks are going to have to develop and we are going to get a little more experienced at receiver. I think we are going to be very good at quarterback here pretty quick, but there is going to be a process that we are going to have to go through."

**On his concerns with such a young offensive line:** "It's a big concern. You know, we have had a real luxury here for the two years I have been here, and I am not sure that I am overstating it, but I'm not sure there was a much better line in college football than what we had here last year. I don't know the status of the free agents, but I still think all four of those guys should be in an NFL camp. That was a talented group and they played well the last couple of years for us. I don't think people realize, and again because of how poorly we played at times on offense last year, how good that front was. But, now it is our job to develop and come up with another offensive line. I do think that we are going to be very good there, like quarterback, eventually. We have some good young players. We just have to keep working and developing and get as much experience as we can through the summer and the practices we have in August."

**On long-term stability and what he is looking for in a QB:** "That is part of it, but I still think we are always going to play the quarterback here that I think gives us the best chance to win, and if that is a fifth-year senior or a true freshman, that's who we want to line up with on the field. I think we owe it to our fans, the program and the seniors to do that. I think right now, it is probably one of those two young guys (Ranieri or Thomas) that gives us the best chance to win."

**On LB Ricky Brewer:** "No. 1, he is a very good player. He adds to our athletic ability on defense. He is a proven player. No. 2, he has some tremendous leadership skills. I think our kids feed off of him being out there. He is a big part of what we do, and I have said all along that I am just so darn proud of him taking something that was a negative and really turning it into a positive. Ricky Brewer has done everything right, not just on the football field but in the classroom and off the field. I am just very proud of him."

**On what he has learned about the football team this spring:** "That we have a great attitude. I think they are a tight group and that there is good leadership. Like I said all along, I think we need to get experienced in a hurry in some spots to be competitive. We are not there right now, but I like our chances. It is fun to go out there with a good group of kids."

**2009 (Junior):** Did not play; was suspended prior to the season by the NCAA...Spent the season as a scout-team linebacker and did not miss a practice from August through the end of the year.

**2008 (Sophomore):** A sophomore All-American (CollegeFootballNews.com) and honorable-mention all-MWC choice, played and started 12 games for the Rams at his new position, weakside linebacker...Led the team and ranked fifth in the MWC with 8.7 tackles per game (104 total, 56 solo)...Also had 5½ tackles for loss, four QB hurries and one forced fumble...In season opener vs. Colorado (Aug. 31), posted a game-high 11 tackles (coaches film credited him with 17), in addition to a fourth-quarter hurry that produced a third-down incompletion and forced a field-goal attempt...Also produced a game-high 11 tackles in CSU's first win, vs. Sacramento State (Sept. 6), including a big third-down stick to halt a drive late in the first half...In dramatic win vs. Houston (Sept. 20), put his helmet on the ball to force a second-half fumble from RB Bryce Beall; teammate Mike Pagnotta recovered to halt Houston, who was moving the ball efficiently at the time...At Cal (Sept. 27), injured his ankle early in the contest but still played the entire game...Dressed but did not play the following week vs. UNLV (Oct. 4), as coaches chose to rest the ankle...Returned to his starting role vs. TCU (Oct. 11)...At No. 14 Utah (Oct. 18), made a nice block to help Nick Oppenheer on a 55-yard interception return, setting up a second-quarter field goal that cut Utah's lead to 14-10...In 38-34 win at San Diego State (Oct. 25), made a pair of first-quarter tackles inside the Rams' 5-yard line, including a tackle for loss; later, combined with Mychal Sisson to hurry the Aztecs into a third-down incompletion...In tough, 45-42 loss vs. No. 17 BYU (Nov. 1), combined with John Clark to stuff RB Harvey Unga on fourth-and-1 from the CSU 3-yard line in the second quarter, preserving a 14-7 Rams lead...At Air Force (Nov. 8), collected a game and career-high 15 tackles (six solo); shot through his gap on the game's first play to drop RB Asher Clark for a 2-yard loss, then on the next snap combined with Jake Galusha to throw Asher for a 7-yard loss...In second

quarter of big win vs. New Mexico (Nov. 15), with CSU protecting a 3-0 lead, combined to stop Rodney Ferguson for no gain on third-and-1, forcing a punt...In win at Wyoming (Nov. 22) that made CSU bowl eligible, matched his career best with 15 stops (two solo); thwarted the Cowboys' first drive by combining to drop Wynel Seldon on third down, and later in the first half, stopped Seldon for no gain to force an eventual punt, then blasted him for a 1-yard loss, nearly forcing a fumble...Coaches love his non-stop motor, noting that if a player misses a tackle, the second guy there always seems to be Brewer...Moved in the spring by the new coaching staff from strongside to weakside linebacker...In first career bowl game, a New Mexico Bowl triumph vs. Fresno State (Dec. 20), had 10 tackles and two stops for loss -- both game highs; his two tackles behind the line of scrimmage were a single-game career best...Dropped Chastin West for an 8-yard loss early in the second quarter, forcing an eventual punt; then, on the first play of the fourth quarter with CSU trailing 28-20, blasted Lonyae Miller for a 1-yard loss (the Rams would intercept Fresno State two plays later).

**2007 (Freshman):** Instrumental in the Rams' defense, finished third on the team with 64 tackles (31 solo), despite not playing in two games; also had three tackles for loss, ½ sack, one pass broken up and two forced fumbles...Two of his top three tackle totals came in CSU wins (the Rams were 3-9 on the year)...His 0.20 forced fumbles per game ranked sixth in the Mountain West...Started each of the final eight games, and played nearly every defensive series over the final nine contests, at strong-side linebacker...Since first coming off the bench in Game 4 to play an impact role on defense, averaged 7.1 stops per game, second the team over that span...Parlayed a strong spring into the Mountain West media's choice as the conference preseason Freshman of the Year...Battled for the starting role at SLB during fall camp but actually began the regular season third on the depth chart...Unfazed despite the preseason hype, amazed coaches by how he mentally handled the situation...Coaches had planned to play him vs. No. 10 Cal (Sept. 8), but a broken finger on his right hand sustained during pregame warmups forced doctors to surgically repair the bone and cast the hand in the CSU locker room; he still was available to play, but coaches opted to keep him sidelined...Instead, made his college debut, with a cast on his hand, in Game 3 at Houston (Sept. 22)...Then, at TCU (Sept. 29), saw extensive playing time from the game's first series, collecting his initial eight college tackles (four solo); also broke up a pass...Made his first career start, vs. San Diego State (Oct. 6); combined with Jeff Horinek to sack Kevin O'Connell on third-and-goal, forcing the Aztecs to settle for a third-quarter field goal...Led the team with nine tackles (four solo) in CSU's first win, at UNLV (Oct. 20)...At BYU (Nov. 3) contributed seven stops, including 1½ for loss...In home victory over Georgia Southern (Nov. 17), set a career high with 12 tackles (five solo) and forced an early fumble on his own 3-yard line; teammate Erik Sandie recovered, killing an ominous GSU drive, and the Rams drove 97 yards to take a 7-0 lead en route to a 28-3 halftime advantage...Finished a solid year with seven stops (three solo) in big win vs. Wyoming (Nov. 23); early in the second half, with CSU protecting a 17-14 lead, dropped the Cowboys for a 1-yard loss on a drive that ended in a missed field-goal attempt.

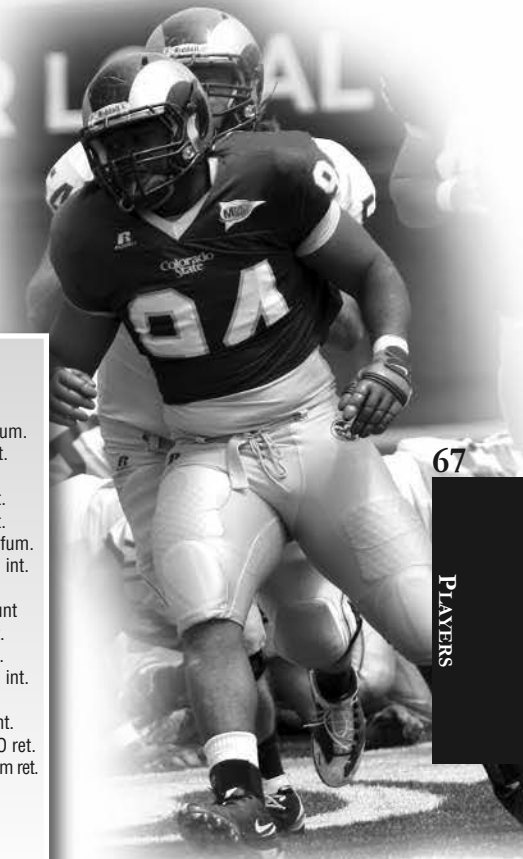
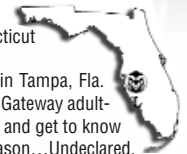

He helped the school to its first bowl, the Raisin Bowl following the '48 season, and nearly won the game with touchdown runs of 71 and 79 yards.

**48 Thurman "Fum" McGraw** — Fum McGraw is the most recognized athlete in university history. He was the first player to earn consensus All-America honors in football in 1948 and '49, and later played professionally for the Detroit Lions. McGraw also was a coach and athletic administrator at his alma mater. He was the school's director of athletics from 1976-86.

**2009 (Junior):** A junior-college transfer, played in 10 games, with four starts at running back...Led the team in rushing with 156 carries for 791 yards (4.9 avg.), and two TDs...Also had six receptions for 30 yards...In his Division I debut, was a catalyst in the Rams' landmark 23-17 win at Colorado (Sept. 6), rushing for 107 yards on 23 carries (4.7 avg.)...Picked up 5 yards to convert a key third-down on a first-quarter touchdown drive; later, followed blockers to gain 16 yards on a third-quarter carry to remove the Rams from the shadow of their own goal...Finally, on the first play after CSU recovered an onside kick late in the game, sealed the Buffs' fate with a reverberating 44-yard sweep down the right sideline...For his efforts, earned Player of the Week honors from the Colorado chapter of the National Football Foundation...Made his first Division I start in 24-23 win vs. Weber State (Sept. 12) and collected 66 yards on 16 carries (4.1 avg.), including a 14-yard run around right tackle that helped set up a CSU touchdown...Started in a 35-20 win vs. Nevada (Sept. 19), and on a 7-yard run that began a 79-yard TD drive in the second half, moved the pile 5 yards by himself after initial contact...In conference-opening loss at No. 19 BYU (Sept. 26), on a third-quarter scoring drive, carried four times for 24 yards, concluding the march with his first Division I touchdown, a 5-yard blast off right tackle; set up the score with a 13-yard gallop...Ran point on the Rams' rushing attack in bitter 31-29 loss at Idaho (Oct. 3), averaging 4.7 yards per carry (18-for-85) against the WAC's top rushing offense, including a 15-yard burst

in the second quarter...Started in 24-17 loss vs. Utah (Oct. 10), and registered an early career high with 130 yards on 24 carries (5.4 avg.); converted a third-and-1 on a game-tying field-goal drive in the second quarter, and another third-and-1 out of the locker room to set up his go-ahead touchdown, in which he walked in untouched...On CSU's next possession, set up another TD by converting a fourth-and-1 with an incredible dive, keeping his body parallel to the ground, to move the chains; replay upheld the ruling and took a timeout from Utah, who challenged the spot...Also pancaked Utah's R.J. Stanford on a third-quarter blast...In loss at eighth-ranked TCU (Oct. 17), slashed through the nation's No. 9 rushing defense for 42 yards

on seven carries, helping CSU to a 6-0 lead, before landing on his ribs after a first-quarter summersault, and did not return; before the injury, picked up a blitz to give Grant Stucker time to find Rashaun Greer for 15 yards, converted a third-and-1 carry, and galloped 17 yards on another tote...Dressed but did not play in loss vs. San Diego State (Oct. 24)...Returned to action as a spark off the bench in loss vs. Air Force (Oct. 31); entered the game to begin CSU's third series and on the drive had six carries for 47 yards, including a 25-yard burst, to get the Rams back in the game; converted a pair of third-down carries on a third-quarter drive, and finished with 95 yards on 19 attempts...In loss at UNLV (Nov. 7), helped set up a game-tying TD with eight carries for 36 yards, including three first downs, on a second-quarter drive...Returned to action in 17-16 loss vs. Wyoming (Nov. 27), recording 119 yards on 20 carries; converted a trio of third-and-1 attempts, one in the first quarter on a 14-yard burst; then early in the second half helped to set up the go-ahead touchdown with consecutive carries of 19 (again on third-and-1) and 14 yards to the Cowboys' 10-yard line.

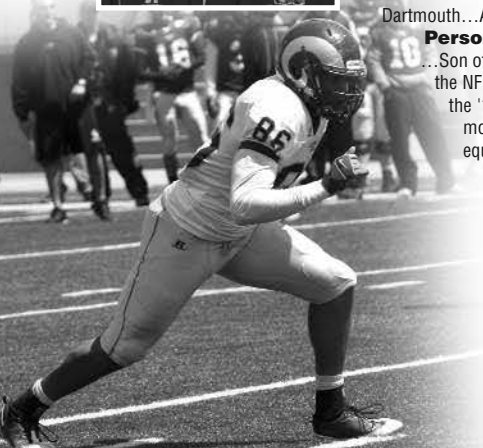

Named in the season's opening week one of five permanent team captains, the only special-teams captain... In resounding career debut as starting RB, a 23-17 win at Colorado (Sept. 6), scored the Rams' only two TDs, his first multi-TD effort as a college player (had previously scored on a kickoff return, fumbled opponent kickoff return, carry and reception, but never more than once in a game)... Scored CSU's first 2009 points, a 1-yard plunge on the Rams' initial series, then caught his first TD pass in two years, a 13-yard reception late in the first quarter to put CSU up 14-0; had a 16-yard scamper that pierced CU territory on a second-quarter FG drive that gave CSU a 17-0 lead, but didn't play after halftime, held out by doctors for precautionary reasons after sustaining a head injury... Returned as a backup RB to help Rams to assertive 35-20 win vs. Nevada (Sept. 19), with 99 yards (on 18 carries, 5.5 avg., one TD); set up his own 1-yard TD with a 10-yard run in the first quarter, diving for the pylon... Later in Wolf Pack contest, had four second-half carries of 10-or-more yards, including an 18-yard burst to set up the Rams' final TD... In conference-opening loss at No. 19 BYU (Sept. 26), returned to the lineup for the first time in three weeks, and on a second-quarter TD drive that got the Rams back in the game, caught a 15-yard pass to convert a third down... Later in Cougars contest, had a 16-yard run early in the second half... In bitter 31-29 loss at Idaho (Oct. 3), converted a fourth down to keep alive a first-quarter TD march; also picked up an important first down on a direct snap, early in the third quarter... In loss at No. 8 TCU (Oct. 17), made a stellar one-handed grab late in the first half to give CSU an important first down... In loss to SDSU (Oct. 24), returned to the lineup and racked up 130 rushing yards, his first 100-yard effort, with a TD carry and TD pass; on his first pass as a college player, found FB Zac Pauga for a 23-yard go-ahead score late in the third quarter... Earlier vs. Aztecs on a first-quarter TD drive, had six carries for 27 yards, including a fourth-down conversion and a 6-yard score, in which he muscled himself into the end zone through a pair of SDSU defenders; later set up another TD with a 22-yard run, longest of his career until his 24-yard scamper in the fourth quarter... In loss at UNLV (Nov. 7), scored both Rams TDs and converted a pair of fourth downs in the first half; first, in the first quarter, broke a tackle in the backfield before reeling off a 12-yard run to convert a fourth-and-1, then set up his own TD with a fourth-down run off a direct snap just before halftime... Scored on the next play from 1 yard out, before adding a 2-yard TD in the fourth quarter... In heart-crushing last-second loss at New Mexico (Nov. 21), had a bittersweet career-high 177 rushing yards on 27 carries, with two rushing TDs; had a career-long 39-yard run late in the game... Earlier in Lobos contest, set up his own second-quarter score with a 22-yard burst... Started the 17-16 loss vs. Wyoming (Nov. 27), picking up 36 yards on four carries before departing with injury; gashed the Cowboys with a 26-yard blast in the second quarter, setting up his 1-yard TD (nullified by a chop-block penalty).

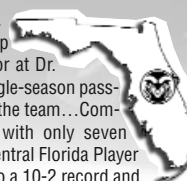

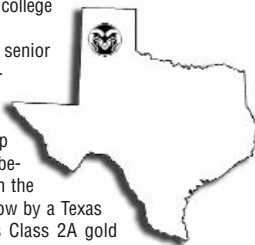

## The Keli S. McGregor Memorial Scholarship

Keli McGregor first became an All-American at Colorado State, then became an All-American at life.

Long before he unexpectedly passed away April 20, McGregor had left a living legacy with everyone who knew him, from his playing days with the Rams to his time as President of the Colorado Rockies. Above reproach and a champion of genuine leadership, he exuded legacy in a unique way. That's why the CSU athletic department wants to preserve his memory in unique fashion.

Beginning this season, Head Coach Steve Fairchild will award the Keli S. McGregor Memorial Football Scholarship to a walk-on player. McGregor first joined the CSU program during his second year on campus, as a walk-on in 1981, then earned a scholarship in 1982 and garnered All-America honors as a senior in 1984. Selected in the fourth round of the 1985 draft by the Denver Broncos, he entered athletic administration following his NFL career.

An endowment, this scholarship fund perennially will inspire CSU football players to follow his example, work ethic, dedication and diligence, both on the gridiron and in the classroom.

"Lori, the kids, and the rest of Keli's family continue to be close to our hearts and never far from our minds," Director of Athletics Paul Kowalczyk said. "We want to create a meaningful, immediate and long-lasting connection between Keli McGregor, Ram Athletics and our student-athletes, campus community, alumni and fans. We believe our program shares Keli's core values and, after consulting with his family and the Rockies organization, cannot think of a more heartfelt gesture than to honor him in perpetuity this way."

The recipient of the first McGregor scholarship, Broderick Sargent, was announced at the Green & Gold Gala, in Denver on May 22, 2010. One player will always have the scholarship until he graduates; it will not be awarded annually, similar to CSU's legacy scholarship. It is the expectation of the athletic department that the player will realize the tremendous honor he has received, and demonstrate McGregor-like attributes as a leader, a selfless teammate and a man of authentic character and integrity.

In response to the numerous requests from teammates and friends inquiring about how they can contribute, the university has established a Web site to make gifts to the Keli S. McGregor Memorial Scholarship Endowment: <https://advancing.colostate.edu/MCGREGOR>

### In addition, Colorado State in 2010 will:

- Create the Keli McGregor Award, given annually beginning in Fall 2010 to a student-athlete in one of CSU's 16 varsity sports that best exemplifies traits demonstrated by the honor's namesake, including integrity, honesty, leadership, class and competing the right way. Presented during CSU's Scholar-Athlete Awards Brunch, during Homecoming/Family Weekend, the award will recognize the characteristics that best defined McGregor's legacy as an All-America tight end and honors student at CSU, an NFL player, and later President of the Rockies. The new award will be among the most prestigious honors given by CSU, on par with the award named after Fum McGraw, the athletic director whom McGregor credited with guaranteeing his scholarship on the heels of a 1982 coaching change.
- Honor him by affixing to every football helmet in 2010 a decal with his CSU uniform number, 88.
- Hold Keli McGregor Day at CSU's Sept. 25 home football game against Idaho, at Sonny Lubick Field at Hughes Stadium. Colorado State's President, Dr. Tony Frank, and Kowalczyk will invite McGregor's wife, Lori, and the couple's four children, as well as McGregor's parents and Rockies staff, to join them in the home athletic director's suite. The family will serve as honorary game captains during the coin toss, and would take part in a brief pregame ceremony honoring McGregor and his family. What's more, CSU would implement a program to generate revenue, either through ticket sales from that game or donations at the game, to be donated on behalf of CSU athletics to the Rockies foundation to support youth sports, in McGregor's name.

"Keli will forever represent the finest qualities of a Ram student-athlete and be an example of what we expect from them," Kowalczyk added.

**2009 (Sophomore):** Started all 12 games at CSU's playmaking position, weakside LB...Garnered second-team all-conference honors, leading CSU in tackles for a second straight year, with 91 (51 solo)...Also tied for the conference lead, and tied for 24th nationally, averaging 1.29 tackles for loss per game...His 15½ tackles for loss in 2009 were the most by a CSU player since future Super Bowl champions Clark Haggans (17) and Joey Porter (16) in 1997...Plus, his team-leading six sacks were the most by a Rams defender since Bryan Save had seven in 2003...Additionally, broke up five passes, re-

covered a fumble and forced another...Earlier, was named first-team midseason all-conference by Phil Steele Oct. 16...In reverberating 23-17 win at Colorado (Sept. 6), nearly intercepted a Cody Hawkins pass on the first play of the second quarter, then with the Buffs in CSU territory halfway through the fourth quarter, picked up a QB hurry to force an incompletion two plays before a third-down sack of Cody Hawkins, throwing the Buffs for a 9-yard loss and forcing a punt...In 24-23 win vs. Weber State, provided a pair of pressures, one that forced a first-quarter incompletion on third down, leading to a missed FG, and another on a second-quarter flea flicker, also an incomplete pass; also nearly intercepted a pass at CSU's 5-yard line, and stopped Treyvn Smith for no gain on a key third-and-1 on WSU's final drive...In 35-20 win vs. Nevada (Sept. 19), early in the final period, forced a fumble after a completion that was recovered by teammate Nick Oppeneer at the Rams' 11...In loss at No. 19 BYU (Sept. 26), shot through the backfield to sack Max Hall, one play before Nick Oppeneer's interception; then early in the second half, forced a punt with a third-down hurry...In bitter 31-29 loss at Idaho (Oct. 3), posted seven stops, three for loss, including a sack; hurried QB Nathan Enderle on the ninth play of the Vandals' game-opening drive, inducing a Nick Oppeneer interception in the Rams' end zone...Showed lightning quickness in blitzing Enderle late in the first half, picking up his season's third sack; his other two tackles for loss were on the same fourth-quarter drive, helping to force a Vandals punt in a one-score game...In 24-17 loss vs. Utah (Oct. 10), on the first drive, stuffed Shaky Smithson on third-and-2, one play before Utah turned over the ball on downs; then, after a third-down stop that forced Utah to settle for a FG, made consecutive plays to force a second-quarter punt, shedding a block to drop Eddie Wide on a screen pass before flooring Wide again on third down...Also in Utes contest, helped preserve a 3-3 halftime tie by breaking up a pass just before intermission, then scooped up a Wide fumble to set up a third-quarter touchdown that gave CSU a 17-3 lead...In loss at No. 8 TCU (Oct. 17), combined with Ivory Herd on the Frogs' first series to drop RB Joseph Turner on third down and force a punt, then on TCU's next snap forced an Ed Wesley fumble (upheld by replay) that Elijah-Blu Smith recovered to set up a FG that gave CSU a 6-0 lead; also thwarted a second-quarter possession, making stops on three of the last four plays, including fourth down from the CSU 30-yard line, to force a turnover on downs...Had a three tackles for loss in setback vs. San Diego State (Oct. 24), including a spectacular first-quarter stop in which he snuffed out a reverse to Aztec playmaker Vincent Brown, scrambling on all fours several yards to drop the WR in the backfield; later on the same third-quarter drive, floored Brandon Sullivan twice, one in which he rocked the RB with lightning quickness immediately after the handoff...Showed extreme toughness in loss vs. Air Force (Oct. 31); after leaving briefly with a painful shoulder injury late in the third quarter, returned to break up a pass and sack Tim Jefferson on the same fourth-quarter drive...In loss at UNLV (Nov. 7), dropped the Rebels for an 8-yard loss to keep them out of field-goal range, one of his two tackles for negative yardage on the night...Played with an upset stomach in last-second loss at New Mexico (Nov. 21), and posted a pair of third-down stops to halt the Lobos in the first half, plus another tackle for loss...Had a career-high two sacks -- both in the second half -- in 17-16 loss vs. Wyoming (Nov. 27); the first came on a second-and-8 in the third quarter, forcing the Cowboys to eventually punt with CSU protecting a 13-7 lead, and on the second, on the last play of the third quarter, threw Wyoming for a 10-yard loss, forcing a third-and-13 conversion.

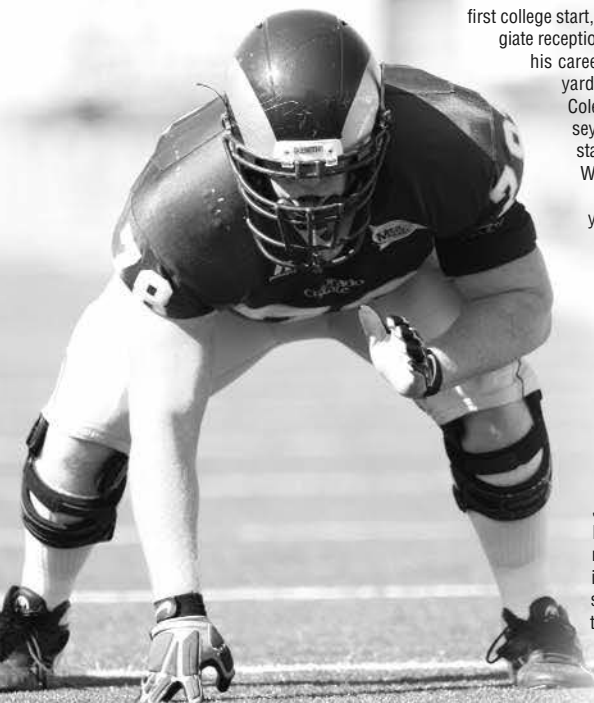

Jack Christiansen is the only former Colorado State player enshrined in the Professional Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio, and he didn't even come to Fort Collins to play football.

Discouraged by his size, the Kansas native began college — CSU was then known as Colorado A&M — figuring he would concentrate on track alone. But coaxed out onto the gridiron as a sophomore, Christiansen wound up starring for the Aggies from 1949-50, helping the team to a 9-1 record in his first season. One of the finest athletes in university history, he also lettered in track. CSU's renovated varsity track and field facility — where Christiansen used to play football before Hughes Stadium was constructed — is named in his honor.

Selected by Detroit in the sixth round (69th overall) of the 1951 NFL Draft, Christiansen in one pivotal game as a rookie scored twice on punt returns to help defeat the Los Angeles Rams. A five-time Pro Bowler who appeared on six consecutive all-NFL teams (1952-57), Christiansen helped the Detroit Lions to three world championships. A feared return man and defensive back, he intercepted 46 passes and returned three for touchdowns. During his distinguished career, he also averaged 12.8 yards per punt return, with eight TDs.

He passed away in 1986.

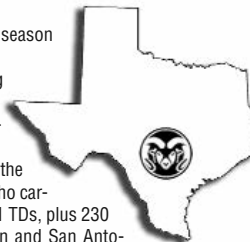

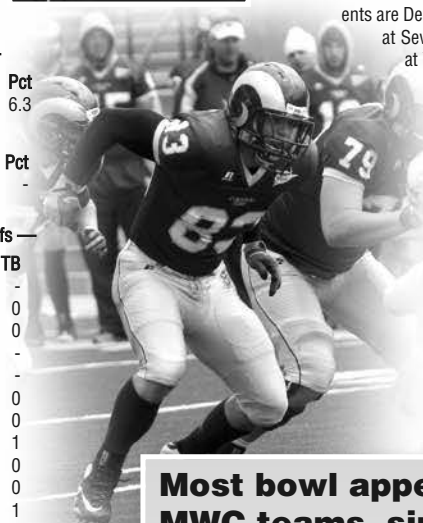

## Near-bowl berths

**1950 Salad Bowl** — After a 9-1 regular season in 1949 and second-place finish in the Skyline Conference, Colorado A&M received an invitation to the Jan. 1, 1950, Salad Bowl in Phoenix, Ariz. However, the players took a vote and decided not to attend their second bowl game in a row. Some of the players' reasons were that many of them were family men and did not want to spend another holiday season away from their wives and children. Another reason was that they had Arizona State, their opponents in the Salad Bowl, on their 1950 regular-season schedule and did not want to play them in games so close together. It is the only time in school history that the team was officially invited to a bowl game and turned it down.

**1956 Sun Bowl** — Although never officially invited to the Jan. 2, 1956, Sun Bowl, the 1955 Skyline Conference champion Colorado A&M football team received a verbal invitation to the contest in El Paso, Texas, to be played against Texas Tech. School officials refused to attend despite their championship, so an official invitation was never extended to the team and second-place Wyoming was instead allowed to receive the invitation.

**1966 Bluebonnet Bowl** — With their best season in over a decade, the CSU football team was on pace to receive an invitation to the Dec. 17, 1966, Bluebonnet Bowl. Following their Nov. 12 win over West Texas State, along with the national attention of their triumph over No. 10 Wyoming, all the Rams needed to do was beat Wichita State and Iowa State and complete the season with an 8-2 record to receive an invitation to the Houston bowl game. But CSU's embarrassing loss to Wichita State, a 1-8 team, ended the Rams' chance for the bowl bid.

**1977 Fiesta Bowl** — With their greatest season since 1949, the Rams were in control of the WAC in 1977. Despite a loss to BYU, the CSU team remained in the top position for the Fiesta Bowl as the WAC representative, since BYU would not play on Christmas Day for religious reasons. But a loss to Wyoming made the difference, and although the Rams beat both Arizona and Arizona State in the regular season, CSU finished the year in third place and did not receive an invitation to the Fiesta Bowl; instead, ASU went to the bowl as the WAC representative. With only 13 bowl games in the 1977 season, CSU did not receive an invitation to another bowl game despite an impressive 9-2-1 record.

In win vs. Weber State (Sept. 12), combined with teammates on a pair of tackles for loss to drop Walter Payton award candidate Treyvyn Smith, first with Klint Kubiak on a first-quarter carry, then with C.J. James on a second-quarter run... In assertive 35-20 win vs. Nevada (Sept. 19), forced and recovered a fumble, and had 1½ tackles for loss; combined with Michael Kawulok to drop RB Luke Lippincott for a 1-yard loss, forcing an eventual first-quarter punt... Then, ended a nine-play second-quarter drive in Wolf Pack contest, preserving a 14-0 lead, by both forcing and recovering a fumble from RB Vai Tauga at the Rams' 38-yard line... In conference-opening loss at BYU (Sept. 26), sustained a knee injury on the game's opening kickoff and did not return... Dressed but did not play in 31-29 loss at Idaho (Oct. 3)... In loss vs. Utah (Oct. 10), returned to the starting lineup and led the Rams in tackles, despite injuring his other knee on the game's second play... Knee injury sidelined him for losses at No. 8 TCU (Oct. 17) and vs. San Diego State (Oct. 24)... Returned to action as a reserve in loss vs. Air Force (Oct. 31); played the last 20 minutes at MLB, despite the knee injuries, against

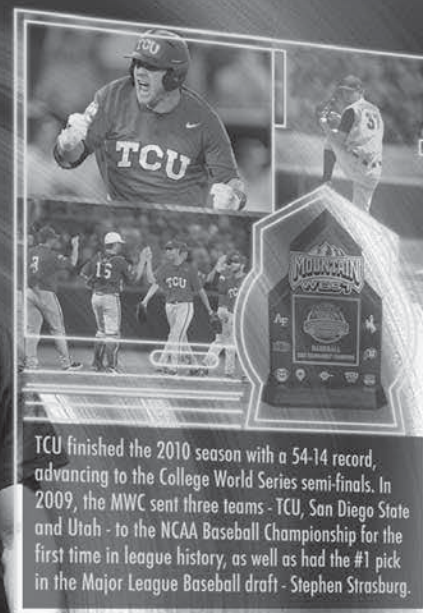
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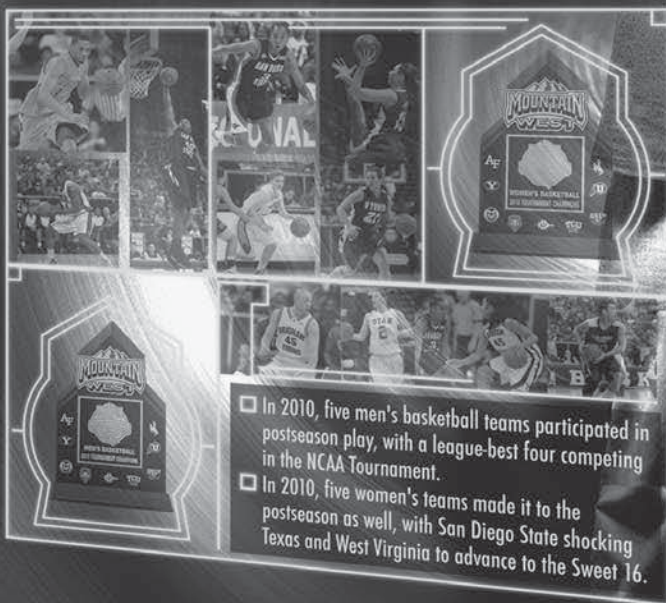
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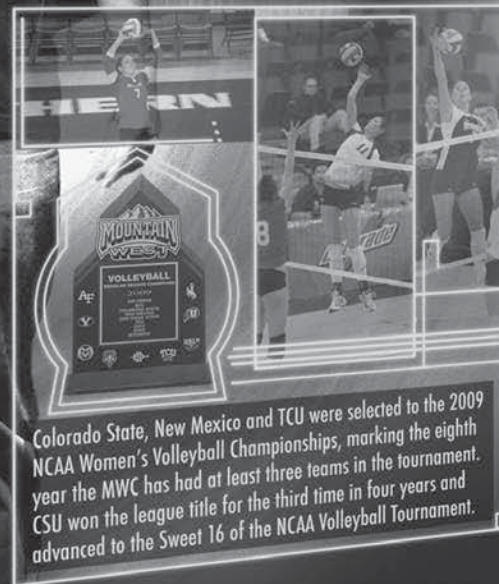
The Mountain West has claimed the 2009-10 Bowl Challenge Cup for the third time in six years after sending five football teams into postseason action and finishing with a 4-1 mark. For the third time in five seasons the Mountain West sent a team to a BCS Bowl game.



TCU finished the 2010 season with a 54-14 record, advancing to the College World Series semi-finals. In 2009, the MWC sent three teams - TCU, San Diego State and Utah - to the NCAA Baseball Championship for the first time in league history, as well as had the #1 pick in the Major League Baseball draft - Stephen Strasburg.

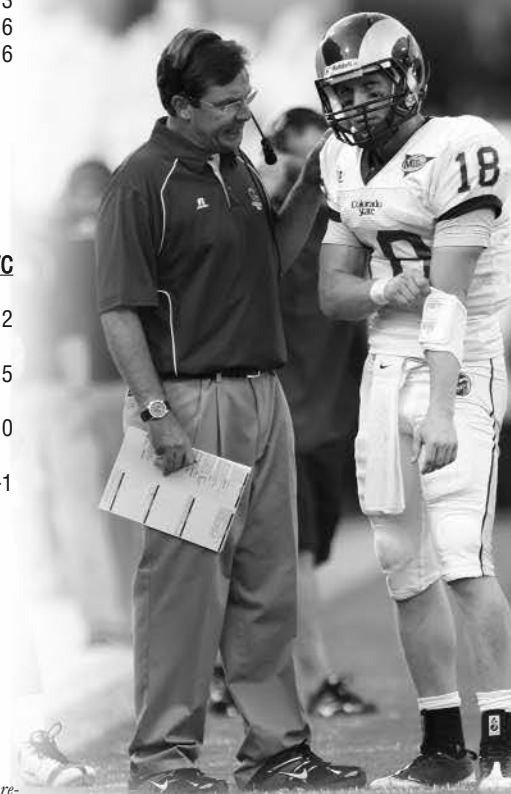

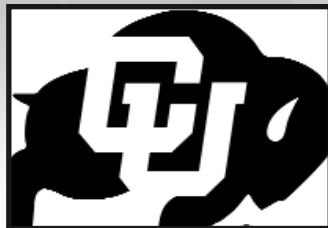

## Rams topple Buffaloes in Boulder, 23-17 Stucker leads Colorado State on five scoring drives

BOULDER, Colo. (AP) -Grant Stucker's patience finally paid off.

The fifth-year senior quarterback made his first start Sunday night and led Colorado State to a 23-17 upset of Colorado, the Rams' first win in Boulder since 1986. Stucker barely beat out Jon Eastman last week for the starting job, a year after losing out to Billy Farris.

"One thing you've got to look at it, 50 years down the road, do you think you could've stuck it out, regardless if you get the start or not? It's something I didn't want to have - regret," Stucker said.

"I'm very happy that I was able to have that patience to stick it out."

So are the Rams and their fans, who stormed the field to celebrate the second upset for the Mountain West Conference over a Big 12 team in 24 hours, coming on the heels of BYU's stunning 14-13 victory over third-ranked Oklahoma.

Stucker threw a 13-yard touchdown pass in the first quarter to running back John Mosure, who also had a 1-yard TD run as the Rams (1-0) took the Folsom Field crowd out early by jumping out to a 17-0 lead.

That helped calm down Stucker, whom Rams coach Steve Fairchild said had a poor week of practice.

"I wasn't sandbagging anybody. First-year quarterback, there's just some growing pains," Fairchild said. "We're not out of the woods yet with him. I think he's a talented young man. Hopefully he'll keep getting better. ... I'll certainly pat him on the back and give him his due. That's not easy, coming into this place and trying to win a game like that."

CU's momentum stalled when wide receiver Scotty McKnight fumbled inside the Rams 20 on a hard hit by free safety Elijah-Blu Smith and linebacker Alex Williams recovered.

On their next drive, the Buffs were stuffed on fourth-and-1 from their own 44. Demetrius Sumler was stopped well short of the first-down marker, snapping a string of a dozen consecutive fourth-down conversions by the Buffaloes going back to last season.

## Rams hold on to beat Wildcats

FORT COLLINS, Colo. — Colorado State's Guy Miller recovered a fumble with 42 seconds remaining at the Rams' 10-yard line to secure a 24-23 win over Weber State at Sonny Lubick Stadium at Hughes Field Saturday evening.

Miller, a junior nose guard, helped the Rams win their home opener in front of the first student-section sellout since Sept. 8, 2007, against then-No. 10 Cal. The win gives the Rams their first 2-0 start since 2006.

WSU (0-2) did not go down without a fight, converting 11 of 21 third-down opportunities. CSU failed to convert in eight third-down chances, but still was able to defeat the Wildcats.

"They played a good game," Miller said. "They threw a lot of different stuff at us. They were fast, they were quick and we were just lucky to come out with a win."

The game started well for the Rams, who scored first with a unique senior-to-senior connection. A double-reverse pass from wide receiver Dion Morton back to quarterback Grant Stucker for a 40-yard touchdown pass gave the Rams a 7-0 lead.

After the Wildcats missed a 34-yard field goal on their next drive, CSU struck again with a 28-yard field goal from sophomore kicker Ben DeLine, which gave the Rams a 10-0 edge going into the second quarter.

PROVO, Utah (AP) — Harvey Unga ran for 113 yards and three touchdowns and No. 19 BYU converted two interceptions and a blocked punt into scores while holding off Colorado State 42-23 Saturday.

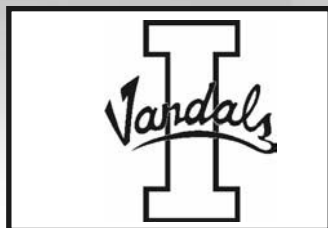

## Vandals outlast Rams, 31-29 CSU's late rally falls short at Idaho

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP) -- Idaho free safety Shiloh Keo picked off Colorado State quarterback Grant Stucker with 1:14 left in the game to seal Idaho's 31-29 win Saturday night.

Moments before Keo's pick, with 1:41 to go, Colorado State's Lou Greenwood caught a 39-yard touchdown pass, narrowing Idaho's lead to 31-29.

The Rams went for the 2-point conversion, but Keo stopped John Mosure just short of the goal line.

CSU got the ball back with 1:23 left in the game.

Stucker dropped back to pass, but Keo intercepted the pass at the 45, allowing the Vandals to run out the clock.

Idaho (4-1) was led by quarterback Nate Enderle, who finished the night 25-of-38 passing with three touchdowns for 333 yards. CSU held the Vandals to 139 yards on the ground.

Nevada scored with 51 seconds left in the second quarter on a 39-yard pass from Rowe to McCoy to take a 21-10 lead.

The interception was the only blemish in an otherwise outstanding night for Stucker, whose four TD passes were the most by a Rams QB in four years.

# SONNY LUBICK

HEAD COACH, 1993-2007 | FOUR-TIME COACH OF THE YEAR

Colorado State's football program attained previously unknown heights during head coach Sonny Lubick's 15 seasons. During that time, Lubick created a standard for excellence never before evident during the 115-year history of the football program.

Since taking over a program that had won just 47 games in 11 seasons with just two bowl appearances prior to his arrival in 1993, Lubick guided the Rams' program to elite status nationally. For example:

- ▶ Colorado State won or shared six conference titles from 1994-2007, more than any other Mountain West Conference member over that period;
- ▶ CSU played in nine bowl games, more than any other league institution from 1994-2007;
- ▶ The Rams ranked among the Top 20 teams in the nation in total victories since 1997;
- ▶ Lubick ranked among the Top 20 NCAA Division I FBS active coaches in career wins at the end of 2007;
- ▶ Colorado State placed among the leaders in MWC victories since the conference came into being in 1999;
- ▶ The Rams seven times during Lubick's tenure won eight or more games in a season. Four times – the only four times in school history – CSU won 10 or more games under Lubick.

Lubick ushered in by far the most successful era in the history of CSU football. His fingerprint can be seen on the results on the field as well as at the turnstiles.

Not only have the Rams been perennial postseason competitors, but nine of the top 10 seasons in total attendance in school history came during his reign. Additionally, eight of the 10 largest single-game crowds in CSU history came during his time at the helm.

Lubick also joined another elite list of coaches including Joe Paterno, Bobby Bowden, and Frank Beamer, in 2005 as active Division I-A coaches with 100 or more career wins at their current institutions. The group includes only nine members.

Interest and support of CSU's program had never been greater. The 2006 season marked the completion of an 18-month project to renovate and expand Sonny Lubick Field at Hughes Stadium. The project was made possible through a \$15.2 million gift by the Bohemian Foundation, with a caveat the stadium's playing surface be named in Lubick's honor.

The project included the installation of 4,400 new seats, the renovation of the press box and club seating area, and the addition of 12 luxury suites – each of which were sold prior to the beginning of the 2005 season.

Prior to the 2006 season, a new artificial playing surface was installed to complete the renovation.

The success enjoyed by the Rams' program under Lubick's watch touched the entire athletic department. For instance, during his tenure, CSU was able to:

- ▶ Renovate and expand the stadium (\$15.2 million).
- ▶ Acquire a \$200,000 gift from former CSU all-star and current NFL All-Pro linebacker Joey Porter, who played for Lubick in the 1990s and a gift of \$75,000 from former defensive end and 10-year NFL veteran Brady Smith for program enhancements.
- ▶ Secure funding and build the McGraw Athletic Center (\$5.5 million), completed in 1999, which houses offices for every athletic department staff member, includes an academic support center, athletic marketing, promotions, and ticket offices, and break-out rooms for football position meetings, as well as a 125-seat auditorium for team meetings and special functions.
- ▶ Renovate Moby Arena (\$4.5) million in 1998 as part of the McGraw Center project.

Those projects alone total more than \$25 million, made possible in large part by the success that CSU's football program enjoyed since Lubick's arrival.

Lubick cared deeply about the people around him, particularly the program's student-athletes and his staff members. He carefully built CSU's programs into one of the nation's best using a time-tested philosophy:

- ▶ Responsibility: Each member of the Rams' program was responsible for his actions and the impact on the success of the team.
- ▶ Character: Lubick placed a premium on student-athletes who display integrity and honesty.
- ▶ Respect: Earning respect among peers, fans, and colleagues remained more important to the veteran coach than gaining popularity from those groups.
- ▶ Perspective: Remaining on an even keel, win or lose. Lubick had those in the program focused on the goal ahead.

Lubick's impact was felt not only in the football program or athletics department, but across the university and throughout the community:

- ▶ He was named the Sports Illustrated Coach of the Year in 1994 after leading CSU to a 10-2 record.
- ▶ In 2003, Lubick was named one of four national finalists for the Eddie Robinson Coach of Distinction Award for his community service work.
- ▶ Also in 2003, the Rams' coach was recognized by the American Diabetes Association-Colorado Chapter as "Father of the Year."
- ▶ He was an annual contributor and participant in several local and national charities including St. Jude's Children's Hospital.
- ▶ In May of 2005, he was named Citizen of the Year by the Fort Collins Board of Realtors;
- ▶ Lubick and his family were honored by a local charitable organization in the winter of 2006 for their commitment and dedication to the northern Colorado community.
- ▶ In January of 2007, Lubick was named the Collins Award winner, given annually to a local figure that exemplifies leadership and service to the Fort Collins Community by the local chamber of commerce.

Lubick remained staunch in his belief a family approach was one of the reasons for Colorado State's success during his tenure. Four of his 2007 coaching staff members – Tom Ehlers, Darrell Funk, Dan Hammerschmidt, and his son Marc – either played or

coached under Lubick during his first stint in Fort Collins or his return beginning in 1993.

Marc joined the staff in 2005 after time with the St. Louis Rams. He replaced his older brother, Matt, who departed for a position at the University of Mississippi.

Assistants Mick Delaney and Dave Arnold both coached alongside Lubick at Montana State. Steve Stanard and James Ward had previous ties to long-time Lubick colleagues, while Jessie Williams was on the same coaching staff as Matt Lubick.

Further testament to his belief in a family atmosphere took place after every home game. After conducting his postgame news conference and greeting wife Carol Jo, Lubick always was embraced by his three young grandchildren – Matthew, William and Emma – children of his daughter, Michelle, and son-in-law Gerard Boyle.

Lubick's smile while embracing his three youngest Rams fans reflected the same happiness CSU supporters had come to appreciate during the most successful era in school history.

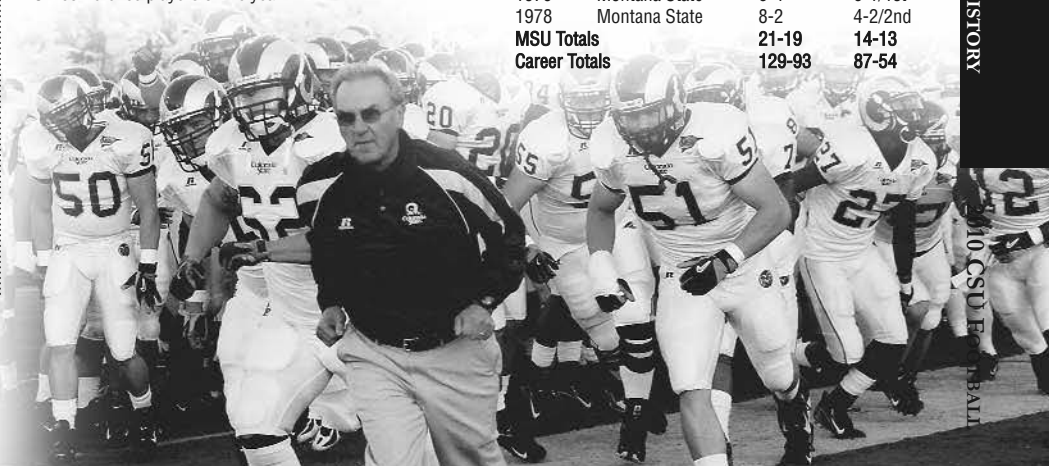

# STEVE BARTALO

RUNNING BACK | ALL-AMERICAN, 1986 | CAREER RUSHING LEADER | 1986 WAC OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE YEAR

Never is a long time. Unless you are talking about former runningback Steve Bartalo.

Told by nearly every college recruiter he would never play NCAA Bowl Subdivision football, Bartalo proved every critic wrong in record-setting fashion.

A former Wishbone offense quarterback at Doherty High School in Colorado Springs, Colo., Bartalo walked on to the CSU squad in the fall of 1982, redshirting his first season but making his presence felt nonetheless.

Bartalo earned the attention of his coaches and the ire of defenders with his competitive attitude as the "scout team" quarterback. Bartalo made it apparent to every teammate and coach that he would be a key contributor to CSU's program.

A season later, Bartalo was buried on the team's offensive depth chart, so far down he didn't see action in the first two games of the season, both losses. In fact, he was scheduled to play on special teams the second game of the year, a conference date in Hawaii.

A day prior to the team's departure, Bartalo was replaced on the travel squad. While disappointed in the decision, it only further reinforced his will to succeed at CSU.

A week later, the Rams trailed Colorado at half-time. CSU's rushing game had been negligible at best, and Leon Fuller and his staff desperately looked for answers. They found one in Bartalo, who gained 61 yards in the second half and became a fixture in CSU's backfield the rest of his illustrious career.

Following his impressive debut in Boulder, Bartalo surpassed the 100-yard mark for the first of 28 times in his career while making his initial starting appearance in the backfield.

Bartalo was listed at five feet, nine inches tall and weighed about 200 pounds. But those tangible measurements failed to gauge his heart, determine and competitive drive.

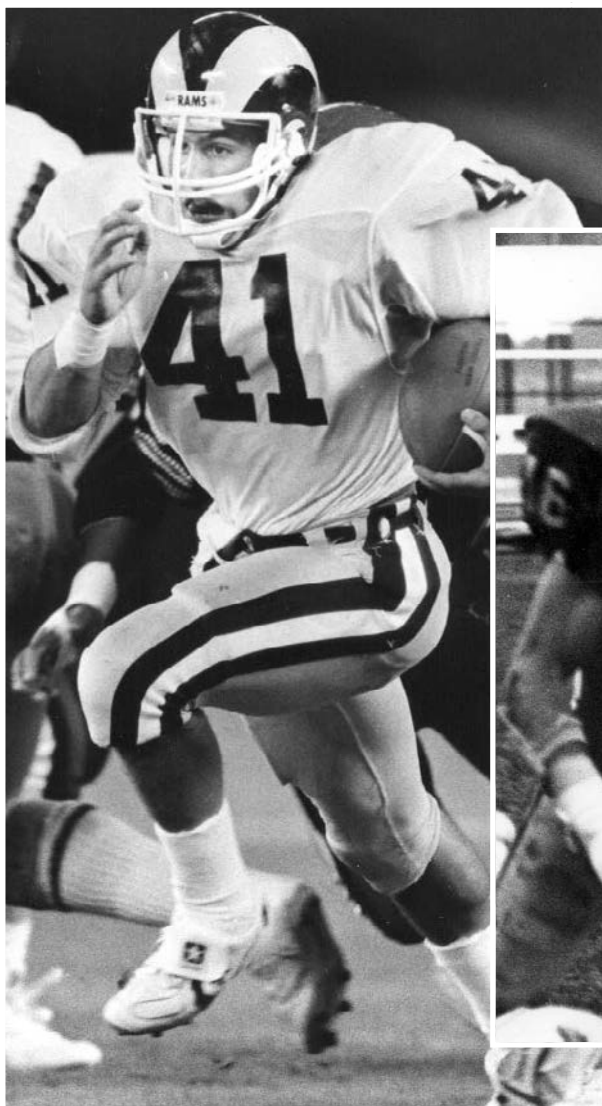
By the time he concluded his four-year career, he became the first and only player in school history to lead the team in rushing four consecutive seasons. Bartalo was a three-time all-conference selection. Following his freshman season, despite playing in just eight of the team's 11 games, he was named the conference newcomer of the year. Following his senior season in 1986, Bartalo was voted the league's offensive player of the year.

He concluded an illustrious career with 4,813 yards, still a record and set an NCAA mark with 1,210 career rushing attempts. In his career he gained more than 100 yards in a game 28 times, another school record.

Bartalo later played in the Japan Bowl, and was drafted in the sixth round of the NFL selection process by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. After one season, 1987, with the Bucs, he played one season, 1988, with the San Francisco 49ers. He concluded his professional career by playing for the Frankfurt Galaxy in 1989 and '90.

Bartalo's prominence was not limited to the football field. In 1986, he was named an NCAA Academic All-American, and was also the winner of an NCAA post-graduate scholarship award.

In 1995, Bartalo was inducted into the CSU Sports Hall of Fame.



# MIKE BELL

DEFENSIVE TACKLE | ALL-AMERICAN, 1977-78

*"Football is my life; it's everything to me and I won't have it any other way."*

— Mike Bell

Football was life for the 6-foot-5, 265-pound defensive tackle from Wichita, Kan. After an all-state career at Archbishop Carroll High School, Bell and his identical twin brother, Mark E., came to Colorado State to continue their playing careers.

In fact, at the time, Colorado State's football roster boasted three Bells, including the twin brothers, nicknamed Ding (Mike), Dong (Mark E.), and Tinker (Mark R. Bell, a talented wide receiver of no relation).

Following his Colorado State career, Bell became the second overall selection in the NFL Draft and played for more than a decade with the Kansas City Chiefs, his boyhood dream team.

Bell, who starred at defensive tackle for the Colorado State Rams from 1976-78, is one of the most honored football players in Rams history.

He was a three-year starter and letterwinner. As a sophomore, Bell made his presence felt nationally, earning a spot on the *Football News* Sophomore All-America team in 1976, when he recorded 86 tackles and 10 quarterback sacks, helping the Rams to a 6-5 overall record.

Perhaps Bell's greatest season at Colorado State was his junior year (1977), when he compiled numerous awards and achievements. He was named twice the Western Athletic Conference Defensive Player of the Week, while on his way to the Lineman of the Year award and a first-team all-WAC selection. *Sports Illustrated* and the *Associated Press* also honored Bell as National Lineman of the Week, for his outstanding play against Arizona State on November 19.

In 1977, Bell compiled 103 tackles, 15 quarterback sacks, four forced fumbles, and two fumble recoveries in leading his

team to a 9-2-1 record. These amazing stats landed him *Associated Press* second-team All-America recognition. Bell's award list didn't stop there; he was named Colorado State University's Most Valuable Player for his outstanding play, competitive spirit, and team leadership. He was also selected as the Colorado Sports Hall of Fame's Collegiate Athlete of the Year, in 1977.

Coming into his senior season Bell was a confident young football player who had fire in his eyes. But Bell's senior year was cut short by a knee injury. Despite his shortened season, Bell was selected to several post-season teams, including the coaches' All-America team, the Kodak All-America team, and the *Sporting News* All-America team. Even before the season began, Bell was named as a *Playboy* Preseason All-America pick.

Following his senior season, the hype about Bell being selected in the NFL Draft continued to grow. Rumors were flying that he would be a top draft pick in the first round. The Kansas City Chiefs made Bell the second selection in that draft, and he was the top player in the group to sign when No. 1 pick Tom Cousineau opted to instead play in the Canadian Football League.



# ANTHONY CESARIO

OFFENSIVE GUARD | ALL-AMERICAN, 1998

With a powerful pancake block and a 6-foot-6, 310-pound frame, opposing defensive linemen knew that they were in for a war when offensive guard Anthony Cesario took his three-point stance from across the line.

The offensive lineman from Pueblo, Colo., was destined for stardom even before he stepped on the field as a Colorado State Ram. He was named first-team all-conference as a senior at Pueblo South High School, earned two varsity letters in football and three in track.

In his first two years as a Ram, Cesario first redshirted then played sparingly on the offensive line and special teams. As a sophomore in 1996, he started to blossom into one of the best offensive linemen in school history.

In his first year as a starter, he played in all 12 games and was named second-team all-Western Athletic Conference.

As the 1997 season approached, expectations were high for Cesario; not only from his teammates and coaches, but from the fans as well.

He didn't disappoint. Cesario was named the top offensive guard in the nation by *The Sporting News* as he led his team to an 11-2 record and a Holiday Bowl appearance, where he helped defeat the Missouri Tigers 35-24. As a starter in all 12 regular-season games, Cesario had a team-best 64 pancake blocks and graded out at 91.3 percent. In that same year he did not allow a single quarterback sack. Cesario was also named first-team all-conference and second-team All-America, and was a nominee for the Outland Trophy, which recognizes the best offensive lineman in the nation.

After such an amazing junior year, Cesario was named as a 1998 preseason nominee for the Lombardi Award, presented to the most outstanding offensive or defensive lineman in the country, and would later that year become one of 12 finalists for the award. In his final season as a Ram, Cesario once again started in all 12 games, bringing his total to 37 consecutive games as a starter. To opposing defenses, he was a brick wall that no one could seem to forge around for two straight years, as he allowed no quarterback sacks. Cesario was named first-team all-WAC for the second year in a row and was named first-team All-America for his position at offensive guard. He helped his team to an 8-5 record and recorded more than 70 "big blocks," breaking his own single-season record.

With three solid seasons at CSU, Cesario entered the 1998 NFL Draft with high expectations. He was selected in the third round by the Jacksonville Jaguars as the 88th pick overall.

Cesario was a member of the Jaguars team that advanced to the AFC title game in 1999.



# RICK CROWELL

LINEBACKER | 2000 LIBERTY BOWL DEFENSIVE MVP  
2000 MWC DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE YEAR

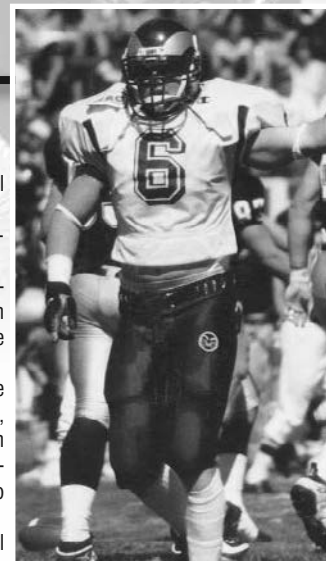
Imagine, Rams head coach Sonny Lubick said before the 2000 season, how well Colorado State's defense could be with the return of star linebacker Rick Crowell.

Crowell, from Chula Vista, Calif., made dreams a reality in 2000 as a senior. He carried away from his last game as a Ram an armful of awards and honors.

Crowell was named Colorado State's defensive MVP in leading the Rams to a 22-17 win over Louisville in the AXA Liberty Bowl. He was credited with seven tackles in the game, including six unassisted, and helped force three turnovers in leading the Rams to a win over the Conference USA champions.

Crowell entered the bowl game having already been named the MWC Defensive Player of the Year after leading the league in total tackles with 125, 12.5 per contest, over the 10 games in which he played. He was a consensus all-conference selection as chosen by the conference's head coaches and media members who regularly follow the teams. Crowell was named to the all-league squad three times in his Colorado State career.

He concluded his Colorado State career with 370 tackles, the fifth-most in school history. Additionally, he was selected to play in the Hula Bowl all-star game when the Rams returned victoriously from Memphis, Tenn.; in the Hula, he made four tackles and had an interception.



# EDDIE HANNA

HALFBACK | FIRST-TEAM ALL-SKYLINE CONFERENCE, 1948 |  
UNIFORM No. 21 (RETIRED)

When Rams fans enter Sonny Lubick Field at Hughes Stadium, they see only two numbers retired in the illustrious history of the football program. One of those belongs to Thurman (Fum) McGraw (48) and the other belongs to Eddie Hanna (21), whose short time with Colorado A&M made a lasting impact.

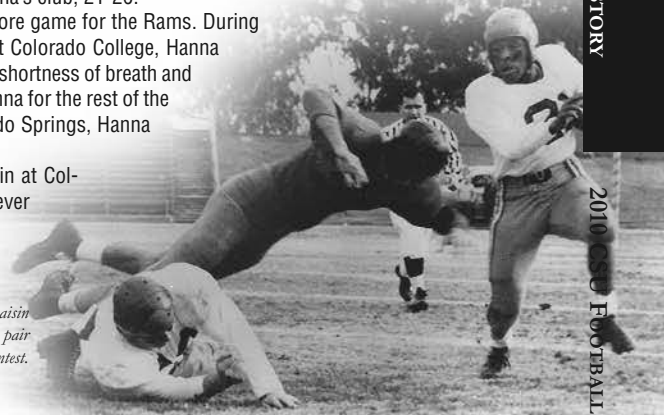
From 1947-49, Kansas native Eddie "Twinkletoes" Hanna was an electric running back and track letterman, part of a dangerous backfield few teams could stop. After only two practices, Hanna ran 51 yards on three plays in his first game, against the Colorado School of Mines. Hanna was at the forefront of a resurgence.

Playing with legends such as McGraw and Jack Christiansen under then-head coach Bob Davis, Hanna and his "Cinderella Rams" put together an 8-2 regular season in 1948. The campaign was capped with a trip to the Raisin Bowl to play Occidental, the first bowl in program history. Hanna shined, and 50 years prior to Gartrell Johnson's record-setting performance in the New Mexico Bowl, Hanna had two long TDs. His first was a 71-yard dash for his first touchdown of the game to set a Raisin Bowl rushing record. His second, in the second half, was for 79 yards and another touchdown. Unfortunately, Occidental made an incredible comeback to beat Hanna's club, 21-20.

Sadly, Hanna would play in only one more game for the Rams. During the first game of the 1949 season against Colorado College, Hanna came to the sidelines in the first half with a shortness of breath and chest discomfort and team doctors sat Hanna for the rest of the game. On the train ride back from Colorado Springs, Hanna suffered a heart attack and died.

His number 21 will never be worn again at Colorado State, and his amazing career will never be forgotten.

Hanna, pictured in the program's first bowl game, the Raisin Bowl on Jan. 1, 1949, was an electric halfback who had a pair of touchdown runs, each for 70-plus yards, in that contest.



## NATE KVAMME

LINEBACKER |

NCAA POST-GRADUATE SCHOLARSHIP WINNER, 1998

During his stellar four-year playing career at Colorado State, Nate Kvamme established himself as one of the finest linebackers in school history.

Kvamme, from Windsor, Colo., concluded his Ram career fourth on the school's career tackles list with 385. The four-year starter was a two-time all-conference selection.

He was named the conference preseason Defensive Player of the Year in 1998 and was named to All-America teams by several publications.

Kvamme (pronounced QUAM-ee) in 1998 was also a Dick Butkus Award nominee for the honor presented annually to the nation's most outstanding linebacker.

What Kvamme accomplished on the field paled in comparison to his academic success. Kvamme was a three-time academic all-conference selection, and a three-time academic all-district pick by the College Sports Information Directors of America. In 1998, he was also honorable mention Academic All-America.

A Civil Engineering major, Kvamme had a 3.77 grade-point average. At the conclusion of his playing career, Kvamme was awarded a \$5,000 scholarship for post-graduate study by the NCAA. Kvamme used the scholarship to continue his studies and pursue a career in college coaching.

## KEVIN McDUGAL

RUNNING BACK | 1999 MWC OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE YEAR



Running back Kevin McDougal provided a glimpse of what was to come during the Rams' opening game of 1999 at Mile High Stadium in Denver.

He rushed for 189 yards and scored two touchdowns in leading the Rams to a 41-14 win over in-state rival Colorado before a sellout crowd and national television audience.

McDougal five times in 1999 rushed for more than 100 yards, finishing the season with 1,223 yards. He enjoyed one of the most impressive seasons in school history, finishing with what is now CSU's seventh-highest rushing total all-time.

McDougal had a total of 13 career 100-yard rushing games and led the league in rushing while ranking among the national leaders as well. He finished his career with 3,067 yards, CSU's fourth-highest career total ever.

Following the season, the league's coaches named McDougal the MWC Offensive Player of the Year and he was also selected to first-team all-league. McDougal picked up an additional award when the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame named him the MWC Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

McDougal spent his rookie season in 2000 as a member of the Indianapolis Colts organization.

## THURMAN (FUM) MCGRAW

OFFENSIVE TACKLE | ALL-AMERICAN, 1948-49

UNIFORM No. 48 (RETIRED)

The most recognized name in Colorado State football history is that of the school's initial first-team All-American, Thurman "Fum" McGraw.

McGraw was a two-time All-American for the Rams in 1948 and '49. McGraw led Colorado State, then known as the Colorado A&M Aggies, to the first bowl game in school history. McGraw and his teammates played Occidental in the 1949 Raisin Bowl on New Year's Day in Fresno, Calif. A year later, McGraw was again named All-American.

McGraw had a five-decade love affair with his alma mater, where he was a standout athlete and athletic administrator.

Besides his success on the football field, he attained similar honors in wrestling and track.

Following his career in Fort Collins, McGraw played professionally for the Detroit Lions from 1950-54, helping the team to three world championships and earning All-Pro honors three times.

He returned to Colorado State when his playing career ended, as the school's wrestling coach and an assistant with the football and track teams from 1955-58. He was later an assistant coach with the Pittsburgh Steelers from 1958-62, then returned to campus as an administrator from 1962-65, when he became an assistant athletic director.

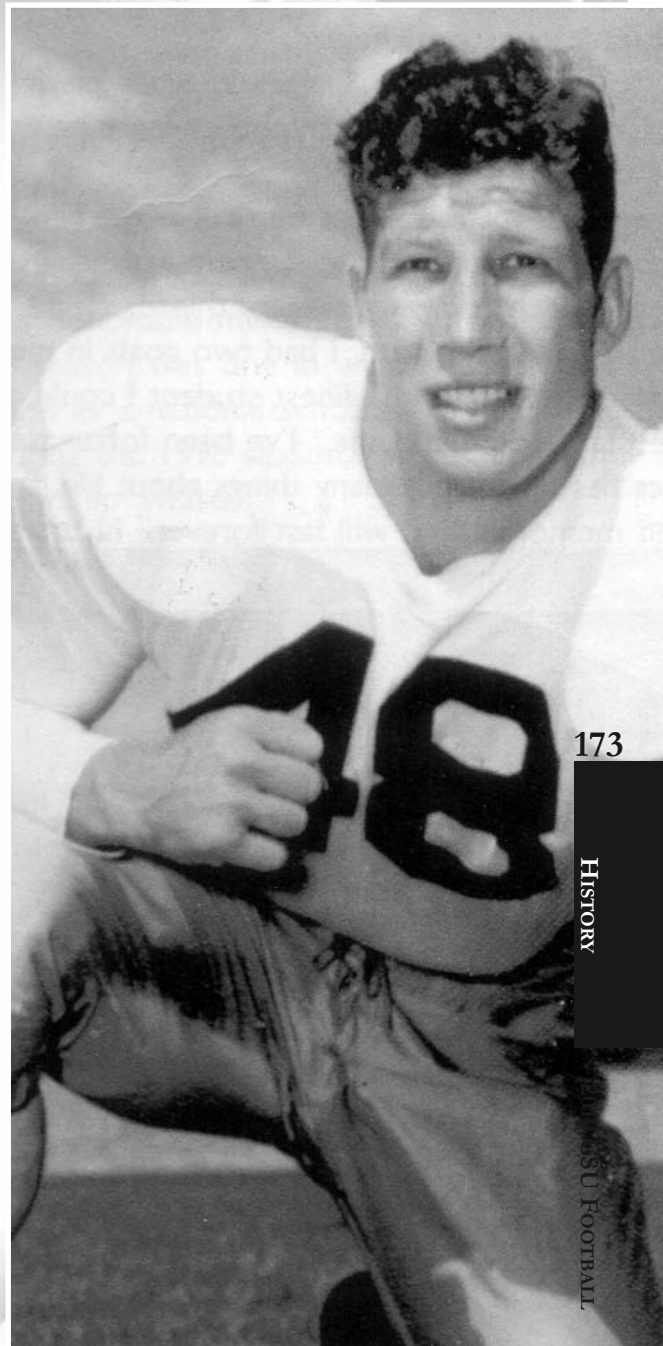
McGraw's influence at Colorado State continued, as he played a prominent role in the construction of Hughes Stadium and Moby Arena.

From 1970-76, he was an NFL scout until returning to his alma mater as the school's athletic director, a position he held until 1986.

He was inducted into the state's Sports Hall of Fame in 1971, and received similar honors at Colorado State in 1988. He was also a member of the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame as well as the National Association of College Directors of Athletics Hall of Fame.

The school's athletic center, which opened in May of 1999, is named in his honor.

Every winter, the Rams hold a football banquet and name their MVP in McGraw's name. His No. 48 jersey hangs in the Rams' locker room during every game, home and road.



## KELI McGREGOR

TIGHT END | ALL-AMERICAN, 1984

All-American tight end Keli McGregor learned a valuable lesson a long time ago: Hard work pays off.

One of the most prolific players to ever compete at Colorado State, McGregor was an All-American football player and an All-American person.

McGregor came to Colorado State as a walk-on in 1981, and used his work ethic to become the starting tight end for the Rams by the end of his freshman season.

After an impressive first year with the Rams, McGregor was one of the first CSU players to meet new coach Leon Fuller, who took over the coaching duties in Fort Collins prior to the 1982 season. With hard work in his first season, McGregor shed his walk-on tag in 1982. He responded with a breakthrough campaign: 36 catches for 393 yards and three touchdowns.

Used as a wingback in Colorado State's single-back offensive attack, McGregor flourished for the Rams in the next two seasons. In 1983, McGregor continued to impress his coaches and Colorado State fans.

He concluded his finest season at Colorado State by catching a school-record 69 passes for 717 yards and a pair of touchdowns while earning second-team all-WAC honors.

A remarkable senior season was in the future for McGregor, as he was named to the preseason All-America teams as selected by several national publications.

McGregor went on to catch 47 passes for 479 yards and three touchdowns, leading the Rams for a second straight season in receptions.

McGregor also had two of his best games as a Ram in 1984 as he caught seven passes for 105 yards against Wyoming, and one week later had eight receptions for 62 yards and a touchdown at Utah. He was named to second-team all-WAC for a second straight season and he received second-team All-America honors as selected by United Press International. McGregor also played in the East-West Shrine and Japan Bowl all-star games following the completion of his collegiate career.

After the best career by a tight end at Colorado State, McGregor went on to the National Football League Draft, where he was selected by the Denver Broncos in the fourth round. He later played for the Indianapolis Colts until the 1986 season, and also played for the Seattle Seahawks.

Following his professional playing career, McGregor entered sports administration, first at the University of Florida and later at the University of Arkansas. He served as an associate athletics director at each institution.

His ties to Colorado led him back home in 1993, when he joined the staff of the Colorado Rockies Baseball Club. McGregor supervised the construction of Coors Field, the team's current playing facility, considered among the finest venues in professional sports. He ascended to president of the franchise, which won the NL pennant in 2007 and brought the World Series to his hometown.

In 1997, he was accorded another honor from his Rams' playing career, when he was inducted into the Colorado State Hall of Fame.

Sadly, McGregor passed away unexpectedly on April 20, 2010. To preserve his legacy, the CSU athletic department created the Keli S. McGregor Memorial Scholarship Endowment, and in his name awards the scholarship to a deserving walk-on player.



## KEVIN McLAIN

LINEBACKER | ALL-AMERICAN, 1974-75

He had speed, agility, size, quickness, leadership and intellect. The perfect football machine?

No, but he was a coach's dream. He was Kevin McLain.

A former middle linebacker for the Rams from Anaheim, Calif., and a junior-college All-American from Fullerton College, McLain was called by Colorado State coaches and players the best linebacker they had ever seen, and a once-in-a-lifetime player.

McLain was one of the most highly-sought after linebackers, not only by Colorado State but nationally as well.

While at Fullerton he set a school record in 1973 with 124 unassisted tackles in 11 games on a team that was ranked third nationally. In 1974, McLain picked Colorado State as the school for whom he wanted to play, choosing the Rams over schools such as UCLA.

McLain proved his coaches' prediction for success to be correct.

Selected as one of four captains for the 1974 season, McLain led the team in tackles with 195 total stops and was named to all-Western Athletic Conference. He had 93 unassisted tackles, with 12 for losses totaling 48 yards.

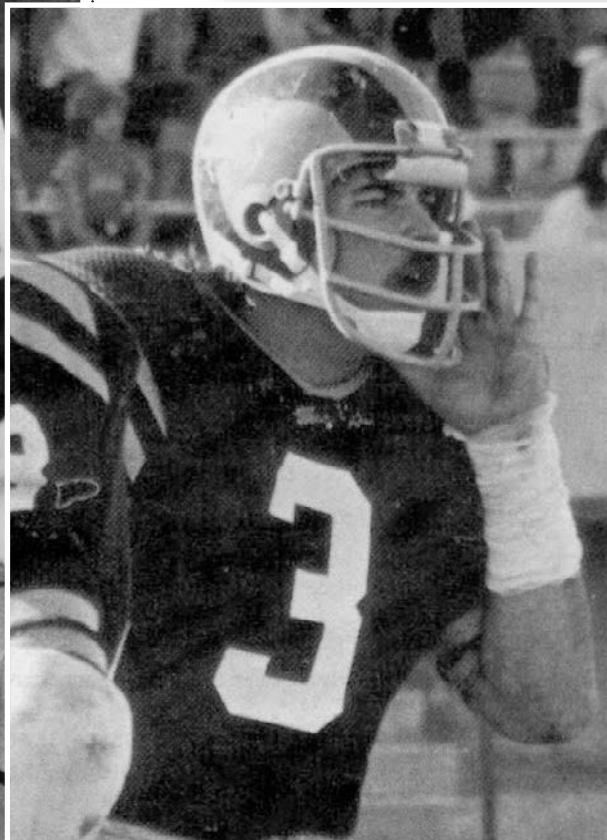
His finest game came against UTEP, when he recorded 10 unassisted tackles, forced a pair of fumbles and deflected one pass.

With such a phenomenal first season as a Ram, McLain was a bright light for the following year's team.

McLain started out the 1975 season with the same fire he had displayed the previous season. He was named to the preseason All-America team for his position at middle linebacker, then went on to garner all-league and All-America honors.

Although he only played in the first nine games due to a knee injury, he was credited with 84 unassisted tackles, including 11 tackles for 53 lost yards. In the Rams' 27-16 win over New Mexico, he compiled 11 unassisted tackles, 11 assisted tackles, and two interceptions, one a 53-yard return, and another for a touchdown. This game earned McLain National Lineman of the Week recognition from the *Associated Press*. He was also named the Colorado Sportlight Athlete of the Month, and was a projected top choice in the 1976 National Football League Draft.

McLain was a first-round draft choice by the Los Angeles Rams, and played several seasons in the NFL and later in the World League.





# MOSES MORENO

QUARTERBACK | 1997 WAC OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE YEAR |  
1997 HOLIDAY BOWL CO-MVP

Screenwriters could not have written a better script than the season former all-star quarterback Moses Moreno enjoyed in 1997.

Moreno, a native of Chula Vista, Calif., returned home in leading the Rams to their third Holiday Bowl appearance in four seasons, when Colorado State travelled to San Diego's Qualcomm Stadium in 1997.

Moreno, in his senior season, guided Colorado State to the highest win total in school history when the Rams finished the year with an 11-2 record. Colorado State defeated Missouri, 35-24, to win the Holiday Bowl and end the season ranked as high as 16th nationally.

For his efforts in the bowl game, Moreno was joined by teammate Darran Hall as the game's co-MVP. That came on the heels of Moreno's record-shattering career.

In 1996, Moreno threw for 2,921 yards, the fifth-highest total in school annals. A year later, he nearly matched that total and finished his career with 6,986 yards, the third-highest total in school history.

Moreno was named first-team all-conference as a senior, and was named Western Athletic Conference Offensive Player of the Year.

Following his collegiate career, Moreno played for the Chicago Bears and the San Diego Chargers.



# GREG MYERS

SAFETY | ALL-AMERICAN, 1994-95 | JIM THORPE AWARD WINNER, 1995

Greg Myers was something special from the moment he set foot on Colorado State's campus.

The only four-time all-Western Athletic Conference selection in league history — and the only player so honored in school history — Myers is regarded as one of the finest players in the history of Colorado State's football program.

The native of nearby Windsor, Colo., earned the respect of his teammates, coaches and opponents with his spirited play throughout an illustrious four-year career wearing the Green and Gold of Colorado State.

Twice, in 1994 and again in '95, he was named first-team All-American. He was also a two-time academic All-American, while majoring in biological sciences with plans to become a physician.

In 1992, Myers became one of only two players in WAC history to be named first-team all-conference as a freshman. He repeated that honor again in 1993, and in 1994 set the stage for achieving national prominence when he was placed among the best in the Jim Thorpe Award balloting for the nation's most outstanding defensive back.

Myers helped the Rams to a 10-2 record and No. 15 national ranking as the team won its first-ever WAC championship and played in the Holiday Bowl in 1994.

A year later, the Rams again won the conference title and played in the Holiday Bowl.

Myers, meanwhile, became the first Colorado State player to ever win a national award when he was named the winner of the Thorpe Award in 1995. He was honored during ESPN's College Football Awards Show at Disney World in Orlando, Fla. Myers' national distinction didn't stop there.

On the same night he walked onto the national stage in the limelight of winning the Thorpe Award, Myers was also named the Honda Scholar Athlete of the Year for his academic prominence. He was also named the winner of a National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame post-graduate scholarship.

Myers concluded his Colorado State career among the school's all-time leaders in pass interceptions and total tackles. He also set the school and WAC records for career punt-return yardage.

Following the completion of his Colorado State playing career, Myers was selected by the Cincinnati Bengals in the NFL Draft, then proceeded to start in the team's secondary. He went on to play for the Dallas Cowboys.

While Myers was one of the finest football players in Colorado State history, he was just as successful in the classroom, balancing the athletic and academic demands that face today's student-athlete.

"When I came to Colorado State," Myers said as a senior, "I had two goals in mind: To work as hard as I possibly could to become the finest student I could, and to work to be the finest athlete that I could become. I've been fortunate to be involved in athletics. Athletics has taught me many things about life, and has given me many friendships and memories that will last forever."



## MIKE NEWELL

CENTER | ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICAN, 1998

Just prior to the 1994 season, Mike Newell arrived in Fort Collins on the Colorado State University campus, set to begin his Rams football journey.

Two years later, as Newell entered his sophomore season in 1996, head coach Sonny Lubick mused that Newell would be the top center in the country by the time his career concluded.



Lubick was right.

Newell concluded his Colorado State career in 1998 as one of the top offensive line-men in school history on his way to a host of individual honors regionally and nationally.

Newell started nearly 40 games at center for the Rams during his career. Over that span, the Rams won more league games than any other conference team and were among the national leaders in total victories.

Newell, a former all-state performer at Littleton (Colo.) High School, helped Colorado State to three conference titles, and three Holiday Bowl appearances, including a 1997 win over Missouri.

He was named first-team all-conference in 1998, and earned honorable mention All-America honors. Newell was also a Lombardi Award and Outland Trophy nominee.

Newell, 6-foot-3 and 290 pounds, combined speed, power, quickness, and overall athletic ability from his center position.

He was so talented and so agile, the Rams installed several pass and run plays during his career in which he "pulled" to lead the blocking from his center position — truly a rarity at any level of football competition.

Newell earned the respect of his teammates and coaches with his tremendous work ethic. He was a team leader from the time he stepped onto the field, not with his words as much as his actions.

How much did his teammates respect him?

At the conclusion of each season, Colorado State's players and coaches are honored at the team banquet. Coach Sonny Lubick and his staff handed out many awards for various achievements. But players vote on the team's most valuable player.

In 1998, Newell was named the team's MVP, capping a long list of individual achievements in 1998. Newell's prowess wasn't limited to the playing field. He boasted a 3.77 grade-point average while majoring in horticulture with an emphasis in turfgrass management.

Three times, Newell earned academic all-conference honors for his success in the classroom. In 1997 and again in '98, he was selected academic all-district by the College Sports Information Directors of America and GTE. In 1998, he was an honorable mention academic All-American.

After the 1998 season, Newell also was named by the Burger King Corporation as a national scholar-athlete. Burger King named scholarship winners during the 1998 season, and each was then a finalist for an end-of-season scholarship award.



## World War II hero Dude Dent

Lewis "Dude" Dent may be remembered for his success on the gridiron, as a legendary performer at Colorado A&M, but he was much more than just a football star. He was a heroic soldier.

That part of his story is much more important, and in May 2009, an episode of the History Channel series *Patton 360* profiled Lt. Dent and his tragic death at Troyes, France, on Aug. 25, 1944, as the American Army approached Paris to liberate it from the Nazi Army. Dent was one of the men that served with the famous general, George Patton, in combat.

A native of Craig, Colo., Dent arrived on the Colorado State campus in the fall of 1939 and became an all-conference halfback for coaches Harry Hughes and Julius "Hans" Wagner from 1940-42.

Besides his role at fullback, Dent was named team captain in 1942 and also kicked and punted for the Aggies.

Following his career at CSU, Dent was drafted by the Brooklyn Dodgers (of the NFL) to play in 1943, but instead he entered into the military shortly before graduation, just a few credits away from a degree in mechanical engineering.

## MATT NEWTON

QUARTERBACK | 2000 MWC OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE YEAR

Matt Newton did a number of things during his illustrious career as quarterback at Colorado State.

But first and foremost, he was a winner. Often.

Newton, from Englewood, Colo., was named the 2000 Mountain West Conference Offensive Player of the Year after leading the Rams to a 10-2 record, a conference title, and a win over Louisville in the Liberty Bowl.

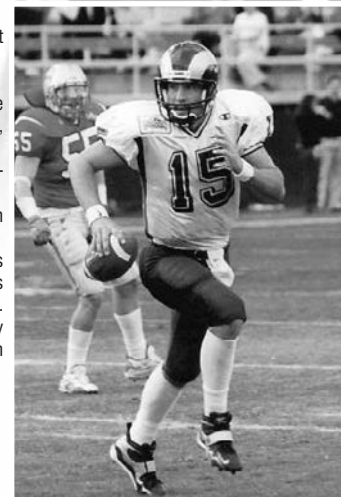
Newton became the second Ram in as many years to win the offensive award, following the trail set by Kevin McDougal, the 1999 winner.

In two seasons as the Rams' starter, Newton led Colorado State to 18 victories in 24 games, the second highest win total by a two-year starter in school history.

He also helped the Rams to back-to-back MWC titles and Liberty Bowl appearances in Memphis, Tenn., where CSU in 2000 concluded one of the most successful seasons in school history with a win over Louisville. The Rams finished No. 14 in the final polls.

Newton finished his career as one of the top passers in school history (currently eighth) with 5,634 career yards. He also is among the leaders in career touchdown passes and total offense.

In 2000, his 2,767 yards passing ranks as the Rams' eighth-highest total ever.



## ERIC PAULY

LINEBACKER | ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICAN, 2002

Eric Pauly will always be regarded as the epitome of a student-athlete in the truest sense of the term.

Pauly completed his playing eligibility in 2003 and also earned his undergraduate degree with a double major in computer information systems and business management. Pauly concluded his playing career with a 3.8 grade-point average and was the speaker for the College of Business fall semester commencement exercise.

The native of Conway Springs, Kan., earned first-team Academic All-America honors in 2002 and was a second-team selection in 2003 as chosen by the College Sports Information Directors of America, despite playing only half the season after a knee injury cut short his career. Pauly was honorable mention in 2001.

He made his mark on the field during a four-year career as a linebacker for the Rams. As a sophomore in 2001, Pauly led the Mountain West Conference in tackles on his way to first-team all-league honors.

In the classroom, he was named to the academic all-district team and was honorable mention Academic All-America.

A year later in 2002, he finished among the top three players in tackles and was a first-team all-league selection once again, and was named first-team Academic All-American.

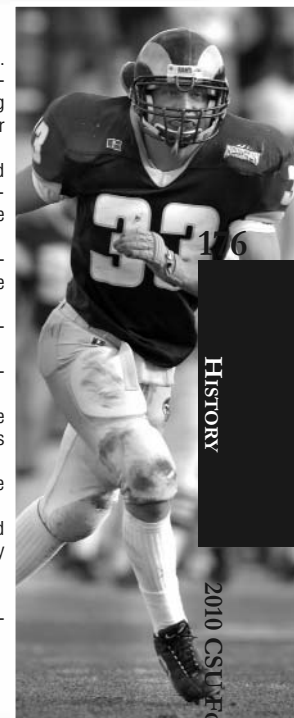
Pauly's senior year was unfortunately cut short by a knee injury in the fifth game of the season. He was so dominant on the field to that point in the season that his tackles total was still atop the league's statistical charts for two weeks after he had been sidelined by the injury.

Conference coaches and media members voted Pauly honorable mention all-conference and he was named second team Academic All-American.

Pauly made 288 career tackles during his career, including 15 behind the line of scrimmage, and he had five quarterback sacks and two pass interceptions. Seventeen times during his career, Pauly had 10 or more tackles in a game.

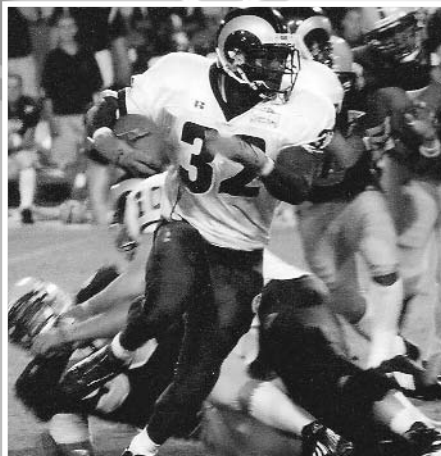
All four years during his varsity career, Pauly was named academic all-MWC.

His success in the classroom and on the field combined to make Pauly one of the finest student-athletes to have ever performed at Colorado State.



## CECIL SAPP

RUNNING BACK | ALL-TIME SINGLE-SEASON RUSHING LEADER |  
2000 LIBERTY BOWL MVP



Running back Cecil Sapp made a statement of national proportions during Colorado State's 22-17 win over Louisville in the 2000 AXA Liberty Bowl game.

Sapp, a native of Miami, Fla., rushed for 160 yards on 36 carries and scored a touchdown in helping the Rams vault to the school's highest-ever end-of-season national ranking, No. 14 in the *Associated Press* poll.

Sapp's performance was impressive in every regard. He ran inside. He ran outside. And he ran more times with the football than any other rusher in the storied tradition of 42 Liberty Bowl games. His 160 yards were the most ever by a Rams player in bowl competition until Gartrell Johnson's 2008 New Mexico Bowl, and Sapp set another record with 36 carries.

Rewarded for his 1,601 yards, which broke Steve Bartalo's single-season CSU rushing record, Sapp was named Colorado State's offensive MVP. And following the bowl, Sapp added another honor to his resume. Media members attending the game named him the Liberty Bowl MVP.

Sapp's list of honors didn't stop with the MVP award. He was named to the All-Bowl Team selected by CBS.Sportsline.com as one of the most prominent postseason performers.

Following his career with the Rams, Sapp was signed as a free agent with the Denver Broncos, where he started several games. He also played with the Houston Texans.

## BRADY SMITH

DEFENSIVE END | 1995 WAC DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE YEAR

Sonny Lubick took little time in placing his footprint on Colorado State's program. Since his arrival, Lubick had preached the virtues of stellar defensive play.

No one took his teachings more to heart than former Ram all-star Brady Smith, who in 1995 was named the Western Athletic Conference's Defensive Player of the Year.

Smith in 1994 had burst onto the regional scene by making 9½ quarterback sacks, still one of the top 10 performances in school history. He played a vital role in Colorado State's 10-2 season and miracle run to the league title and a berth in the Holiday Bowl against Michigan — ironically, the school for which his father played years before.

Smith was back in full force one year later, eclipsing his sacks total of a year before by finishing with 16 - still the top single-season mark in school history.

He concluded his career with 28½ career quarterback sacks, now the second most in school history but a record at the time Smith finished his collegiate career in 1995.

He followed in the footsteps of his father, Steve, who played in the NFL for more than a decade. Brady, following the conclusion of his career at Colorado State, played first for the New Orleans Saints and then for the Atlanta Falcons.



## BRADLEE VAN PELT

QUARTERBACK | 2002 & 2003 MWC OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE YEAR

Quarterback Bradlee Van Pelt will long be remembered as one of the most prolific players in Colorado State football history. Van Pelt earned the distinction of becoming the first player in school history to earn back-to-back conference Offensive Player of the Year honors, in 2002 and 2003.

He closed his career honored in voting by the Mountain West Conference coaches and media covering the league with the offensive award for the second year in a row, and was named the first-team quarterback for a second time, prior to being selected in the NFL Draft by the Denver Broncos.

Van Pelt earned the back-to-back honors by leading CSU in 2003 with 909 rushing yards and 10 touchdowns, and throwing for 2,845 yards and 19 touchdowns. He led the Rams to a school-record fifth consecutive bowl appearance and also received postseason all-star game invitations to the East-West Shrine Game and the Hula Bowl.

Van Pelt ended his Colorado State eligibility as only the fourth quarterback in NCAA Division I-A history to throw for at least 5,000 career yards (6,271) and rush for more than 2,000 career yards (2,308).

He left CSU as the school's career total offense leader, with 8,579 yards, and set a single-season record with 3,754 total yards in 2003 including a single-game record 416 yards in the team's opening game of the season against Colorado.

Van Pelt set another school record for rushing yards in a season by a quarterback, 909 in 2003. He concluded his career with eight 100-yard rushing games, easily the highest total in school history by a quarterback.

In 2002, in his second season as the Rams' starting quarterback, Van Pelt led Colorado State to a 10-4 record and the team's third Mountain West Conference football title in four seasons.

The native of Santa Barbara, Calif., in 2002, rushed for 819 yards and threw for 2,073 yards.

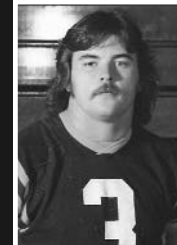

Colorado State — at the time known as the Colorado A&M Aggies — made its first trip to a postseason bowl game at the conclusion of the 1948 football season, capping one of the most successful years in school history.

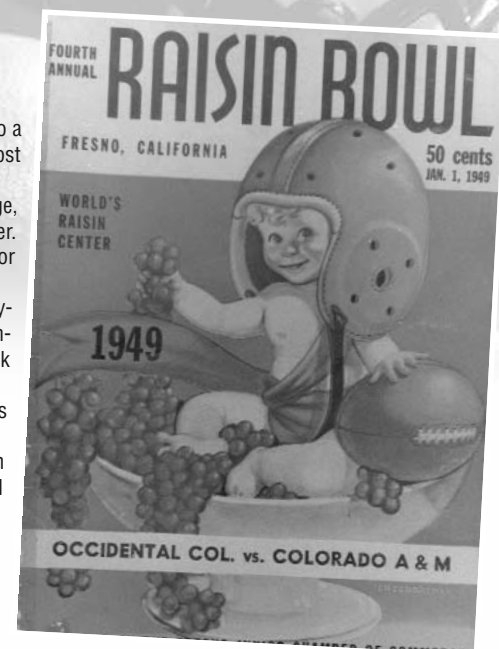
Coached by Bob Davis, Colorado A&M played on New Year's Day against Occidental College, after an 8-2 regular season highlighted by a 29-25 win over in-state rival Colorado in Boulder. The only two regular-season losses came at the hands of Drake and Utah, setting the stage for the team's trip to postseason play.

It was a star-studded Colorado A&M lineup that took the field that day in Fresno. Four players — Fum McGraw, Tuffy Mullison, Dale Dodrill, and Jack Christiansen — were team mainstays and now occupy spots in Colorado State's Sports Hall of Fame. A fifth star, running back Eddie Hanna, tragically would pass away after the opening game of the following season.

McGraw, the school's first consensus All-American, later played with the Detroit Lions, as did Christiansen, while Dodrill played for the Pittsburgh Steelers.

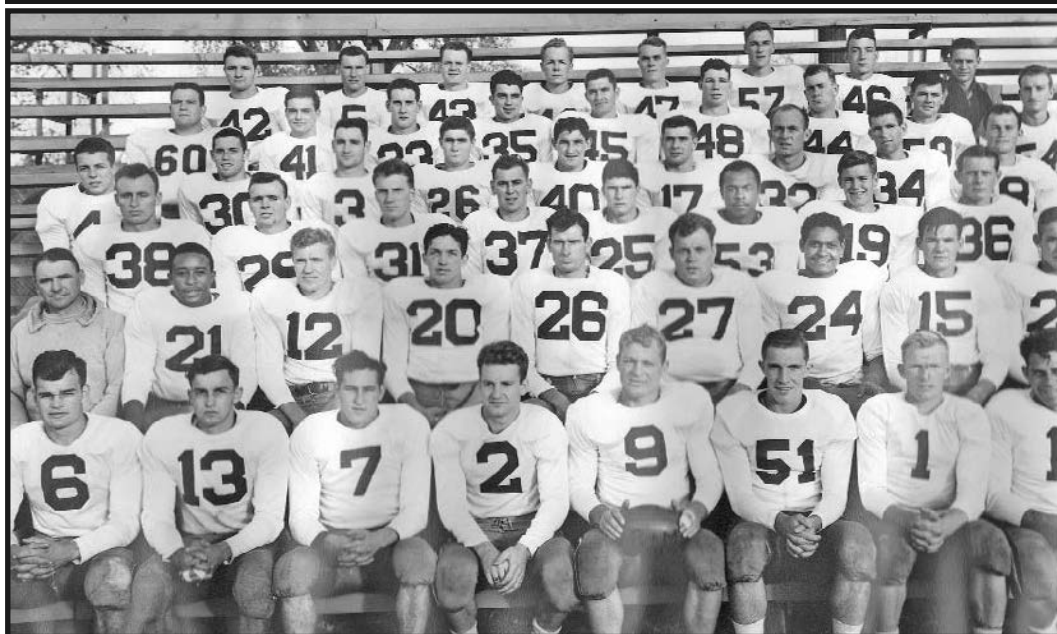
Colorado A&M led 13-0 at halftime behind the play of Hanna. He scored on a 71-yard run after the Aggies had scored when quarterback Bob Hainlen hit Keith Thompson with a 5-yard scoring pass. But Occidental scored 21 second-half points to rally for the victory.

Hanna gave the Aggies their final touchdown of the game on a 79-yard run.

Colorado State's 8-4 regular-season record drew bowl attention and thrust the team into the national limelight in Freedom Bowl VII.



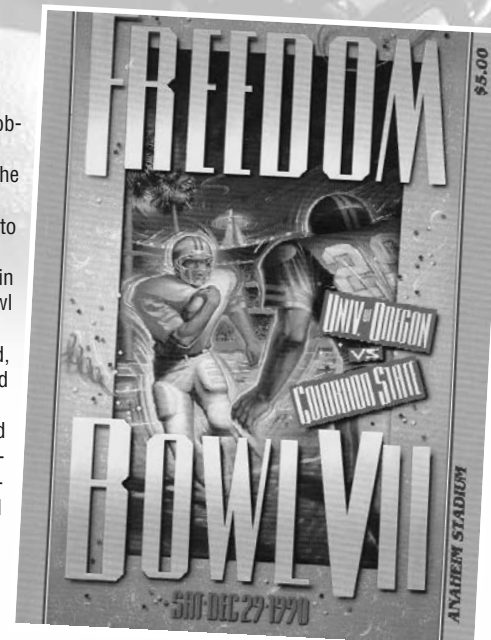

The Rams were matched against PAC-10 member Oregon in what would turn out to be one of the season's most exciting bowl games.

Colorado State scored first, opening the game with a 75-yard, 15-play drive on Mike Gimenez's 1-yard plunge. Oregon later led 17-14, setting the stage for a dramatic fourth quarter.

Trailing 25-19, the Rams took the lead on Gimenez's 49-yard pass to Greg Primus, then added insurance on Todd Yert's 52-yard scoring run to lead 32-25 with minutes remaining. But Oregon made one last grasp at victory behind quarterback Bill Musgrave, who led his team on a 79-yard scoring drive. The Rams' Selwyn Jones then thwarted the Ducks' two-point conversion pass attempt, an amazing play, to seal the win.

Yert was named the game's Offensive MVP, while teammate Robert Chirico earned defensive honors.

Holiday Bowl 17 featured the young and enthusiastic upstart Rams, representing the Western Athletic Conference for the first time ever in the postseason event, against the Big Ten's Michigan Wolverines, long a bastion of college football tradition.

Colorado State served notice on the night in San Diego that the Rams' program would be a force in coming years. Following a Michigan touchdown on the Wolverines' initial drive of the game, Colorado State answered.

Quarterback Anthony Hill drove the Rams 66 yards in nine plays for the tying touchdown, hitting receiver Paul Turner on a 32-yard scoring play.

Hill, a native of San Diego, later would be honored as Colorado State's Offensive MVP in the game.

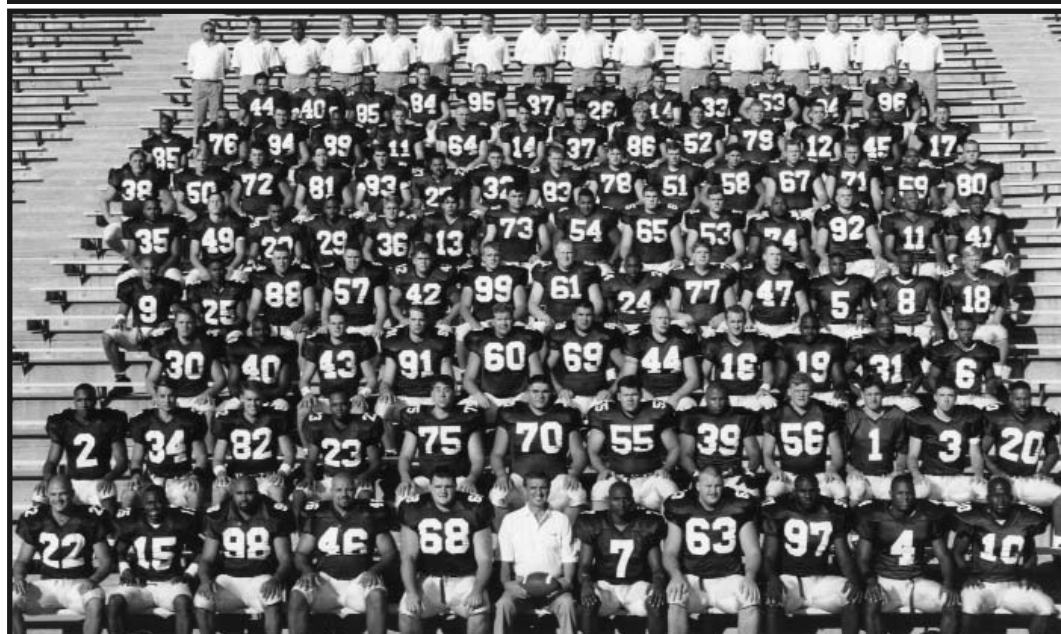
The Rams put their final touchdown on the scoreboard late in the game when Hill found receiver Jeremy Burkett down the right sideline for an 18-yard touchdown pass.

By game's end, statistics reflected the closeness of the contest. Michigan had gained 341 total yards, only 1 more than the Rams had managed.

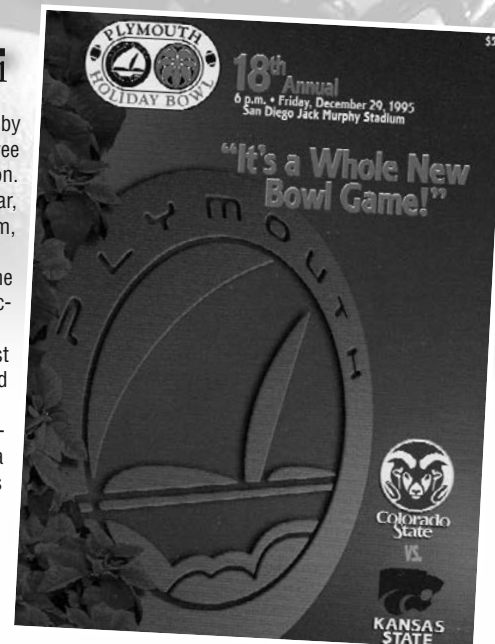

Kansas State entered the game ranked among the top 10 teams nationally after finishing in a tie for second in the Big Eight Conference.

The teams were tied, 7-7, at the end of the first quarter before an interception and a partially blocked punt led to K-State's 19 second-quarter points.

The Rams were led offensively by freshman running back Damon Washington. Playing before a hometown crowd, Washington stung Kansas State's defense for 101 yards on just 10 carries, scoring one touchdown.

Defensively, Colorado State cornerback Ray Jackson intercepted a pass and returned it 60 yards for a touchdown on a play that was nullified by an official's inadvertent whistle.

Colorado State made its intentions known from the outset, taking the first drive on a crisp evening in San Diego 85 yards in 13 plays for a touchdown. Wide receiver Darran Hall — a San Diego native — capped the drive, scoring on a 14-yard reverse.

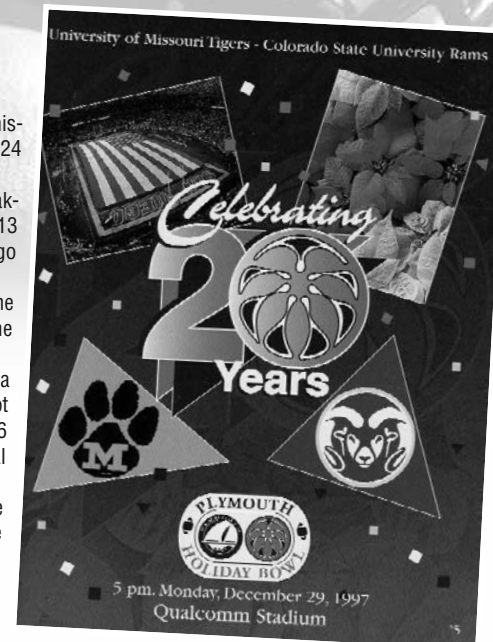
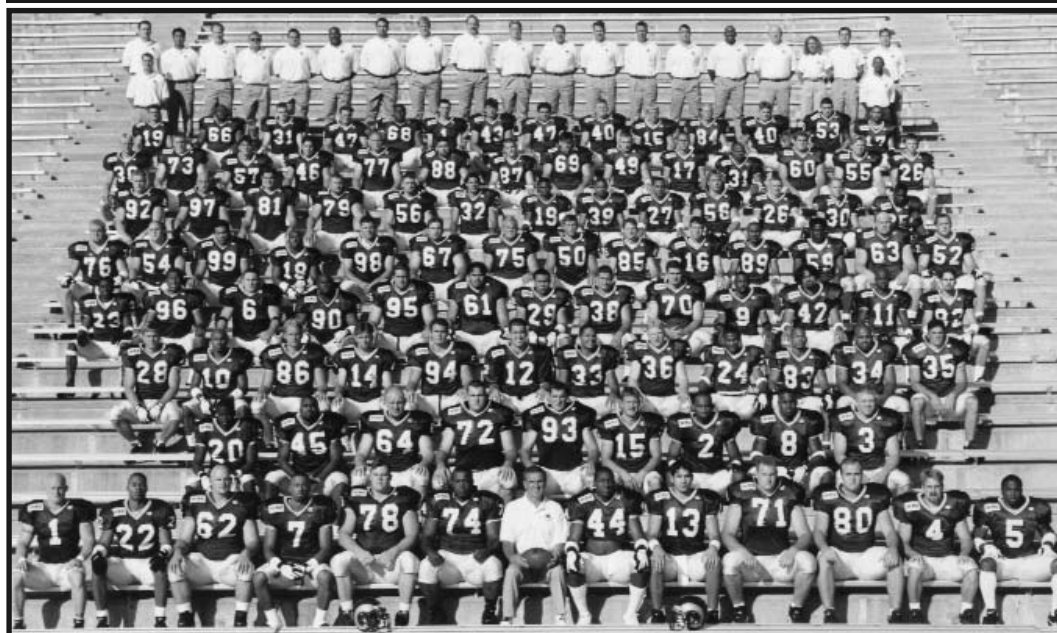
Hall played a major role in the game, taking a punt early in the third quarter and returning it 85 yards for a touchdown, the longest such return in the bowl's history.

He and teammate Moses Moreno — another San Diego-area native — were the game's co-MVPs. Moreno, despite a sore foot injured during the game, completed 18-of-24 passes for 206 yards and two touchdowns. Running back Kevin McDougal gained 110 yards on 18 carries.

Colorado State's defense was equally as impressive. The Rams limited Missouri to just 68 passing yards. Linebacker Willie Taylor and safety Myron Terry led the way with eight tackles apiece, while Eric Vaughn had seven stops.

One of the game's many highlights came with 10:44 to play and the Rams nursing a 28-24 lead. Reserve quarterback Ryan Eslinger, lined up as the holder in a field goal formation, faked that play and instead ran up the middle for a 23-yard touchdown to seal the victory.

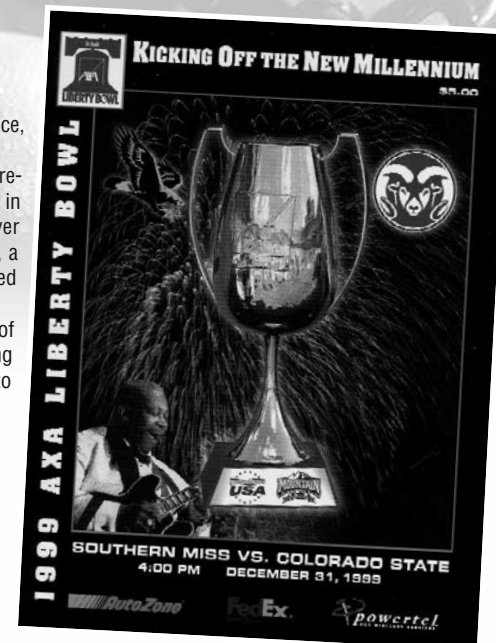
The Liberty Bowl pitted the Rams, first-ever champions of the Mountain West Conference, against Conference USA champion Southern Mississippi.

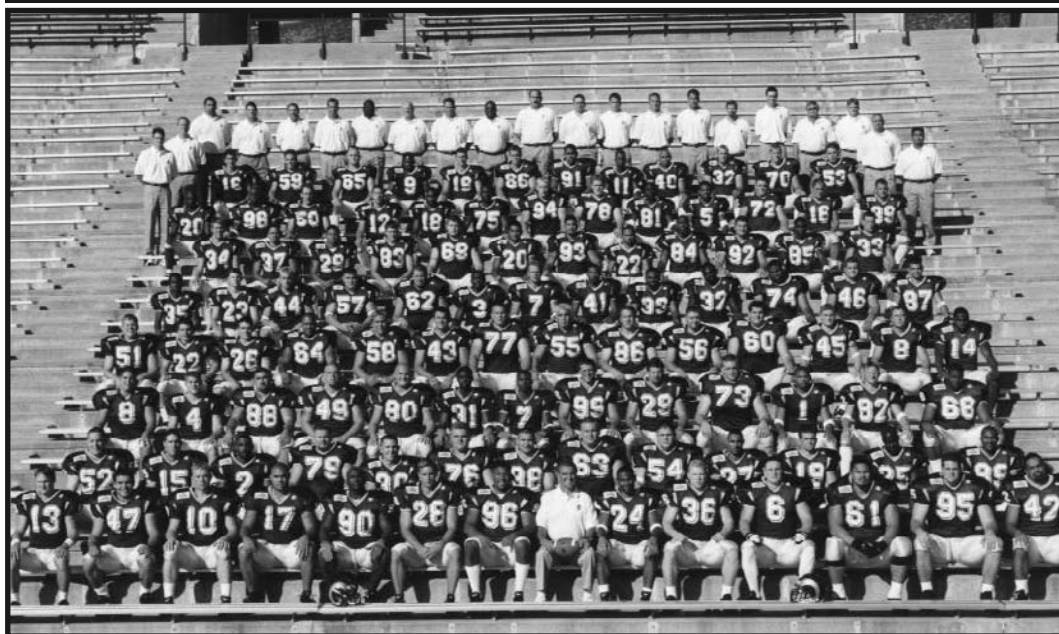
Colorado State's final touchdown of the game came on a 38-yard scoring pass from quarterback Matt Newton to H-Back Cory Woolstenhulme.

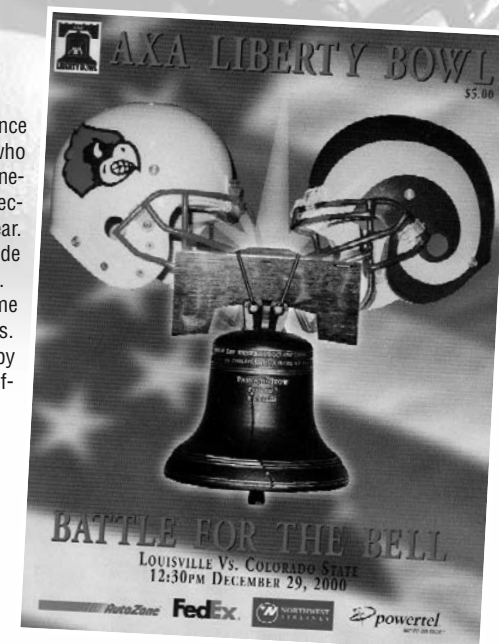
Colorado State entered the game having won a second straight Mountain West Conference title. Coach Sonny Lubick's Rams featured eight players — the most in school history — who were named first-team all-league. Included in that group were quarterback Matt Newton and line-backer Rick Crowell, named the league's offensive and defensive players of the year, respectively. For the fourth time in seven seasons, Lubick was named the league's coach of the year. Running back Cecil Sapp's 2-yard scoring run in the second quarter tied the game, and wide receiver Frank Rice's 16-yard reverse late in the first half put the Rams ahead to stay, 16-10.

Sapp set a bowl and school bowl game record with 36 rushes, and his 160 yards.

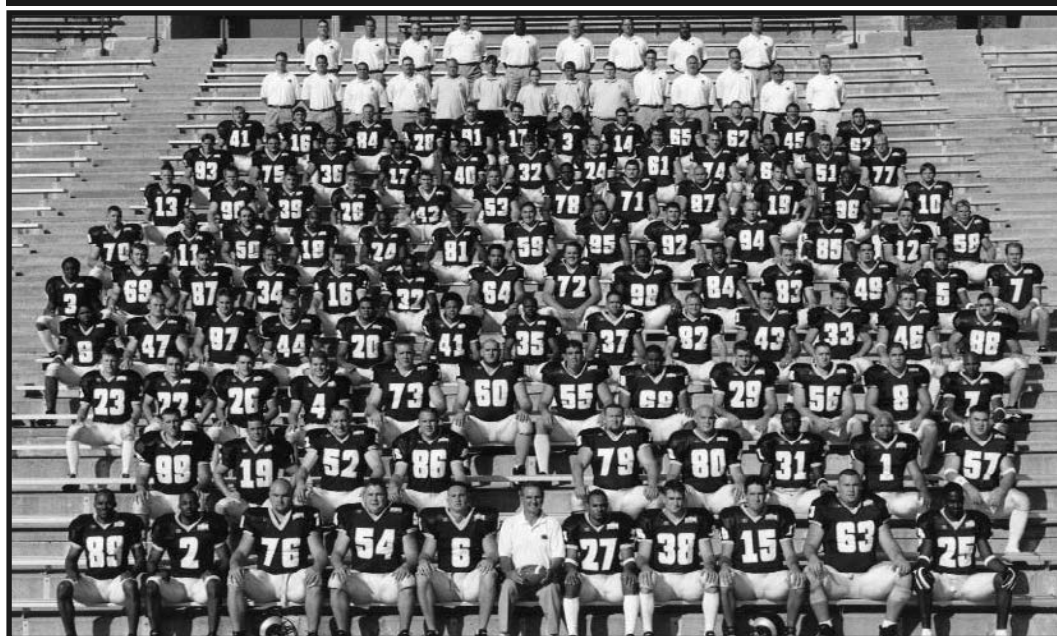
Colorado State was later voted 14th by the *Associated Press*, the highest end-of-season AP ranking in school history.

CSU won the first-ever New Orleans Bowl played at the Louisiana Superdome, home to Super Bowl XXXVI just seven weeks later. And, the win marked the first time in school history that Colorado State had won back-to-back bowl games.

Colorado State coach Sonny Lubick guided the Rams to five wins in the team's final six games, including the team's sixth bowl game since 1994.

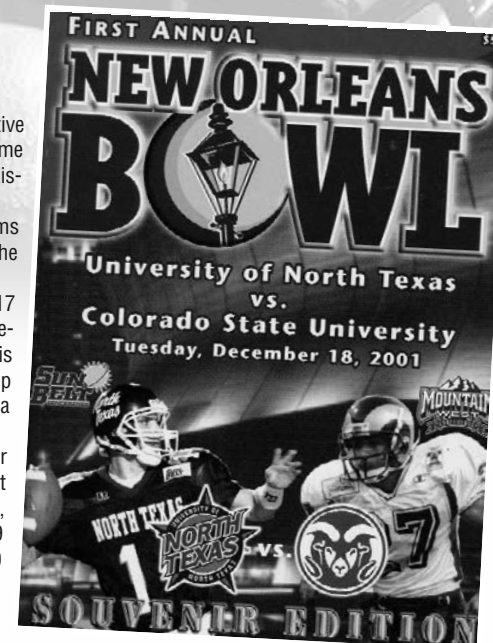
The Rams took control of the game early, scoring 17 points in the first quarter and 24 by halftime. Senior receiver Brad Svoboda scored the first touchdown of his career, a 2-yard reverse, on the game's first drive, set up by a 56-yard catch-and-run play by Pete Rebstock on a pass from Bradlee Van Pelt.

Colorado State sealed the win in the third quarter when the game's MVP, Justin Gallimore, blocked a punt and recovered it for a touchdown to put the Rams up, 31-14. The Rams' defense, which allowed only 329

yards, was led by linebacker Eric Pauly's 10 tackles, while safety Aaron Sprague also had 10 stops.

Offensively, running back Henri Childs led the way with 97 rushing yards. Backup Chad Dixon, a senior playing in his first game as a Ram, scored a touchdown in the fourth quarter on a 2-yard run.

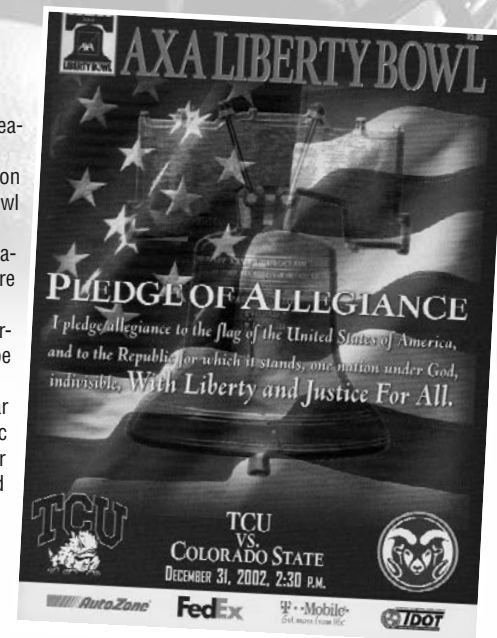
Colorado State entered the game with a 10-3 record, the fourth time in Sonny Lubick's career at Colorado State the Rams had won 10 or more games in a season.

Jeff Babcock's 46-yard field goal in the third quarter put the Rams on the scoreboard and proved to be the only scoring for the Rams in the game.

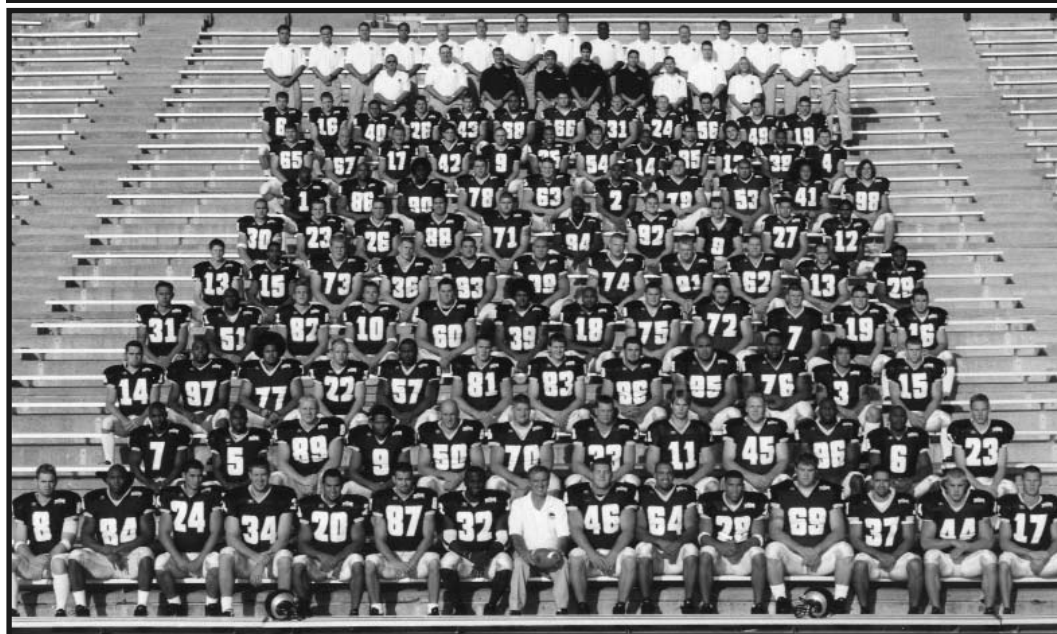

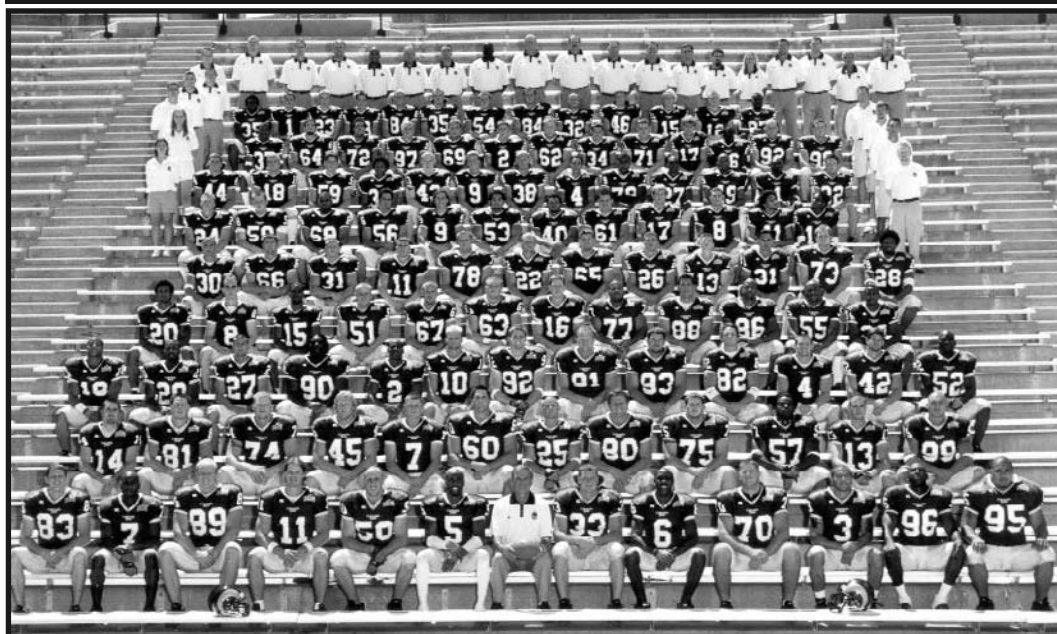

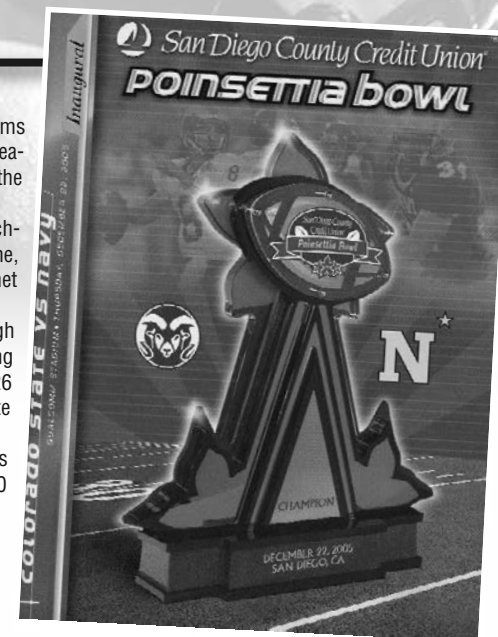

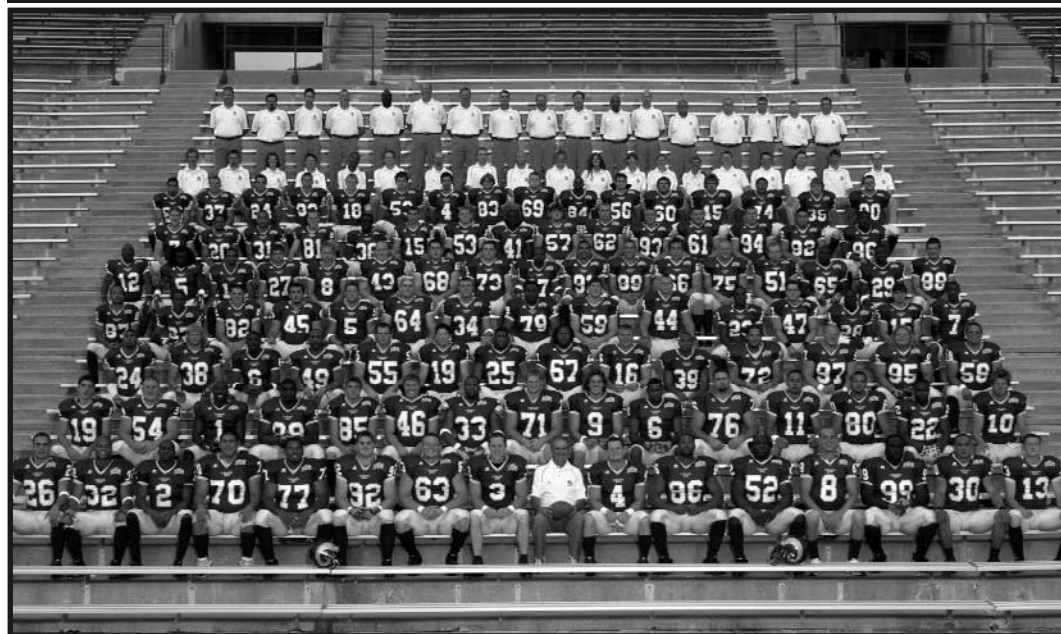

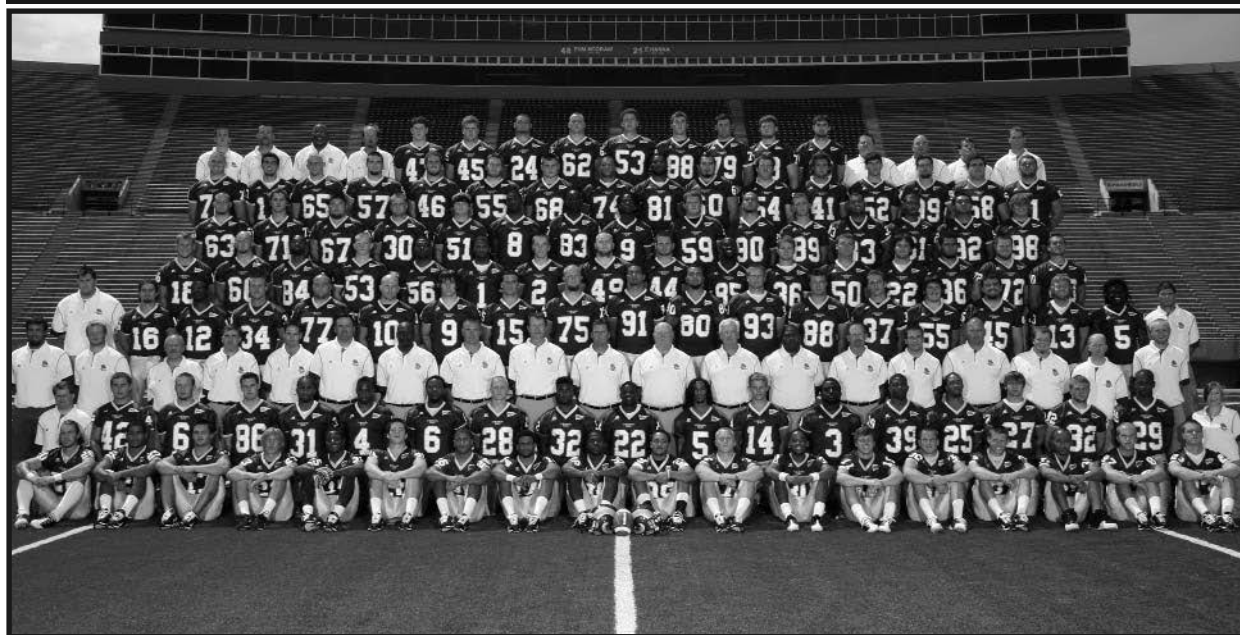

**DURKEE FIELD (1899-1911)**

While little is known about the program's home grounds in 1893 and '94, when the school's new college athletic organization resurrected football in 1899, the team's first official field was constructed in the spring of 1899.

In May 1899, the area between Agricultural Hall and the Chemical Building (where South College Gym sits today) was cleared of trees and drained of water. The ground was then graded to make a flat playing surface. With the railroad tracks on the west and South College Avenue on the east, this low-lying ground was actually a natural streambed, which is marked today by a tunnel under the railroad tracks. This stream becomes active when torrents of rain wash through the campus, such as the devastating flood of 1997.

The newly reformed football team of 1899 played the first games here on a playing surface made up of primarily dirt and rocks.

In 1901, a graduate from the Class of 1900 named Charles Durkee donated money for a tall wooden fence, erected on three sides of the field with the railroad tracks acting as a barrier for the fourth side. The barriers helped keep non-paying fans out better than the military cadets (the previous system for chasing off freeloaders). In return for his fence, the college named the athletic grounds Durkee Field.

Bleachers were later added for spectators to watch games as well as military drills.

The facility was described by former players and head coach Harry Hughes as horrible to walk on, let alone play football. That stream would reap-

pear during wet weather and ran through the playing field during some games.

Hughes' first football season of 1911 marked Durkee's last season of hosting football. When the rules of football changed to standardize the 100-yard field, Hughes used that opportunity to build a better field for his athletes.

The military continued to drill on Durkee for several years, and tennis courts were later added for women's athletics. But in 1925, ground was broken for a new gym and fieldhouse that opened in 1927 and still stands there today.

**SONNY LUBICK FIELD AT HUGHES STADIUM (1968-PRESENT)**

Built at the base of the Hog Back Mountains in the shadow of the Aggie "A," Hughes Stadium has served Colorado State for more than 40 years. The site of not just football, but also Rolling Stones and Beach Boys concerts, the 34,400-seat stadium was named after legendary coach Harry Hughes. After great success in the 1990s, the stadium was expanded and the field re-named in honor of all-time head coach Sonny Lubick.

**COLORADO FIELD (1912-67)**

In 1910, the site of a college experiment station that grew potatoes was identified as the location where the future athletic field should be built. After two years of lobbying and with the support of college president Charles Lory, construction began on May 23, 1912.

Students and faculty, including Lory, removed rocks and planted seed to build the first college football field in Colorado with grass.

Play began in the fall of 1912, after 1,000-seat grandstands were added by the beginning of football season. A cinder track around the field was added in 1914, since Harry Hughes was also the track coach.

In September 1912, the school built a clubhouse just east of the railroad tracks on what is now University Avenue, providing locker rooms and showers for both the Aggies and visiting players. Coupled with the outstanding grass surface and clubhouse, the state-of-the-art football stadium was the envy of the region and helped the Aggies to win eight conference championships over the next 25 years. The ninth and final conference championship team to play on Colorado Field was in 1955.

Over the 55 years Colorado Field served the Aggies, larger grandstands were built and bleachers were added on the east side and end zones. Today, Jack Christiansen Track, home to CSU's outdoor track and field squads and

named after the Pro Football Hall of Famer, stands on the site where Colorado Field once graced the CSU campus.

In 1961 the university conducted a study to determine whether to turn Colorado Field into a major-college football stadium, or replace it with a new venue on the foothills campus. Because of traffic concerns and the facility's location in the center of Fort Collins, officials opted to construct a new stadium west of town, at the foothills.

The last varsity game played on Colorado Field was in 1967, shortly before its demolition.

From its inception in 1999, the Mountain West Conference has been committed to excellence in intercollegiate athletics, while promoting the academic missions of its member institutions. Progressive in its approach, the MWC continues to cultivate opportunities for student-athletes to compete at the highest level, while fostering academic achievement and sportsmanship. Now in its ninth year, the MWC has been assertive in its involvement with the NCAA governance structure and has taken a leadership role in the overall administration of intercollegiate athletics.

The Mountain West Conference is noted for its geographic diversity. Some of the most beautiful terrain and landscapes in the nation can be found within Mountain West Conference boundaries, including the majestic Rocky Mountain range, which borders four MWC schools (Utah, BYU, Air Force and Colorado State). The high plains of Wyoming (elevation 7,220 feet – the highest Division I campus in the nation) contrast with the desert city of Las Vegas (the fastest growing metropolitan area in the West) and the Pacific Ocean locale of San Diego State. The southwestern flavor of New Mexico complements the western heritage and culture of Fort Worth, Texas, home of the MWC's newest member, TCU.

The Mountain West Conference was conceived on May 26, 1998, when the presidents of eight institutions — Air Force, BYU, Colorado State, New Mexico, San Diego State, UNLV, Utah and Wyoming — decided to form a new NCAA Division I-A intercollegiate athletic conference.

The split from the former 16-team conference re-established continuity and stability among the membership within the new league and signaled the continuation of its tradition-rich, long-standing athletic rivalries. Five of the MWC's eight original members have been conference rivals since the 1960s (BYU, Utah, New Mexico, Wyoming, Colorado State), while San Diego State (1978) and Air Force (1980) were longtime members as well. UNLV entered the fold in 1996 and TCU began its first year of competition in 2005-06, completing the membership in the MWC as it stands today. In 2011, the Mountain West will add national football power Boise State, expected to be among the top five teams in the 2010 preseason polls.

**REVIEWABLE PLAYS — Scoring Plays:** 1. Reviewable plays involving a potential score include: a. Live ball breaking the plane of a goal line while in a ball carrier's possession. b. Live ball ruled dead in possession of a ball carrier when in the immediate continuing action the ball breaks the plane of the opponent's goal line. c. Field goal attempts if and only if the ball is ruled (a) below or above the crossbar or (b) inside or outside the uprights when it is lower than the top of the uprights. If the ball is higher than the top of the uprights as it crosses the end line, the play may not be reviewed.

**Passes:** Reviewable plays involving passes include: a. Pass ruled complete, incomplete or intercepted anywhere in the field of play or an end zone. b. Forward pass touched by a player or an official. c. Forward pass or forward handing when a ball carrier is or has been beyond the neutral zone. d. A forward pass or forward handing after a change of team possession. e. Pass ruled forward or backward when thrown from behind the neutral zone. 1. If the pass is ruled forward and is incomplete, the play is reviewable only if there is clear recovery of a loose ball in the immediate continuing action after the loose ball. If the replay official does not have indisputable video evidence as to which team recovers, the ruling of incomplete pass stands. 2. If the replay official reverses an incomplete forward pass ruling and the ball is recovered, it belongs to the recovering team at the spot of the recovery and any advance is nullified.

**Dead Ball and Loose Ball:** Reviewable plays involving potential dead balls and loose balls include: a. Loose ball by a potential passer ruled a fumble. b. Loose ball by a passer ruled incomplete forward pass when there is clear recovery in the immediate continuing action after the loose ball. 1. If the replay official does not have indisputable video evidence as to which team recovers, the ruling of incomplete pass stands. 2. If the replay official rules fumble, the ball belongs to the recovering team at the spot of the recovery and any advance is nullified. c. Live ball not ruled dead in possession of a ball carrier. d. Live ball ruled dead in possession of a ball carrier when the clear recovery of a loose ball occurs in the immediate continuing action after the loose ball. 1. If the ball is ruled dead and the replay official does not have indisputable video evidence as to which team recovers, the dead-ball ruling stands. 2. If the replay official rules that the ball was not dead, it belongs to the recovering team at the spot of the recovery and any advance is nullified. e. Ball carrier's forward progress with respect to a first down. f. Catch or recovery of a fumble by a Team A player other than the fumbler before any change of possession

during fourth down or a try. g. Ball carrier in or out of bounds. If a ball carrier is ruled out of bounds, the play is not reviewable, except as in Rules 12-3-1-b and 12-3-3-c. h. Catch, recovery or touching of a loose ball by a player potentially touching a sideline or end line. i. A loose ball touching on or beyond a sideline, goal line, or end line, touching a pylon, or breaking the plane of a goal line.

**Kicks:** Reviewable plays involving kicks include: a. Touching of a kick. b. Player beyond the neutral zone when kicking the ball. c. Kicking team player advancing a ball after a potential muffed kick/ fumble by the receiving team. d. Scrimmage kick crossing the neutral zone.

**Miscellaneous:** a. The number of players participating by either team during a live ball. b. Clock adjustment when a ruling is reviewed. c. Correcting the number of a down. 1. This includes the result of a penalty enforcement that includes an automatic first down or loss of down. 2. The correction may be made at any time within that series of downs or before the ball is legally put in play after that series. d. Any person who is not a player interfering with live-ball action occurring in the field of play.

**LIMITATIONS ON REVIEWABLE PLAYS** — No other plays or officiating decisions are reviewable. However, the replay official may correct egregious errors, including those involving the game clock, whether or not a play is reviewable. This excludes fouls that are not specifically reviewable.

**INSTANT REPLAY PERSONNEL, EQUIPMENT AND LOCATION — Personnel:** Instant replay personnel shall consist of the number of persons needed to operate the replay equipment within the necessary time constraints. There shall be a minimum of three persons to ensure that all plays are reviewed in an efficient and timely manner. Such persons are normally referred to as replay official, communicator and technician. Additional personnel may be used as needed.

**Equipment:** The type of equipment used to carry out necessary instant replay duties shall be determined by each conference or member institution using instant replay.

**Location:** a. All equipment used reviewing a play during the replay process and the personnel using that equipment shall be located in a separate, secure location in the press box. This room shall not be available or accessible to any person not directly involved in instant replay. b. Additional telephonic equipment needed to allow instant replay personnel to communicate with the game referee when a game has been stopped

for a play review shall be located on a sideline near the field of play and preferably outside a team area. Such equipment shall provide the game referee and the replay official a secure and private means of communication.

**INITIATING THE REPLAY PROCESS — Game Stop:** There are two methods to stop a game to review a ruling on the field. a. The replay official and his crew shall review every play of a game. He may stop a game at any time before the ball is next legally put in play (Exception: Rule 12-3-5-c) whenever he believes that: 1. There is reasonable evidence to believe an error was made in the initial on-field ruling. 2. The play is reviewable. 3. The outcome of a review would have a direct, competitive impact on the game. b. The head coach of either team may request that the game be stopped and a play be reviewed by challenging the on-field ruling. 1. A head coach initiates this challenge by taking a team timeout before the ball is next legally put in play

(Exception: Rule 12-3-5-c) and informing the referee that he is challenging the ruling of the previous play. If a head coach's challenge is successful, he retains the challenge, which he may use only once more during the game. Thus, a coach may have a total of two challenges if and only if his initial challenge is successful. 2. After a review has been completed, if the on-field ruling is reversed, that team's timeout will not be charged. 3. After a review has been completed, and the on-field ruling is not reversed, the charged team timeout counts as one of the three permitted that team for that half or the one permitted in that extra period. 4. A head coach may not challenge a ruling in which the game was stopped and a decision has already been made by the replay official. If a head coach requests a team timeout to challenge an on-field ruling and the play being challenged is not reviewable, the timeout shall count as one of the three permitted his team during that half of the game or the one permitted in that extra period. 6. A head coach may not challenge an on-field ruling if all the team's timeouts have been used for that half or in that extra period.

**When To Stop a Game:** A game may be stopped, either by the replay official or by a head coach's challenge, at any time before the ball is next legally put in play (Exception: Rule 12-3-5-c). b. No game official may request that a game be stopped for a play to be reviewed.

Following are football program media policies jointly established by Head Coach Steve Fairchild and the athletic media relations office. For your own benefit, please take a few minutes to read through the policies. Violations could result in revoked credentials. ## Media availability throughout calendar year

### In general...

- ▶ All interviews with any member of the football program, including the coaching staff and student-athletes, must be coordinated through the athletic media relations office (or when requesting Head Coach Steve Fairchild through his assistant, Linda Krier).

### Spring/August preseason practice...

- ▶ All student-athletes will be available by request following each spring and fall camp practice. Coaches are available by request in person following each spring practice, and by phone during the lunch hour of fall camp practices (due to film review and meeting schedule).
- ▶ All interviews must take place at field level, either inside or outside the southwest Moby Arena doors. Media are not permitted in the football office area following practice, or in the training room or locker room.
- ▶ Student-athletes not participating in a practice session are not available for interviews until the end of practice.
- ▶ Following the spring game, Head Coach Steve Fairchild will be available. After Fairchild finishes taking questions, the locker room will open to media.
- ▶ All text messages and phone calls (cell, office or home) to any coach or student-athlete must be previously arranged through the athletic media relations office, or in the case of Fairchild, through assistant Linda Krier.

### Regular-season game weeks...

- ▶ On Monday, Head Coach Steve Fairchild will conduct a weekly press luncheon in the Hall of Fame Room on the south concourse of Moby Arena. The school offers media a complimentary lunch that will begin at 12:30 p.m. Fairchild will begin speaking at 1 p.m. and the session should conclude by 1:30 p.m.
- ▶ On Monday, coordinators Larry Kerr (defense), Greg Peterson (offense) and Larry Lewis (special teams) will be available from 1:30-2 p.m. in the Hall of Fame Room. Advance requests should be made through the athletic media relations office by 11 a.m. each Monday morning. All interviews with assistant coaches should be conducted in the Hall of Fame Room, and not in the football office area.

- ▶ On Monday, student-athletes will be available in the afternoon by request. Requests must be made through the athletic media relations office by 9 a.m. each Monday morning.
- ▶ On Tuesday, Fairchild will conduct a morning Mountain West coaches conference call. That will represent his only media availability on Tuesday.
- ▶ On Wednesday, Fairchild will be available following practice.
- ▶ On Tuesday and Wednesday, all assistant coaches and student-athletes will be available following practice. All interviews must take place at field level, either inside or outside the southwest Moby Arena doors. Interviews are not permitted in the football office area following practice, or in the training room or locker room.
- ▶ Student-athletes not participating in a practice session are not available for interviews until the end of practice.
- ▶ On Thursday, coaches will be available following practice, upon request through the athletic media relations office. Student-athletes are not available to media after conducting Wednesday interviews until following the game.
- ▶ There is no availability from Friday until the end of the game Saturday, except for contractual broadcast obligations.
- ▶ Telephone interviews with a coach or student-athlete should be arranged at least 24 hours in advance of the requested session, through the athletic media relations office.
- ▶ Text messages or phone calls (cell, office or home) to any coach or student-athlete must be previously arranged through the athletic media relations office.
- ▶ Media should contact the athletic media relations office, rather than the individual coaches and/or student-athletes, when needing personal contact information, such as phone numbers or e-mail addresses.
- ▶ On occasion, practices will close to the media.

### Gameday...

- ▶ All coaches and players must report immediately to the locker room before conducting interviews of any kind. Other than network obligations, CSU does not allow on-field interviews following the final gun.
- ▶ Head Coach Steve Fairchild will meet the media following a 10-minute cooling-off period in a designated area. The CSU locker room is closed. Requested coaches and players will be brought to the interview area.

### Recruiting period...

- ▶ Access to Head Coach Steve Fairchild and the coaching staff will be limited during this time, from the end of the regular season through signing day, the first Wednesday in February, due to recruiting responsibilities.
- ▶ Contact Linda Krier (Fairchild), or Zak Gilbert (for all other coaches and student-athletes) with interview requests.

### All other times...

- ▶ Head Coach Steve Fairchild is available either in-person or by phone by appointment through his assistant, Linda Krier (970/491-7818). Appointments should be requested from 8 a.m. – 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.
- ▶ All assistant coaches and student-athletes are available either in-person or by phone, but only after making an appointment through the athletic media relations office. (continued on next page)

#### (ALL OTHER TIMES continued)

- ▶ Telephone interviews with a coach or student-athlete should be arranged at least 24 hours in advance of the requested session, through the athletic media relations office.
- ▶ Text messages and phone calls (cell, office or home) to any coach or student-athlete are strictly prohibited, unless previously arranged through the athletic media relations office.
- ▶ Media should contact the athletic media relations office, rather than the individual coaches and/or student-athletes, when needing personal contact information, such as phone numbers or e-mail addresses.

### Injuries

- ▶ At all times throughout the calendar year, including spring practice, Head Coach Steve Fairchild will serve as the sole source for injury information. All questions related to injuries should be directed to Fairchild, rather than assistant coaches or the athletes. Athletic training staff members will refer injury questions to Fairchild.
- ▶ If Fairchild is unavailable, contact the athletic media relations office.

### Practice guidelines

- ▶ All outdoor Colorado State football practices are open to the public and to the media in their entirety unless otherwise noted.
- ▶ All media should remain on the sidelines, standing a safe distance from the boundary to prevent collisions. Also for safety reasons, media are asked to stand rather than sit or kneel, and should either hold personal bags or set them behind a barrier, so they are not a potential injury source for players or the media.

### Photography guidelines

- ▶ Cameras are restricted from shooting/filming any 11-on-11 period, as well as selected other periods (athletic media relations staff will notify).
- ▶ Photographers and videographers are not allowed to bring tripods onto the practice field.
- ▶ Photographers and videographers should remain on the sidelines, or behind the end lines. They are not permitted in any drill at any time.
- ▶ Photographers should stand a safe distance from the boundary to prevent collisions. Also for safety reasons, photographers are asked to stand rather than sit or kneel, and should either hold personal bags and/or camera equipment, or set them behind a barrier, so they are not a potential injury source for players or the media.
- ▶ Media are not permitted near the post-practice team huddle. Those wishing to shoot/film the huddle should remain on the sidelines. Audio from the huddle should not be collected in any way.
- ▶ All posed photo shoots must take place at times arranged prior to the beginning of practice, working through the athletic media relations office. Photo shoots are not permitted to take place during any practice.

### Telephone interviews

- ▶ Head Coach Steve Fairchild is available for phone interviews as time permits. Media should call to make an appointment through his assistant, Linda Krier (970/491-7818). Krier is available from 8 a.m. – 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. He should not be contacted directly at any time.
- ▶ All other assistant coaches and student-athletes are available for phone interviews as time permits during the applicable time of the year outlined above, provided the interview is arranged through the athletic media relations office.
- ▶ Telephone interviews with a coach or student-athlete should be arranged at least 24 hours in advance of the requested session, through the athletic media relations office.
- ▶ Text messages or phone calls (cell, office or home) to any coach or student-athlete are strictly prohibited, unless previously arranged through the athletic media relations office.
- ▶ Media should contact the athletic media relations office, rather than the individual coaches and/or student-athletes, when needing personal contact information, such as phone numbers or e-mail addresses.

### CSURAMS.com

- ▶ The official Web site for Colorado State athletics is CSURams.com, featuring the latest news, information, statistics, and rosters for all of the Rams' 16 athletic programs. Ram fans worldwide can also listen to the live play-by-play coverage offered by the Colorado State Sports Network through the Internet site. ### Media Credentials

- ▶ Credentials must be requested through director of media relations Zak Gilbert in writing at least seven days in advance of an event. Approved requests will be mailed or can be picked up in the media relations office.

### Photographer Credentials

- ▶ Photo credentials are issued only to accredited photographers. Passes must be displayed at all times. All photographers must remain outside the 25-yard lines on both sides of the field.

### Game-Day Services

- ▶ A pregame luncheon is served 90 minutes prior to kickoff. In-game services include statistics and play-by-play information following each quarter and notes and statistics following the conclusion of the game.

### Telephone Service

- ▶ Contact the local Qwest representative for telephone service. Qwest provides the line, but each media representative must provide his/her own individual handset. Two telephones located in the Hughes Stadium press box are available on a first-come, first-served basis.

### Radio Reports

- ▶ Individuals planning to do radio reports during a game should secure their own phone lines in the press box.

### Parking

- ▶ Media parking is available at Sonny Lubick Field at Hughes Stadium in selected lots. Please contact the CSU media relations office to request a Hughes Stadium parking pass.
- ▶ Access to the parking lot immediately west of the McGraw Center will require an "A" permit from 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. weekdays. A limited number of season passes are available through the media relations office. Annual permits can be purchased through the Office of Parking Management Web site: [www.colostate.edu/depts/parking](http://www.colostate.edu/depts/parking).

## BRIAN ROTH

VOICE OF THE RAMS | 11TH YEAR WITH CSU

Colorado State fans have heard Brian Roth's accounts and analysis of Rams football and basketball, in a supporting role, for nine years. But beginning in 2010, Roth will take the lead microphone on the CSU Radio Network as Voice of the Rams.

Only the fifth individual over the last two decades to hold that title, Roth will call play-by-play action for every CSU football and men's basketball game.

During the football season, Roth also will host the Coors Light Steve Fairchild Radio Show on Wednesday nights, as well as the Coors Light Basketball Coaches Show during the hoops season. Both shows air live from Old Town Fort Collins on the CSU Radio Network.

A versatile and accomplished professional, Roth worked the previous three years alongside Jerry Schemmel (2009) and Rich Bircumshaw (2007-08) as the Rams' color man for football broadcasts. For six seasons before that, he served as the network's sideline reporter.

Roth, 35, debuted as the play-by-play man for CSU women's basketball in 2000-01, and held that role until replacing Schemmel. During his 10-year tenure courtside at Moby Arena, Roth was behind the microphone for three NCAA tournament games, a regular-season MWC championship and an MWC tournament title.

Roth has also filled in as the play-by-play voice on many Colorado State men's basketball broadcasts, including 2007 when Tim Miles' squad captured the BP Top of the World Classic in Fairbanks, Alaska.

A Colorado native and 1993 graduate of Smoky Hill High School in Aurora, Colo., Roth resides in Denver. The general manager of Ingram Sports Production Network (ISPN), he oversees production of more than 125 events per year for Comcast Entertainment Television (CET). Roth manages a 14-employee production team for ISPN and brings an unparalleled knowledge of high school sports in the state of Colorado to the broadcast booth. Roth has also called WCHA college hockey for Comcast and Big Sky basketball for Altitude Sports and Entertainment.

A 1998 graduate of the University of Colorado, Roth and his newlywed wife Corinne Hofstetter were married Aug. 1. Hofstetter, a Mountain West Conference champion in the 200 Butterfly in 2003 and '04, powered Colorado State to consecutive runner-up finishes at the MWC swimming & diving championships during those two seasons.



## KEVIN McGLUE

COLOR ANALYST | NINTH YEAR WITH CSU

Kevin McGlue, entering his ninth season on the Rams Radio Network, begins his first season as the full-time color analyst in the CSU football broadcast booth.

In past years, McGlue has served in a variety of roles on the broadcast, including color commentary, sideline reporting and booth production. McGlue also has several years of experience on the CSU Radio Network calling women's basketball action.

A native of Colorado, McGlue can also be heard as a member of the two-time CHL champion Colorado Eagles radio broadcasts, as the Voice of the Eagles and director of broadcasting for the team.

Comcast subscribers may also recognize McGlue from his work providing color commentary and play-by-play during the broadcasts of many high school sporting events on CET. Abby Waner, a former ThunderRidge basketball standout and NCAA champion at Duke, comes to Fort Collins for her first season as a member of the Colorado State radio broadcast team. She will provide sideline reports, working alongside Voice of the Rams Brian Roth, and color analyst Kevin McGlue.

Waner, who currently works with ESPN as a men's and women's college basketball analyst, also has interned for ESPN's Baseball Tonight. She has previous experience working for ESPN as a sideline reporter for football games, and was a basketball studio analyst for The Mtn.

Waner is arguably the best girl's basketball player to come out of Colorado, having never lost a game at home and compiling a 62-game in-state winning streak, while winning three straight Class 5A state championships.
